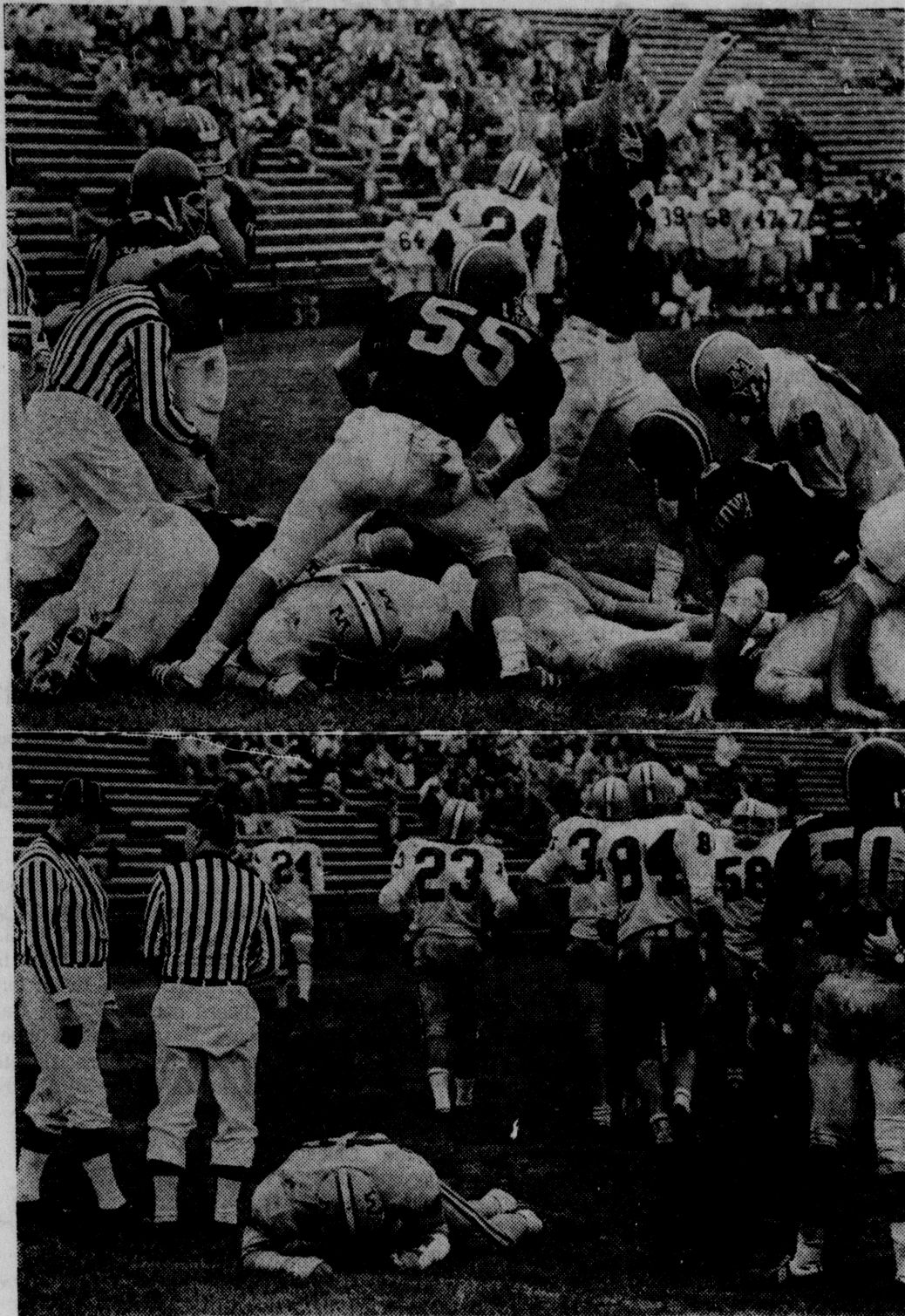

'Team Effort' Leads Win Over Minnesota

IOWA CITY—Having fun and winning at the same time is a tough combination to beat. Iowa's freshman football team found that out Friday afternoon enroute to a convincing 28-7 victory over Minnesota's frosh at Iowa stadium.

It was the first of a three-game schedule for Iowa's yearlings, who showed surprising composure for an outfit that has been busy for the most part serving as fodder for the Hawkeye varsity.

At that, it ran Frosh Coach Harold Roberts' record to 3-0, including a pair of wins last

year. Roberts had much to say but no words were more accurate than when he exclaimed, "What a team effort!"

"There's no secret to it," added Roberts. "We've got some kids on this team who are going to win for Iowa. They like to hit and, as you know, they did it today."

"That was a big Minnesota team and they have some good personnel. I know because I recruit the Minnesota area. We just outblocked and outtackled them."

