Let's get back to Woody, one of our favorite people to interview (and we really mean it). He paraded in his top offensive and defensive units for the Skywriters to meet, and it wasn't hard to guess he's proud of these kids.

And "kids" it really is, because Ohio State is a soph-dominated team this year. It must be a tribute to Woody's coaching to have Ohio rated second behind Purdue, because usually a young team is kissed off with comments like this: "The Big Ten ain't no sophomore league, bud," or "Bob Zuppke always said you'll lose one game for every sophomore in your starting lineup."

Button Shoe Again?

Well, if that's true, Jane, then the Buckeyes could expect only a 2-7 record (they're the only one that doesn't play 10 games). Woody plans to start four rookies on offense and three on defense, and he has 12 others listed among his second 22 players.

Ohio had a tremendous freshman team last year. The young Bucks whipped Indiana and Pittsburgh impressively. The most prominent newcomer is Rex Kern, a 6-foot, 180pound red-head from Lancaster, Ohio, with a back problem.

We certainly don't mean Kern has a yellow streak up his back. Far from it. Most kids wouldn't be out there playing a collision sport like football after undergoing a spinal disk operation last June 19, but Kern is ready to lead the Bucks to a title shot.

"We're going to be running all four backs this year," Woody said, "and you can quote me. If we have to go to our old high-button shoe offense, we'll do it.

"This is not a big team, but there aren't many faster ones. This is the best sopho-

more crop we've ever had because of its speed. The biggest mistake a soph can make is to doubt his own ability. This team won't make many mistakes.

"Yeah, I think we're a title contender, in an outside sort of way. Maybe like Johnny Pont last year at Indiana. He did it with sophs, and maybe we could."

Dayan, Bear, Riots

What's that, Jane? You say I've written this much and still haven't explained on how Woody came out swinging for football, Moshe-Dayan, Bear Bryant and The American Way? Okay, here's what he said:

Football-"I don't see how the Big Ten can be anything but great this year because we didn't graduate many good players. We're all getting better players than ever. If you haven't bought your tickets, better get 'em now because you're going to enjoy it."

Moshe Dayan, who led Israel to victory over the Arab nations in six days-"He certainly impressed me. He brought a new element into modern warfare-victory!"

Bear Bryant-"I certainly don't resent it because Bear got some votes at the Democratic convention and I didn't. It's just too bad they didn't give him more votes. Look at his record. Bear Bryant has to be the best football coach in the country."

The American Way-"In football we are taught to play within the rules. If enough of us want rule changes, there are legal ways of doing it without lawlessness. Look at one of the recent political conventions. A candidate was losing the nomination. Why? Because he didn't have enough votes. So some of his followers went out and rioted. They tried to change the rules in the middle of the game. I'll tell you this, if we don't learn to play within the rules, we ought to realize there are Communist countries who do live TOTALLY within the rules. The acceleration of lawlessness in this country worries me even more than the Purdue ball game."

When Woody finished, Jane, about the only question we could ask was this: "Does this mean you may hire Mayor Daley as your line coach?" Woody grinned. "He isn't bad," he replied.



The Cyclones, last-place pick in the Big Eight, proved a rambunctious corpse at their expected wake Saturday, whipping Buffalo 28-10 in Johnny Majors' first game as Cyclone coach.

A record opening-day crowd of 23,000 whooped it up in sunshine and 80-degree weather as I-State zoomed away from precarious 12-10 halftime edge with two touchdowns and a field goal in the last 27 minutes.

John Warder's passing and running drove Buffalo to distraction, and a green Cyclone defense came up with the key play when it looked as if the decision would go right down to the wire.

Iowa State was nursing an 18-10 lead with 12 minutes to go. Buffalo was driving with the wind at its back. Quarterback Denny Mason kept the ball on a fourth-and-two situation at I-State's 43.

Tackles George Dimitri and Andy Waller grabbed Mason a foot short of the first down. The Cyclones took over against the sagging Bulls and less than two minutes later got the clinching field goal.

The three-pointer came on a 27-yard boot by Vern Skripsky, junior from Cedar Rapids Washington. That was sweet consolation for Skrip, who had missed his first two extra-point tries. Last year as a soph, he had converted on all 11 attempts.

The Cyclones got a break for their final touchdown. Nick Kish, Buffalo safety, committed the unpardonable sin of handling a punt inside his 10-yard line. He called for a fair catch, changed his mind twice, fumbled the ball and watched I-State's Larry Gaffin recover it


