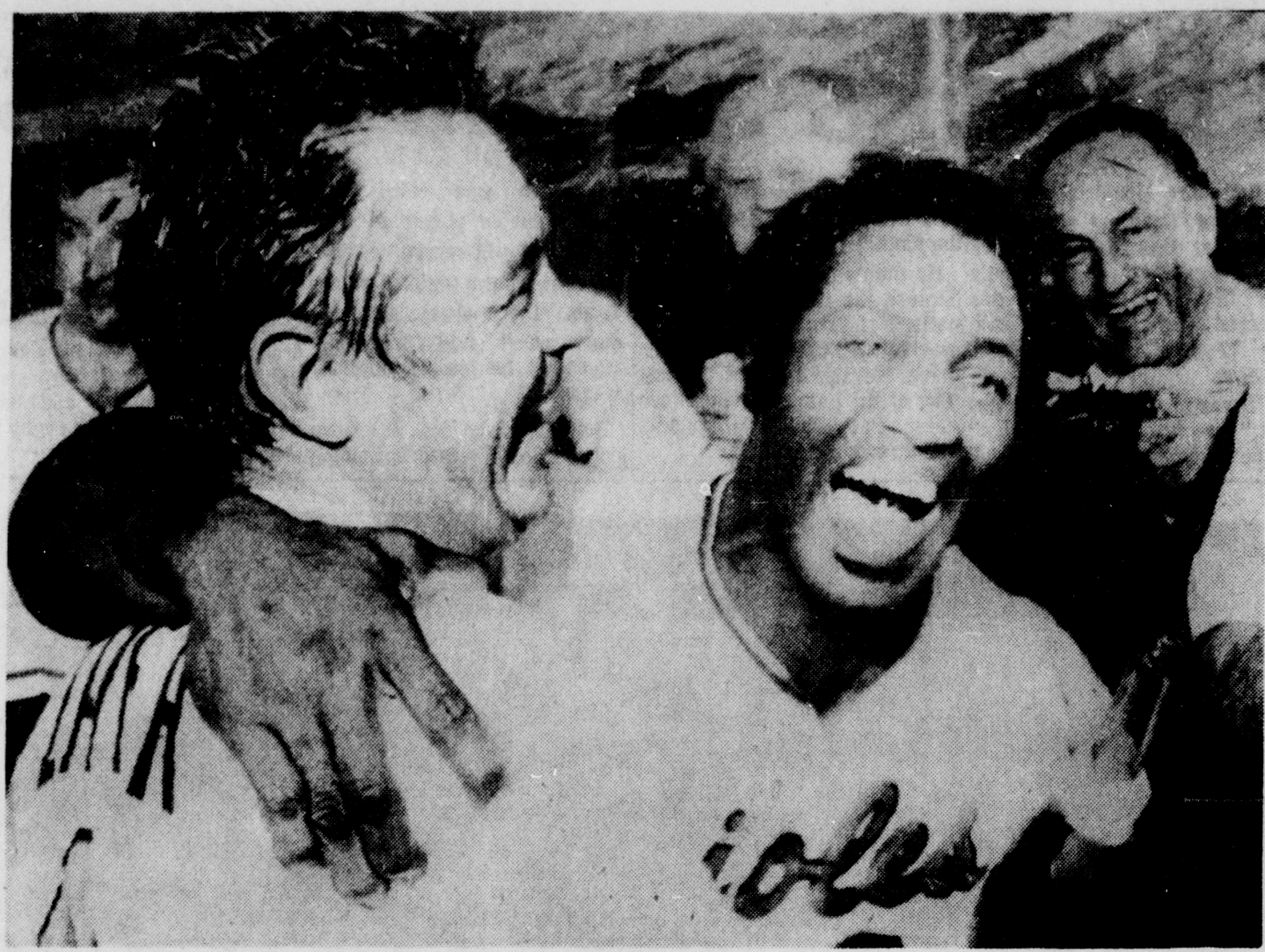




Baltimore Hoopla--It's Wild!

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Big Red Machine Finally Halted

BALTIMORE (AP) — The Big Red Machine, its pitching part stripped by injuries, ran out of gas Thursday.

"You can't win with only two regular starting pitchers," Cincinnati right fielder Pete Rose said after the Reds lost the fifth game 9-3 and the World Series to Baltimore, four games to one.

