

Kennedy Tops West; Wahlert Stuns Regis

Cedar Rapids Kennedy looked like anything but the Mississippi Valley conference leader at Kingston stadium Thursday evening, but still mounted enough power to defeat Iowa City West 10-0.

The victory solidified the Cougars' hold on first place in the Valley, giving them a 4-0-1 loop record. Jefferson and Dubuque Senior, who meet Friday night at Kingston, are tied for second with 3-1 marks. West is now 1-3-1.

Despite the triumph and Kennedy's lofty standing, Cougar head Coach Jerry Mauren was far from pleased as his club had trouble generating a consistent attack and at times had difficulty defending a team which suffered its fourth shutout in six games.

"We definitely suffered a let-down," explained Mauren, referring to the Cougars' tough 16-14 loss to Regis last week.

"I really don't understand it, either," Mauren added. "We had a great practice Monday and another good one Tuesday. I thought we'd be ready."

"All I can really say is that I'm glad to win playing like that."

Unbelievably, Kennedy got its only touchdown in the first quarter despite running only one play from scrimmage in the entire period — and that on the last play.

West received the opening kickoff and moved from its 30 to the Kennedy 16 in 10 plays. On the tenth play, though, halfback Keith Johnson was hit at the 16 and fumbled the ball.

Cornerback Larry Covington alertly gobbled it up on the bounce and took off down the sidelines for an 84-yard return and a touchdown. Randy Clapp's kick made it 7-0 with 7:49 left in the period.

West mounted another march after the ensuing kickoff, but it stalled at the Cougar 20. Kennedy finally ran off its first play from scrimmage with seven seconds left.

"I didn't think their offense was supposed to be good," said Mauren, "but they sure controlled the ball in the first half."

That was an understatement. Kennedy ran off only 17 plays in the first half to West's 35 and three of those were punts. The Cougars didn't get their first and only first down of the half until 2:30 remained.

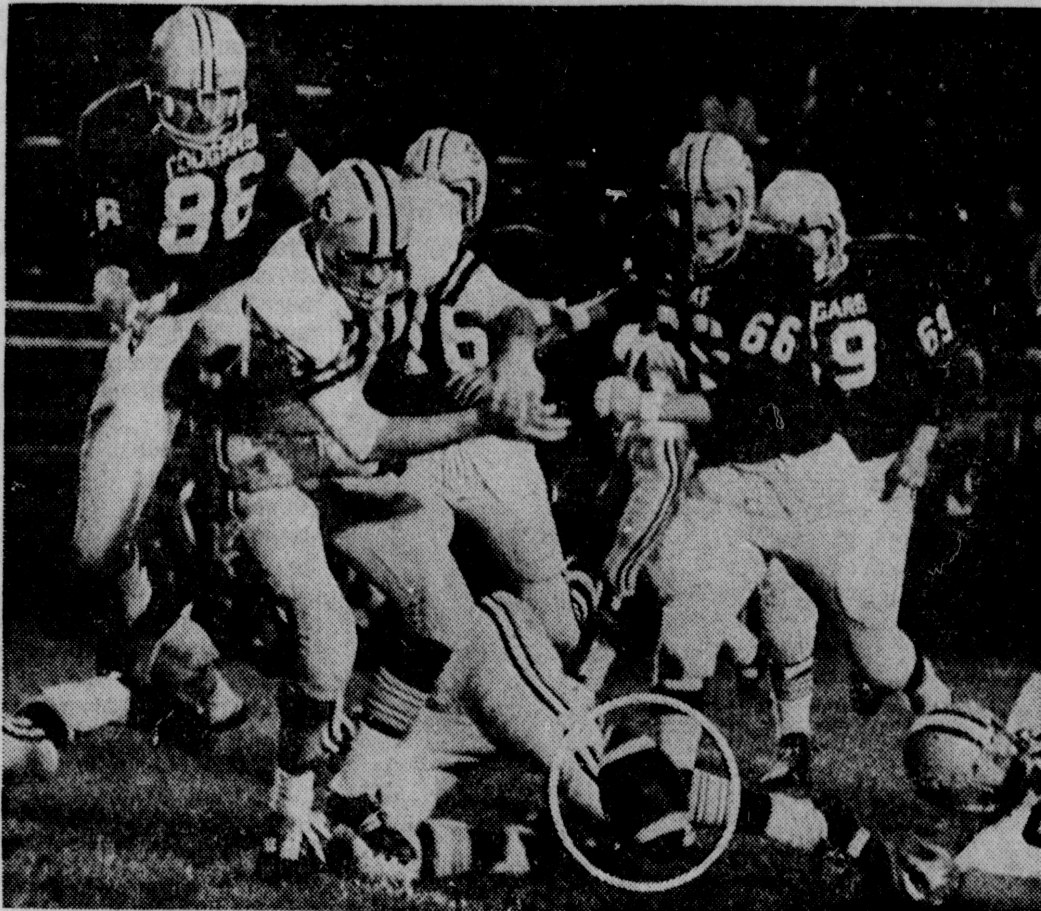
Just as West's defense dominated the opening half, however, Kennedy's set the tempo in the second half. This time the Cougars got only one first down, and 15 total yards.

