IOWA CITY (AP) - An hourlong controlled scrimmage was scheduled Saturday afternoon for Iowa's football team, which bounced back Friday with a crisp passing drill.

Hawkeye Coach Ray Nagel, who expressed dissatisfaction with the team's offense a day earlier, said he was pleased by the Friday performances of the offense and defensive back Craig Clemons.
