# Kennedy Stuns Iowa City; Wash Wins

## Murdock's 75-Yard Return Wins 26-24

IOWA CITY-Mark Murdock doesn't know if he could have jumped any higher. His coach, Jerry Mauren, and a full house at the Iowa City high field know he jumped high enough here

Murdock, with 1:34 left to play, hurdled a would-be tackler at his own 45-yard line, breaking a 75-yard punt return for the winning touchdown.

The run capped a Cedar Rapids Kennedy rally, giving the unranked Cougars a 26-24 victory over Iowa City, rated seventh

in the state. "I'm just happy I didn't lose my balance going over that guy," said Murdock, whose electrifying run ended the scoring, but not the excitement, in the Mississippi Valley test.

"Early in the game we tried to block their punts," said kennedy lowa city Mauren, "but we definitely had the return on at the end. The only thing I was worried about is that Mark might lose his balance after jumping over that