Kennedy, meanwhile, got 11 first downs and 136 of its 163 rushing total. Tailback Tony Baranowski led with 87 yards and quarterback Dave Greenwood had 35. Mike Mellecker led West with 51 yards rushing.

One Cougar second-half drive was halted when Greenwood fumbled into the West endzone from the one, but finally salvaged a 23-yard field goal by Clapp with 7:33 left in the game.

"The turning point had to be that fumble," said Trojan Coach Don Lamm. "We were moving the ball and then they got an easy one."

"Our defense did a real good job, but we have seven juniors on offense and it's taking a long time for them to put it together."

DUBUQUE — A shocking, last-minute broken play here Thursday night bumped fifth-ranked Cedar Rapids Regis from the ranks of Iowa's unbeaten football teams, 22-14.

Dubuque Wahlert turned the trick with just 57 seconds left on the clock in a wild and woolly football struggle between two long-time prep rivals.

Wahlert's John Burbach set up the play with one of three Dubuque interceptions with 1:30 to go.

Pat Strub, who just about did it all for the Eagles, failed to connect on his first two pass attempts with the score knotted at 14-14.

On third down, he faded back, reversed his field twice, and finally launched a long aerial. Kevin Kriebes, well covered by two Royals, managed to slip behind both and took the ball in for the winning TD.

"Mistakes hurt us," admitted a disappointed Regis boss Tom Good after the game. "But give Wahlert credit. They're a good, big club and they played well."

The mistakes included three lost fumbles and three Wahlert interceptions, along with some costly penalties.

Wahlert had somewhat the same problem in a game that featured long scoring strikes and muffed opportunities.

The Eagles lost two fumbles, were hit by costly penalties and missed scoring opportunities. The Royals were also handicapped by injury to senior quarterback Gary Beck. Gary suffered severe rib bruises late in the first half after launching a rollout pass. He played the final two periods, heavily taped.

Regis set the pattern for the game. After returning the opening kickoff to the Regis 41, Good inserted No. 2 quarterback Jeff Purdy at left half.

The Royals faked their power sweep to the right, Purdy faded back and hit Tim

Miller on a 59-yard scoring strike.

Miller was all alone, 20 yards behind the Wahlert defense.

Regis possibly missed a chance to take control of the game late in the same quarter. A Royal drive had carried to the Wahlert one-foot line, where it was second and goal.

The Cedar Rapids club, however, fumbled on the ensuing play and Wahlert's Rob Stoffel recovered.

Wahlert trimmed it to 8-6 with 4:45 left in the half on its own halfback pass. Mike Burmeier faked the sweep, faded and hit Kriebes on a 21-yard play to the one. Bill Schrup bolted over on the next play.

Wahlert took a 14-8 lead with just one minute gone in the second half. Strub, who bedeviled the Regis defense all night with his pitchout action, faked a pitch and raced 73 yards to the end zone.

Regis tied it with 9:16 left in the game when Beck fired an 18-yard touchdown pass to Cam Luerkens on the one and he went in for the score. Regis missed the lead on the next play when Beck raced in with a keeper, but the score was nullified by penalty.

Luerkens played a standout game for the Royals.

The big Wahlert line held Regis to 160 yards on the ground, but the Royals managed 246 through the air.

ISU, K-State Seek Comebacks

MANHATTAN, Kan. (AP) — Two teams seeking to battle back from discouraging 10-point losses clash here Saturday when Kansas State hosts Iowa State in a Big Eight conference football game.

Iowa State takes a 3-1 mark into the battle after a hard-fought 24-14 setback at the hands of sixth-ranked Colorado. K-State seeks to rebound from a 31-21 loss to cross-state rival Kansas.

"We have to forget the Colorado game and be ready for a big, physical team in K-State," warns Iowa State Coach Johnny Majors.

"I don't think the score against Kansas was a true indication of how well Kansas State can play on a given day," adds Majors of the Wildcats, who are 3-2 overall and 0-2 in the conference.

"This is our chance to start fresh and come up with a victory," says Majors. Iowa State under Majors has won only four Big Eight games in the last four seasons.
