Kennedy's explosive Cougars primed themselves for a trip down "murderer's row" Friday night at Kingston stadium with a fantastic 14-13 come-from-behind football victory over Dubuque.

Coach Dale Tryon's crew led for more than three quarters in their Mississippi Valley conference debut, but fell behind 13-7 when the Rams' Loran Schiltz caught a 14-yard touchdown

pass from Roger Schilling with 11:03 to go.

Then the young Cougars, who had one TD canceled by penalty, failed on two scoring tries and appeared out of the running when Dubuque halted them on the Kennedy 45 with 1:27 left.

But any doubting fans who left at that point missed the best part.

Dubuque fumbled on its first play from scrimmage and Kennedy recovered. On the next play, Kirk Jamison faded back and hit speedy Mark Votrubeck on a 48-yard pass play that carried to the Dubuque two. Votrubeck plunged over with 1:15 to go for the tying points.

Then Bruce DeSotel, a senior who decided to try place kicking just last summer, joined a growing list of Kennedy heroes. He booted his fifth straight extra point, the second of the

night, to provide the winning edge.

"I wasn't scared," explained Bruce after the game. "I was terrified."

"I haven't been kicking very well in practice."

That was an overstatement, but Tryon confirmed it in part.

"We have kicking tryouts every week," he explained. "Bruce got 18 of 20, but Bruce Croy kicked 20 straight. We decided to go with De Sotel because he got three straight against LaSalle a week ago."

Tryon was more than pleased with his squad's performance, which stretched the new east side school's winning streak to four straight.

"I've never been prouder of any team," he told the squad. "This was the best comeback any team I've had has ever made. But I had a feeling all night that you were going to do it."

Tryon then called on the

Cougars to report today at 9 a.m. to start preparations for what must rate as the state's most rugged three-game stand. His club now faces Washington next Thursday, then takes on Regis and Moline in its next two outings.

None of the three can ignore the Valley's newest member after Friday's performance in a game that had more "ifs" than most Kingston tests in the last few years.

A roughing the kicker penalty gave Dubuque a second chance for its first touchdown, and Bob Orr eventually capped a 20-play, 62-yard march by scoring from the two. Then a five yard penalty hurt the Rams. Bob Buol kicked the tying point, but it was canceled by the penalty. His second try was wide.

Paul Debban had plunged over from the one with 4:08 left in the first quarter to put Kennedy in front, ending a 54-yard, 11-play drive.

Then there was Votrubeck's electrifying 73-yard punt return that was canceled by a clipping penalty, a blocked Dubuque punt in the third that the Cougars couldn't capitalize on, and a whole book full of "key" plays for both of the Valley squads.

But they saved the big one for the last when the night's only fumble set up Kennedy's last-minute offensive heroics.

EAST MOLINE, Ill. — Experience is the best teacher as Cedar Rapids Jefferson's football team found out Friday night to the tune of a 40-0 rout over East Moline in a Mississippi Valley conference test.

"We probably shouldn't have done it, but we scrimmaged last Saturday after that loss to Rock Island," Coach Jack Fisk said, "and we scrimmaged—and I mean the control-type — every day all week."

"It looks to me like it helped, giving us experience in the line and the backfield. And we can still use more experience from tackle to tackle, but it will come."

If you had tried to tell first-year East Moline Coach Max Bunnell the J Hawks lacked experience, he would have probably called you crazy.

Jefferson, bouncing back from an opening 21-7 loss at the hands of Rock Island, scored the first four times it had the pigskin Friday night.

Led by the running of Walt Steggall and Rick Fulton, along with the passing combination of quarterback Gary Martin to all-state end Tom Mullin, the J-Hawks capped an opening drive of 64 yards in 10 plays with the Martin-Mullin duo getting the first touchdown with 8:42 left in the first quarter.

Reserve Doug Keown capped the next drive — 84 yards in seven plays — with a four-yard scamper for a 12-0 lead and Steggall got the third TD on another four-yard run after a 16-yard Martin to Mullin aerial carried to the four.

Steggall set up the fourth TD with an excellent 21-yard run to the Panther 47. He injured his knee on the play and was held out the remainder of the game.

Keown then scampered 20 yards off tackle, and five plays later, Martin found Mullin again for a five-yard scoring aerial with 9:36 remaining in the half.

The J-Hawks also scored just before the intermission with reserve fullback Tim Spacke busting over from four yards away. Fulton added his third conversion and Jeff led 33-0.

No. 2 QB Ken Brauer connected with end Gary Dunham for the final tally in the third quarter. The TD was set up after Dan Davies recovered an East Moline fumble at the Panther 19. East Moline had earlier held a Jeff march to the 18.

Despite Jeff's attack which totaled 429 yards (270 on the ground), East Moline uncorked a potent air attack in the second half with left-handed quarterback Dan Cogdill completing 15 of 36 passes for 217 yards, including eight to his lanky end Paul Stumphy.

The Panthers' deepest penetration was to the Jeff 23 in the first half and East Moline managed its final two drives of the game to the J-Hawk 11 and five before fourth-down passes fell incomplete.