The Orioles bombed 18 pitchers for 33 runs and a record 10 homers in the five games.

"You don't need a lot of pitchers. The Orioles proved three (Jim Palmer, Dave McNally and Mike Cuellar) were enough. But we had only Tony Cloninger and Gary Nolan. Not enough," Rose said.

Manager Sparky Anderson refused to criticize his pitching, choosing to praise the Baltimore sluggers.

"Sure we need 18 pitchers," Anderson said. "But I've got to do what the scoreboard shows. They just kept hitting us. Give Baltimore batters the credit."

Cincinnati starter Jim Merritt, the sore-armed 20-game winner and the victim of Baltimore's first four runs in the first two innings, said he felt good.

"I was throwing free and easy and had no pain," Merritt said. "I was disappointed in my control."

"He wasn't as sharp as he has been," Anderson said. "That comes from not working."

Merritt's last start was in the second game of the National league playoffs 11 days ago. Anderson replaced Merritt with Wayne Granger with two out in the second inning.

"We had to use Granger that early," Rose said. "That hasn't been our game plan all year."

The Reds backed the selection of Brooks Robinson as the Series' most valuable player and the winner of a new car.

"Robby just dominated the Series," Anderson said. "If you look at the ballots, he had to be unanimous. If he wasn't, they should take the guys who didn't vote him in for a mental exam."

"He's a Golden Glove for 10 years. That's his bag. You could tell he was the difference by the crowd's reaction. Every time he came up they gave him a standing ovation," Rose said.

Anderson continued to talk of his team as being the best in baseball and one that could make a return trip to the Series in 1971.

"In my heart, I feel we're still the best. But you should give all the credit to the winners," he said.

"Someday when we win—and we're going to—I'll expect my boys to get the credit just like Baltimore," Anderson said.

"I can't blame the pitchers, the scouts, anybody," the Reds' pilot said. "We just made too many mistakes. I have a hunch we'll be back here next year."

"I'd like to come back here next year," he continued. "Let's see — they won 109 and 108 games the last two seasons. Maybe they'll drop off to 105 next year."

Young Milt Wilcox, rapped hard earlier in the Series by the Orioles, was one of the few bright spots for the Reds in the fifth game. The 20-year-

old right-hander retired all five batters he faced.

"I had more time to warm up today," Wilcox said. "My slider was working better."

A smash Frank Robinson hit off Wilcox' arm in the fourth inning did not seriously hurt the youngster.

"It broke a slight blood vessel in my arm," he said. "It was a glancing blow — hitting me more in the back than in the arm."

Tony Perez, who smashed 40 homers and knocked in 129 runs during the regular season, went 1-for-18 and did not have a homer or RBI. He didn't look at the performance as a slump.

"It luck or something," he said in his broken English. "I hit ball good again today. I couldn't find any holes, that's all. They give me some good pitches to hit."

IOWA CITY — The big plays almost always spell the difference.

Iowa City High got 'em when they were needed most and the result was a 22-12 football win over Cedar Rapids Kennedy here Thursday night.

Quarterback John Piro and running backs Terry Keely and Frank Gilliam provided the offensive spark, but Iowa City's defensive line rose to the occasion twice in the first quarter.

The first two times the Cou-

gars had the ball they were stopped by inches on Iowa City's six- and 13-yard lines, respectively.

"Those two stallings really hurt us," said Coach Jerry Mauren of Kennedy, now 2-3 in the Mississippi Valley conference. "We had been moving the ball well and we felt when we came out for the second half we could move the ball on them any time and score."

"But we couldn't get a break until the fourth quarter."

That's when Kennedy got its 12 points to close the gap to 16-12.

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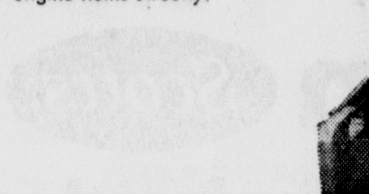
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tempts for 144 yards and one TD, a 34-yarder to Gilliam.

Piro didn't fire a pass until the third series. Then he hit three in a row, including the big one to his fine sophomore Gilliam in a third and five situation. Gilliam was hit at the four, but twisted into the end zone to score.

Piro's fourth-down pass to end Dan Dunham, good for 11 yards, also set up the successful field goal attempt.
