

Jeff Rocks Bettendorf for Valley Top; Kennedy Wins

Keown Scores Three, Trickey Shines, 34-19

MAN, you got to get with it these days if you relish any hopes of capturing a conference football championship.

So, Jefferson high, after a lethargic start, got with it with a 21-point second quarter and went on to defeat Bettendorf 34-19 and take undisputed possession of first place in the Mississippi Valley conference Friday night at Kingston stadium.

The over-all play of senior halfback Doug Keown and the passing of junior quarterback Brad Trickey sparked the J-Hawks to their fifth league win without a loss. Bettendorf fell to 4-1, in a tie for second place with Kennedy, Jeff's foe next week.

Keown and Trickey were superb—along with a number of their teammates—before a homecoming crowd estimated at 6,000. Keown hit pay dirt three times on runs of 71 and one yards and a pass from Trickey for 21, gained 76 yards rushing in eight carries, caught six passes for 100 yards and averaged 46 yards on three punts. All Trickey did was toss a pair of TD aeriels, while connecting on 11 of 12 attempts for 179 yards.

However, that all resulted after Bettendorf grabbed a 7-0 lead in the first quarter and it appeared the J-Hawks were in for a long night.

"We may have read too many headlines last week," Jeff Coach Jack Fisk said. "Our defense just wasn't with it in the first quarter. Of course Bettendorf's line had something to do with it. They were good!"

"I was very pleased with Keown, Trickey and tackle Gary Dunham. Keown is as good as anyone we've ever had as far as getting open for a pass. And tonight he showed his running ability."

Tackle Mike Krecioch may have been the first J-Hawk to realize the homecoming dance wouldn't be much fun unless he won. The 245-pounder woke his mates up when he crashed through to block a Bulldog punt at the B-25.

Two plays later halfback Emmett Doolin skirted left end from 20 yards out for the score and Craig Jelinek's kick tied it at 7-7.

Jeff went out in front to stay the next time it got the ball. The payoff was Trickey's 31-yard strike to Keown, climaxing a 45-yard drive in three plays. Keown had already nabbed three passes early in the game on patterns in either flat, but this time he faked that route and sped into the secondary to score untouched.

Trickey kept his hot hand on the next series. Doolin ran for 11, then Brad spotted Keown for 14 more to the J-49. The next play end Doug Holland and Trickey combined for a 51-yard pass-run play. The score jumped to 21-7 when Holland took a two-point conversion pass from Mike Loftsgard off a fake kick.

Keown got the last two six-pointers on his one-yard burst in the third quarter and a 71-yard sprint in the fourth quarter. The latter came on the first scrimmage play after Bettendorf's Gary Campbell climaxed a 99-yard drive with a one-yard run to cut Jeff's margin to 27-13 with 4:39 remaining.

Bettendorf's final tally came on Steve Schaefer's 10-yard pass to Steve Stuart with 1:22 left.

Jeff, the Valley's top offensive and defensive team, won the offensive battle with 357 total yards. Bettendorf had 344, quite a blow to the 114-yard average held by Jeff.

Doolin, who is the league's top rusher, led Jeff with 78 yards in eight rushes. Campbell had 79 for the same number of carries.

Jirsa ran for one touchdown and hurled scoring passes of 54 and 14, respectively, to Don Showalter and George Schaefer. Miller was the running star, and

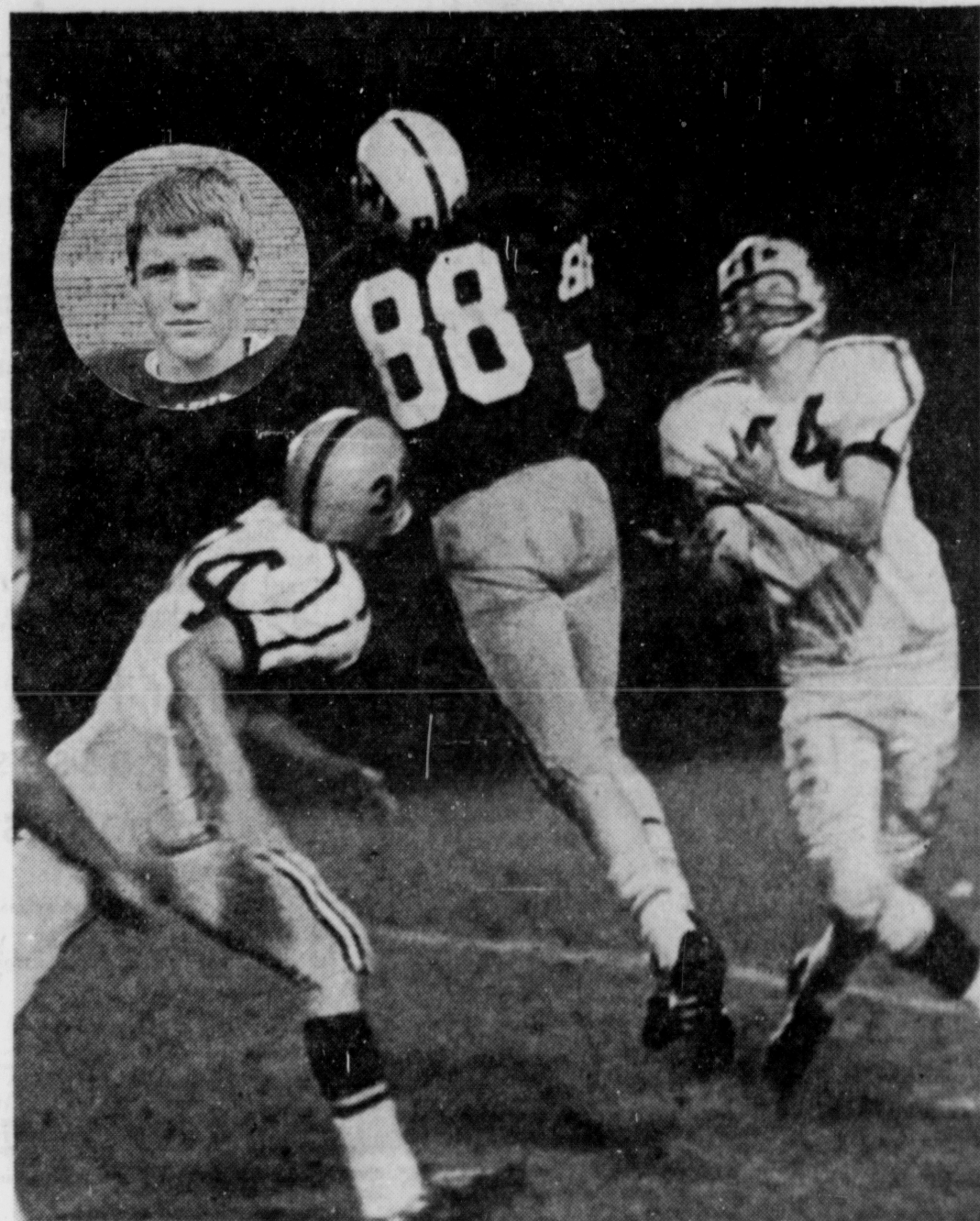
he scored three touchdowns on one-yard runs.

