BETTENDORF—Cedar Rapids Washington let it all hang out and socked Bettendorf with a 57-14 football defeat here Friday night.

Fired by Mike Reeve's 95-yard return of a pass interception for a touchdown in the first quarter, the Warriors went on to roll up 471 yards total offense and maintain their hold on first place in the Mississippi Valley conference with a 2-0-1 record.

There were many Wash stars in the rout, which was the worst defeat for Bettendorf's Ray Oles in his 15-year coaching career. The Bulldogs are 1-2 in the Valley.

The running of tailback Gary Hobbs paced a bevy of Wash backs, while quarterback Dan Fletcher was superb with his pinpoint passing. Dan tossed for two six-pointers on 10 completion in 18 attempts and 212 yards.

Hobbs sprang loose for 113 yards in only eight carries and tallied twice. The first was a five-yard pitch from Fletcher just before the half. The second opened a 21-point period in the third and came on a 56-yard run.

"Hobbs gave a second effort every time he carried," said Wash Coach Wally Sheets. "We weren't able to run him in our earlier games because of the mud. I was glad we were able to get our tailback offense going tonight."

Hobbs also was a key target of Fletcher's aeriels, snagging four for 114 yards.

Reeve and fullback Phil Danowsky also hit paydirt twice for Wash, the state's fifth-ranked prep team. Reeve added a four-yard run in the fourth quarter to up the count to 48-7. Danowsky, who gained 42 yards in eight tries, scored on runs of one and three yards, respectively.

Phil also connected on all seven of his conversion tries. Wash added insult to injury after its final TD when Fletcher hit end Bob Eustice with a two-point pass to make it 57-7.

Fletcher and Eustice hooked up for a 20-yard scoring play in the third quarter. Reserve tailback Jim Bassett, who blasted for 46 yards in six carries, got Wash's final TD on a one-yard smash.

Bettendorf's Chuck Curtis just about matched Reeve's spectacular scoring play when he scooped up a rolling punt and dashed untouched 54 yards for a sudden six. That made it 14-7.

Tailback Dave Millage, who collected 57 yards in eight runs, scored Bettendorf's final TD on a two-yard run.

"I don't think we're that bad," sighed Oles. "Wash got us down and that hurt us. We were fairly even in the first half, but their score just before the half really hurt."

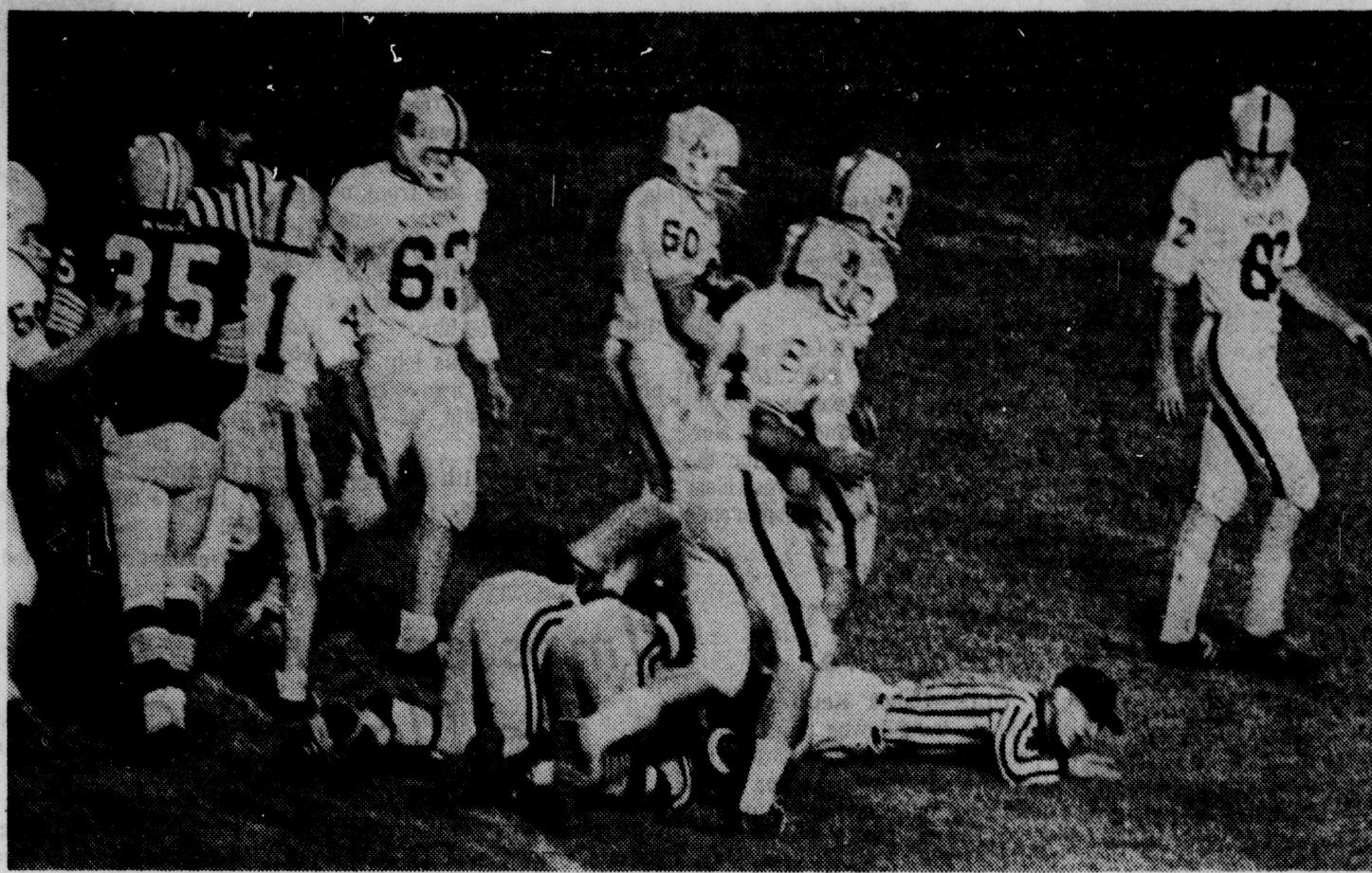
Oles wouldn't say he thought Wash poured it on. "When you get somebody down, it seems you can just about do anything and come out in good shape," he added.