The two clubs played a rock 'em, sock 'em scoreless first quarter before Iowa got on the board in the second quarter on a 47-yard pass from quarterback Bobby Ousley of Detroit to Rick Penney of Geneseo, Ill.

It was a sideline-and-go pattern called by Ousley. Penney, brother of varsity fullback Steve, took the perfectly thrown aerial at the 10 and was hit at the five, but he dragged the defender across the goal line. Unfortunately, Penney suffered an ankle injury on the play and was through for the day.

Ousley, a 6-2, 180-pounder who is quick to set up in his pocket, said Roberts had sent the play in as a streak (or fly) pattern.

"Minnesota stopped that pattern earlier, so I told Rick to run a sideline and go," explained Bobby, whose older brother served as a reserve quarterback behind Greg Cook at the U. of Cincinnati three years ago.

"That was the big play," offered Roberts. "When Penney was hit and managed to drag the player in with him that gave us great confidence offensively. Minnesota was hitting hard at that point and we were having trouble moving the ball."

"We lose him (Penney) and we lose a great safety, too. But Craig Johnson (walk-on from Des Moines) went to his spot and Gary Wood (walk-on from

Oelwein) moved to Johnson's cornerback spot and both did a great job... The effort by everyone won this game!"

Iowa made it 21-0 with 14 more points in the third quarter.

Brandt Yocom of Charlton went over the top of a Gopher defender to snag a 19-yard pass from Ousley for the first TD of the quarter. Then Dan Lafleur, linebacker from Sioux City, ran an interception back 84 yards for the second.

Lafleur was happy to have a convoy of about seven teammates from the 50 yard line in, saying, "If they hadn't been around I don't think I would have made it. I died the last 20 yards. It sure was a lot of fun, though. We've been working six weeks for this game."

Kerry Dolan of Decorah made it 21-0 with his third of four successful conversion attempts.

The Gophers averted a shut-out with 6:50 left to play when Chris Kriesiewicz hit split end Herb Buelow with a 10-yard scoring pass.

But Iowa came right back for its final points on Brad Trickey's 15-yard scoring strike to fullback Jom Hall, a 205-pound walk-on from Toledo, Ohio.

Trickey, the former Cedar Rapids Jefferson prep star who started the game at quarterback, said he made the call with 45 seconds left.

"They were set up for it," he explained, "because we had been running sprint-out sweeps up 'til then. I just sent Hall into a flood pattern and he was wide open."

Trickey, a 5-11, 175-pounder, took some pretty good shots from the Gopher defenders, but dismissed them with: "You get used to hitting when you play against the varsity almost every day."

Also playing key roles in Iowa's defense, which limited the Gophers to 89 yards rushing and 148 yards in the air, were back Bob Elliott and linemen Steve Welk, Denny Armington, Bob Porter, Ralph Eckes and Lynn Heil.

Dave Nielson of Iowa City averaged 40 yards on five punts for the Hawks.

Iowa gained 153 yards on the ground and 176 in the air.

The win enabled Iowa to claim Floyd of Rosedale, Jr., a miniature copy of the bronze pig the two varsities compete for annually. Floyd junior is the inspiration of Lou Ginsberg, a Hawkeye griddier in the late forties who is a jeweler in Cedar Rapids and Iowa City.