Greg rushed 29 times for 245 yards and scored three times on the ground. He also picked up touchdowns on 81- and 30-yard passes. His 356 yards of total offense was more than half of Marion's output for the evening and far surpassed Maquoketa's 162 yards of rushing and passing.

Pleasant Valley shocked Prairie with a 92-yard touchdown drive on the first series of downs but Prairie stormed back to win 44-12 Friday in a non-conference homecoming contest.

The visitor from southeastern Iowa scored on a five-yard pass from Paul Harvey to big end Pete Solverson with less than five minutes elapsed in the game.

The Hawks struck back and were never headed after Dean Zach dashed 36 yards on Prairie's second play from scrimmage and went ahead on the conversion pass from Jeff Leidigh to Ron Romick.

Halfback Jon Brase took a handoff from Leidigh and passed to end Wes Cerveny for a 23-yard touchdown pass early in the second quarter.

The Leidigh to Romick scored lightning hit in the second quarter for a 70-yard

screen pass with first down and 30 to go. The score was 20-6 with 4:38 to go in the half.

Romick then tried his hand as passing and he connected with Brase for a 30-yard gain to the five and Zach raced around left end for the third touchdown of the second quarter with 28 seconds to go and Prairie led 26-6 at half.

Prairie established its superiority quickly in the second half on a twisting kickoff return by Zach to Pleasant Valley's 40 and a booming touchdown run over tackle by Romick on the next play.

With seven minutes remaining in the third period Steve Voigt, substitute quarterback, banged to the end zone on a 15-yard keeper. And, with the score 38-6, Prairie Head Coach Red Leidigh began substituting freely.

Prairie's second team played Pleasant Valley evenly but left it up to starting quarterback Leidigh to put them on the scoring board for the last time on a seven-yard pass to senior end Tom Anderson with 45 seconds to go in the game.

Pleasant Valley's scoring combination clicked again in the last quarter when Harvey led Solverson beautifully on a 37-yard pass and the rough tight end pulled a Prairie defender into the end zone.

Prairie preferred touchdowns to first downs but led Valley 11-9, in that department and outrushed and outpassed them.

Cougars Stay Alive, Whip Muskies, 22-12

MUSCATINE—Kennedy high school's offense sputtered considerably here Friday night, but the Cougars still managed a 22-12 victory over Muscatine to keep their title hopes alive in the Mississippi Valley conference football race.

"I hope we were looking ahead to our game with Jefferson next Friday," confided Coach Dale Tryon as he surveyed his ailing troops after the win.

"We played poorly tonight. I guess our injuries are just catching up with us."

Muscatine Coach Gary Astleford, whose out-manned club has yet to score a Valley victory, had a different view.

"If there is such a thing as a moral victory," he explained, "I'd say we got one tonight."

That's about the story, as the Cougars scored quickly on the third play from scrimmage. Steve Markt hit Don Greenwood on a 54-yard TD pass, and then the Cougars held off a fired-up Muskie crew the rest of the way in the Muscatine homecoming battle.

The Muskies never led in the game, and never seriously threatened in the second half. But a 22-yard pass from Gary Fisher to Bob Vargus did trim the score to 7-6 midway in the first period.

Kennedy then picked up a 2-pointer as Steve McDonnell tackled Fisher in the end zone with 11:21 to go in the half, and the Cougars virtually wrapped it up when Markt raced, 19 yards for a 15-6 lead with 6:09 to go in the half.

The Cougars could never quite break it open, even though they never appeared to be in serious danger.

Kennedy continued to have injury problems here Friday night. Craig Pike suffered a broken leg and Chuck Norton, who picked up 55 yards in 11 carries, had a possible broken finger.

Also, Bill Nicholson had a severely sprained ankle and will be on the very doubtful list.

"We had five starters out of the lineup tonight," explained Tryon, "and they are all doubtful for the Jefferson game. The only one we might get back is fullback Jack Ryan, who just got off crutches today."