Wash's fine end, Sy Bassett, suffered a sprained ankle after a 30-yard pass reception in the second quarter. Sy caught two for 47 yards. His sub, Craig Collins, nabbed three for 31.

Marion punched in 24 points in the first half Friday night against winless Vinton and was forced to hang on for a 26-12 victory.

The host Indians' mistakes got them into trouble the last two periods. Fumbles and pass interference calls caused Marion its second half woes.

"We fumbled four times in the second half and lost them all," Les Dollinger said. "It was a poor exhibition of football."

"Steve Kray did a great job line backing tonight," the Marion coach added.

"We will have to improve a lot if we want to win any more games. I hope it is out of their system by next Friday."

Marion travels to Independence next Friday night in an attempt to stay in the Wamac race, which was enlivened by Tipton's upset loss to Monticello.

A short Vinton punt set up the Indians first score. Moving from the Vinton 35, Marion bit pay dirt on Steve Stone's 3-yard thrust with 8:01 left.

Marion rang up eight more with 11:54 left in the second stanza. Mark Martin sprinted in from the nine after Van Gillman recovered a Viking fumble on the Vinton 20.

Paul Martin made it 24-0 with 6:48 left in the second on a one-yard plunge.

All Marion could get in the second half was a safety when Indian linemen smothered Don Wiedeman in the end zone after a punt pass from center sailed far over his head. This came early in the third period, but Marion already had lost a fumble on Vinton's 17.

The Indians managed to foil

Charlie Bruggeman then ran in the extra point, and it looked like a long night for the Lions.

But then the Linn-Mar defense stiffened and shutout Beckman the rest of the way.

The offense, which has had its problems this fall, perked up in the second half as the losers kept the pressure on almost to the final gun.

Linn-Mar missed its biggest chance early in the fourth period. A 47-yard drive that included one big fourth down play, carried to the Beckman four-yard line.

Beckman's Rick Kass then came up with the night's top defensive effort as he broke through and tackled Phil Polzin

on the 11 on a fourth down effort.

The big play in that drive came with fourth and seven at the 31. Halfback Cal Dart tossed to Polzin for a first down at the Beckman 12.

Later in the period, Beckman threatened again after a 54-yard run by Bob Hittenmiller to Linn-Mar's 23. But the Lions stiffened and took over on downs at their own seven.

Linn-Mar Coach Paul Carney admitted the key for his club was the fourth down play by Kass that kept his Lions away from the end zone.

Beckman's Bob Timmerman agreed. "I wasn't particularly displeased with our play," he explained. "Their stunts bothered us, but we also had some bad calls. I made some of them."

"Some penalties at key times bothered us, too."

"Linn-Mar played a very good ball game."