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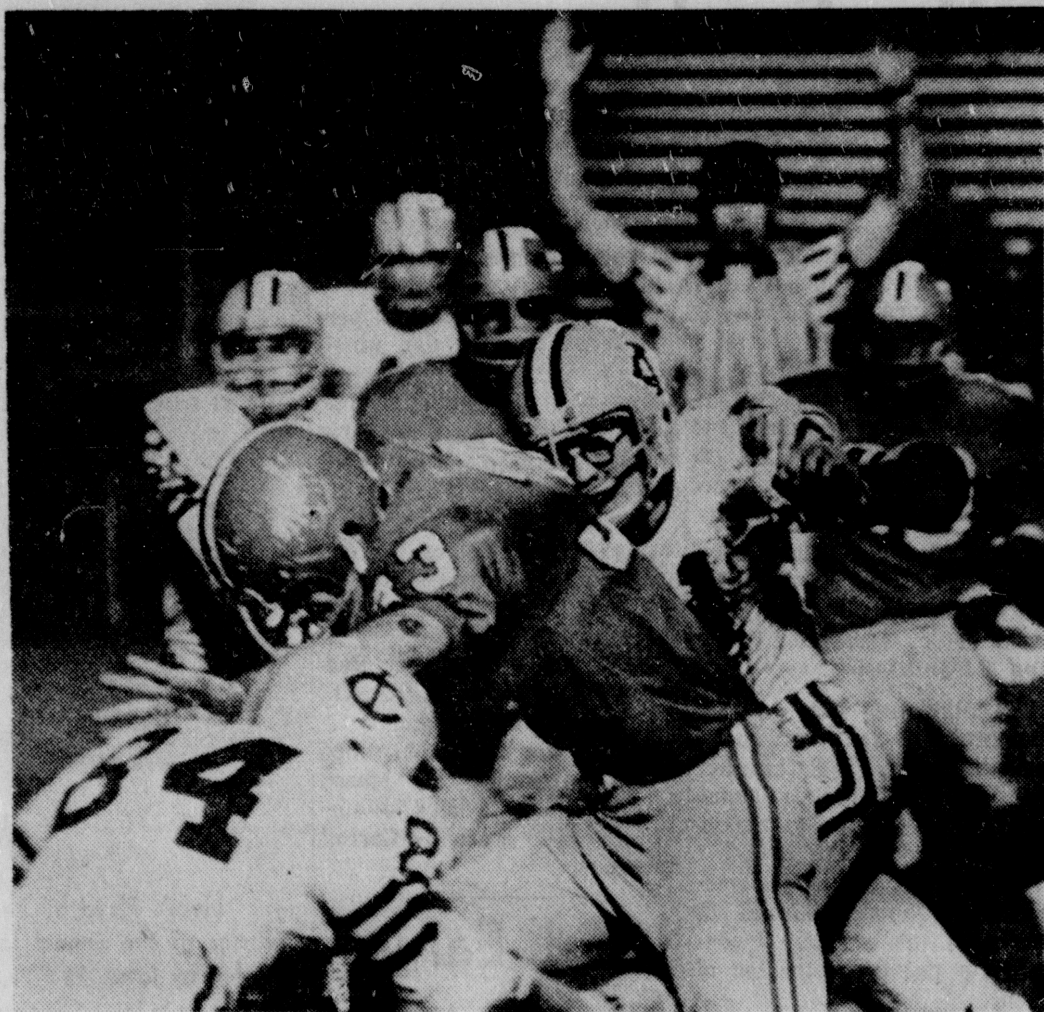

Wash Rips West 24-0

Washington's offensive and defensive units vied for attention Friday night as both performed with precision on a slippery Kingston football turf.

The Wash attack, despite the slick going, piled up 216 net yards rushing against a strong Iowa City West defense as the Warriors ground out a 24-0 Mississippi Valley conference victory.

The defense, however, was equally impressive in holding West to 67 net yards on the ground and 19 in the air. West managed only three completions in 22 attempts.

"Sure I was satisfied with our performance," admitted Coach Wally Sheets. "I felt we could have broken a couple of long ones if the field had been dry."

Sheets was also pleased with the work of Brian Throlson, back-up fullback to standout James Bassett. Brian filled in at halfback for injured Jim Conkling and wound up with 42 yards in 11 carries.

Bassett led Wash with 77 yards in 12 carries and Greg Witwer added 76 in 13 tries.

Diethl kicked three straight extra points with authority and then polished it off with a 27-

yard field goal in the fourth quarter.

"Dave figured to be our kicker all year," explained Wally, "but he injured an ankle in a summer football camp. Now he's back at full strength and he did a good job."

Sheets was also pleased with the work of Brian Throlson, back-up fullback to standout James Bassett. Brian filled in at halfback for injured Jim Conkling and wound up with 42 yards in 11 carries.

Bassett led Wash with 77 yards in 12 carries and Greg Witwer added 76 in 13 tries.

The Warriors wrapped up the verdict early, scoring the first two times they handled the ball.

The first time, Wash marched 62 yards in 12 plays with Matt Fletcher hitting end Craig Collins on an 8-yard pass for the score.

West was unable to move the ball and punted to midfield. The Warriors then hit quickly for a 14-0 lead as Bassett raced 46 yards on the first play and Witwer carried it over on the second.

That's the way it stood until the final quarter when Wash put it out of sight with its final 10 points.

Jeff King set up the third TD as he intercepted a Tom Huber pass and returned to the West 34. The Warriors scored in eight plays, despite a 15 yard penalty.

The big ones were a fourth down pass from Fletcher to Mark Turner for a first down on the 20 and a 14-yard toss to Turner that set up Throlson's tally on the one foot line.

Eric Dickson's interception and return to the West 33 set up the final points.

With Drew Skogman at quarterback, Wash moved to the 10 in seven plays. Then Diethl booted his 27 yard field goal.

MANCHESTER — Marion clinched at least a tie for the Wamac loop crown here Friday night overcoming a stubborn Manchester team 35-13.

The Indians took over top spot alone in the hot race when Anamosa dumped Maquoketa 18-0. Marion has a 6-0 mark. Both the Raiders and Cardinals have 5-1. Marion meets Maquoketa next Friday night.

"We played pretty well to-

night," said Marion Coach Les Dollinger. "We looked good on offense, especially."

Statistics bear him out. The Indians had 311 yards rushing and 47 passing.