It was "Al Morse Night" at Prairie's home opener Friday as the speedy halfback ran for touchdowns of 20, 30, and 50 yards and passed for another to power the Hawks past Linn-Mar, 27-0.

Morse, who also added three place ments, scampered 187 yards the 12 times he took hold of the ball for an impressive 15.6-yard average.

It was the first inter-loop game in the newly-organized East Central Iowa conference and Coach Red Leidigh's Hawks kept the league oddsmakers on their side by rolling up 396 yards total offense while holding Linn-Mar to only 35 yards.

Hawk signal-caller Curt Wiley put together a hard running game while keeping the Lion defense honest with seven of twelve completions for 103 yards on the airways.

The junior quarterback took Prairie down to score only eight plays and three minutes after receiving the opening kick-off. The 58-yard drive ended with Morse scoring on a criss-cross over the right side from the Lions' 30.

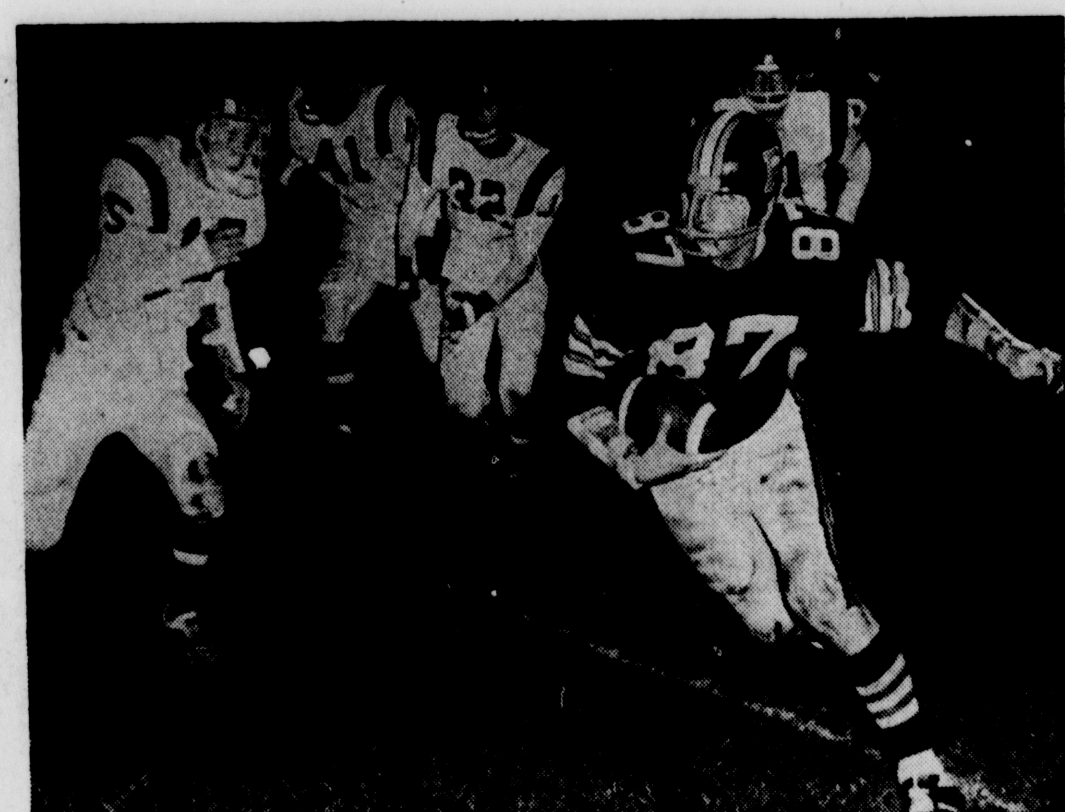
Morse tore through the left side of the Linn-Mar defense again six minutes later, this time from 20 yards out and added the placement to give the Hawks a 13-0 lead.

Wiley started that drive from his own 30-yard line, with big yardage coming on his 23-yard pass to Morse at the Lions' 41, and Dean Zach's tackle-breaking 21-yard smash on the next play.

The Hawks lost the ball on a fumble and ran out of downs the next two times they had the offensive, but took over again at midfield when Prairie Safety Steve Voigt was rucked up on a punt return.

Flags were all over the play, but the penalties were offsetting, and Wiley called the criss-cross again on the first snap to send Morse 50 yards for the score.

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recovered one of them along with an interception, and blocking Prairie's only punt in the fourth quarter.

Lion end Jerry Wendell brought the Linn-Mar fans to their feet three times in the closing minutes as he one-handed an eight-yard pass at Prairie's 25-yard line and deftly outmaneuvered the Hawk safetiesman twice only to have passes slip off his fingertips in the end zone.

Soph Phil Polzin made his debut in the Linn-Mar signal-calling spot in fine style with hard-running roll-outs, while Dick Burns, shifted this week from quarterback to fullback, boomed seven punts out to a college-size 38-yard average.

It wasn't all bad for Coach Paul Kerber's sophomore-dominated Linn-Mar squad, however, as the Lion defense kept the Hawks on edge by jarring loose several fumbles,