"Jon Morris ran well. So did Gary Bolden. Gary came up with big plays for us all night."

Dollinger was pleased with his team's defensive line play. Manchester hurt Marion repeatedly on passes. Clark Tyrrell and Rudy Coleman combined to throw 26 passes, hitting on 12 one for a score.

Marion jumped off to a 14-0 lead in the first period on scores by quarterback Don Wisniewsky with 8:49 in the first and Terry Skilling on an end around for 23 yards with 5:42 left in the stanza.

The Indians made it 21-0 in the second period when Wisniewsky hit fullback Bolden for a 2-yarder with 2:07 left. Marion marched 97 yards for the TD.

Manchester stayed in the game with 30 seconds left in the second quarter on Clark Tyrrell's 5 yard pass to Dick Garrison.

The Indians moved 75 yards with the second half kickoff in 12 plays with Jerry Lancaster smacking in from the one with 6:20 left in the third.

Again Manchester narrowed the gap to 28-13 with 8:02 left in the final period on a 42 yard pass from Coleman to Mark Letts.

Marion hit pay dirt on more time on Morris' 13 yard run with 3:18 left in the game.

The Indians are 7-0 overall and 6-0 in the Wamac. They have two rugged encounters remaining, Maquoketa and then Prairie.

Kennedy Retains Valley Top 24-0

MUSCATINE — There was no looking ahead here Friday night for Mississippi Valley leader Cedar Rapids Kennedy — at least in the first half — as the Cougars methodically thumped Muscatine 24-0.

The victory raised Kennedy's Valley mark to 5-0-1 and protected its slight half-game lead over second-place Dubuque Senior (5-1), a 26-7 winner over Clinton.

It also set the stage for next Friday's crucial contest with city-rival Jefferson (4-2) at Kingston stadium.

There was nothing fancy about Kennedy's triumph Friday night; the Cougars simply pounded and pounded some more until the Muskies gave way in a 21-point second quarter spree.

This all made Kennedy Coach Jerry Mauren quite pleased — especially since his team has lacked offensive consistency of late.

"That first half was beautiful," said Mauren. "I was glad to see us put together those long drives. Our traps were working well, the backs were running hard and the offense line did a good job."

Mauren certainly couldn't overlook his defense, which posted its second straight shut-out (Iowa City West last week).

The league's No. 1 defensive unit limited Muscatine to three first downs and 36 yards total offense in the whole game. At halftime, the Muskies had one first down (on a roughing the kicker penalty) hole total offense.

In the meantime, the Cougars' powerful attack was busily pecking away.

After three unsuccessful series, Kennedy got its running game in gear and traveled 81 yards in 14 plays to take a 7-0 lead on the fifth play of the second quarter. Tailback Tony Baranowski scored the TD on a one-yard slant.

Defensive tackle Craig Cooley recovered a fumble at the Muscatine 34 on the first play after the ensuing kickoff, and in nine plays Kennedy was ahead 14-0. Baranowski again did the honors, crossing the goal for the second time from a yard out.

With a little over two minutes left in the half, the Cougars got the ball again at their own 40 when a Muskie drive stalled.

Quarterback Dave Greenwood then took charge, personally accounting for 56 yards with his passing and running

in a nine-play, 60-yard scoring march.

Only four seconds remained when Greenwood circled left end from four yards out for a 21-0 halftime cushion.

The only scoring in the second half was a 36-yard field goal by Randy Clapp, who also booted the extra point after the touchdowns.

Fullback Roy Rhodes and halfback Larry Covington both enjoyed their best rushing games of the season. Rhodes ground out 81 yards, Covington 78, Baranowski 59 and Greenwood 41 as the balanced attack totaled 301.

So dominant were the Cougars in the first half that they ran 48 plays from scrimmage to Muscatine's 21.

to launch a drive which carried to the Jeff 20 before Louie Villhauer's field goal try sailed wide to the right.

Jefferson didn't fumble after intermission, and its ground attack was awesome.

Yet Iowa City kept striking back, and as Little Hawk Coach Clyde Bean noted, "we were still alive until we lost the on-side kick."

That happened after City high quarterback Greg Cilek had circled right end for 12 yards and a touchdown which narrowed Jefferson's lead to 27-21 with 4:01 left in the game.

Guard Doug Bachman recovered the on-side kick for the J-Hawks on their own 47. Halfback Tim Burke took them to the City high 45. Then quarterback George Niehouse called upon fullback Rick Marsh.

Marsh had already carried 27 times for 123 yards and four short-yardage TDs, and he had also played all the way at middle guard on defense.

But when he popped through the line and saw daylight he still had enough juice left to gallop his 6-5, 215-pound frame to his — and Jefferson's — fifth score.

In all, Jefferson rushed 64 times for 438 yards.

When Niehouse wasn't send-
