Badmouths Hawks

● Oh, my! Can't help wondering what the Iowa State athletic department has been feeding Keith Schroeder, the newest member of its football staff.

Keith is the young man from Davenport who was a standout linebacker for the Cyclones last year, making all-Big Eight and leading the way to the Sun Bowl.

Schroeder spoke at the Fort Dodge Lions club last week. Bob Brown, sports editor of the Fort Dodge Messenger, reprinted some of his remarks, which probably are being read with dismay in Ames and anger in Iowa City.

You see, Iowa State athletic officials from Athletic Director Lou McCullough and Coach Johnny Majors on down have made a strong point recently of saying publicly how much they want to get along with the Iowa Hawkeyes.

Oh, there have been a few minor rumbles, but McCullough has emphasized he thinks the cowman and the plowman can be friends. That the lion and the lamb shall lie down together. He and Bump Elliott play golf together. All that buddy-buddy stuff.

"Personally, I don't think Iowa could fight its way out of a paper sack," Brown quoted Schroeder as saying. The new coach said that in reference to the weakness of Oregon State, which Iowa had just defeated.

(Well, it's true Oregon State was far from a good football team, but people who live in tin houses shouldn't throw can-openers. Iowa State's first three victims haven't been barn-burners. In fact, all three were rated among the top 13 teams in Steve Harvey's syndicated "Bottom Ten" feature this week: Colorado State (0-4) No. 1, New Mexico (1-2) No. 12 and Utah (1-2) tied for 13th. In fact, one Iowa red-hot this week observed: "I see the Cyclones have an open date next Saturday, but they may not be able to tell the difference.")

Schroeder also played WHO, which broadcasts Iowa games on radio and has a "Beat the Bear" show on TV.

"They should call it the Ducky Lewis Show," snapped Schroeder, referring to the Iowa aide who is on the show (along with Jackie Sherrill of the I-State staff and Drake Coach Jack Wallace). "Jim Zabel (WHO

sports director) is talking to him all the time."

Schroeder hit the news media again: "This is the only state where one team wins its opener (ISU over Colorado State 41-0) and the other loses (Iowa to Ohio State 21-0) and the loser gets the top headline in the Des Moines Register . . . something like 'Iowa Shines in Defeat.'"

"I grew up in Davenport, dreaming of a chance to play with the Hawkeyes in the Rose Bowl," Schroeder said, "but it didn't work out. . . I can't wait until 1977 when we play Iowa. We'll be ready."

Schroeder also claimed Lauterbur prevented a friend of his on the Iowa staff from giving him a scouting report on the Illinois junior varsity. Iowa lost to the Illinois JVs last week and the Cyclones play them next.

Schroeder went on to say Iowa's program is so bad and in need of rejuvenation they had to use freshmen. "Iowa got some freshmen," he did admit, "some good ones we would have liked to had."

The unkindest cut of all may have been his remarks about the Kinnick stadium AstroTurf of which Iowa is so proud. He said:

"They tried to hire Iowa State engineers to install it, but decided it cost too much and hired one of their own engineers at much less money. They got into trouble on the job and called an Iowa State man who helped, then left with the finishing touches remaining. He told them to remember to keep the green side up."

So don't be surprised if you hear Lou McCullough orders the impetuous young man to stand in the corner this week.

Nab Jabbar on Drug Charges

DENVER, Colo. (AP) — Kareem Abdul Jabbar, 25, and Lucius Allen, 26, two members of the Milwaukee Bucks pro basketball team, were arrested early Friday with two other men and charged with possession of marijuana, Denver police reported.

Sgt. Steve Metrose of the Denver police department's vice and narcotics squad said two uniformed officers stopped a car the four men were in on a routine traffic check. He said suspected narcotics were discovered at that time.

The four were arrested under a law which makes first possession of one half ounce or less of marijuana a misdemeanor.

No bond was set immediately.

Police identified the other two occupants of the car as Stephen Duncan, 23, Columbia, Mo., and Mordecai Cook, 23, of Seattle, Wash. Cook was driving the car owned by Duncan, police said.

Metrose said the arrest was made at 3:30 a.m. in downtown Denver.

The Bucks were in Denver Thursday night for an exhibition game with the Denver Rockets. The Bucks won 130-92.

Jabbar formerly was named Lew Alcindor.

That was the situation Friday night at Kingston stadium as the sixth-ranked Royals put on their "best performance of the season" in handing Kennedy a 26-7 setback.

That boosted their record to 5-0 for the year and handed the

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surprising young Cougars their second defeat in five starts. Their only other loss was to fourth-ranked Cedar Rapids Washington.

"It was our best offensive performance yet," admitted Good, "and our best over-all game."

"Sure I was surprised by the score. That's why we went for two points early and tried a field goal later. I figured it might be a one- or two-point game."

Dejected Jerry Mauren, whose Cougars have been the biggest surprise so far in the Mississippi Valley conference race, didn't think an early scoring strike by his club produced any letdown.

"They're just a very fine football team."

The Cougars had taken a 7-0 lead with just 1:26 gone in the game when Mark Murdock raced 74 yards with a 41-yard punt by Steve Griffin.

But, from that point on, it was all Regis.

The winners cut it to 7-6 just 2:26 later when Jeff Purdy hit end Barry Todd on an 18-yard scoring strike, and took the lead for good with 3:21 left in the half on a six-yard run by Bob Beals.

An unusual series of events helped set up the go-ahead score and may have been a big factor in the remainder of the game.

Kennedy's Rocky Woods punted a ball that just barely bounced into the end zone. But the Cougars were penalized 15 yards on the play for "illegally batting a ball."

Regis' John Sramek then

blocked a second punt attempt and the Royals took over on the Kennedy 23 and marched for the TD in just three plays.

The Royals dominated the second half, scoring on Bill Corrigan's 22-yard run in the third and Pat Shimon's one-yard smash with 6:37 to go. They got to the Kennedy one late in the game before bogging down.

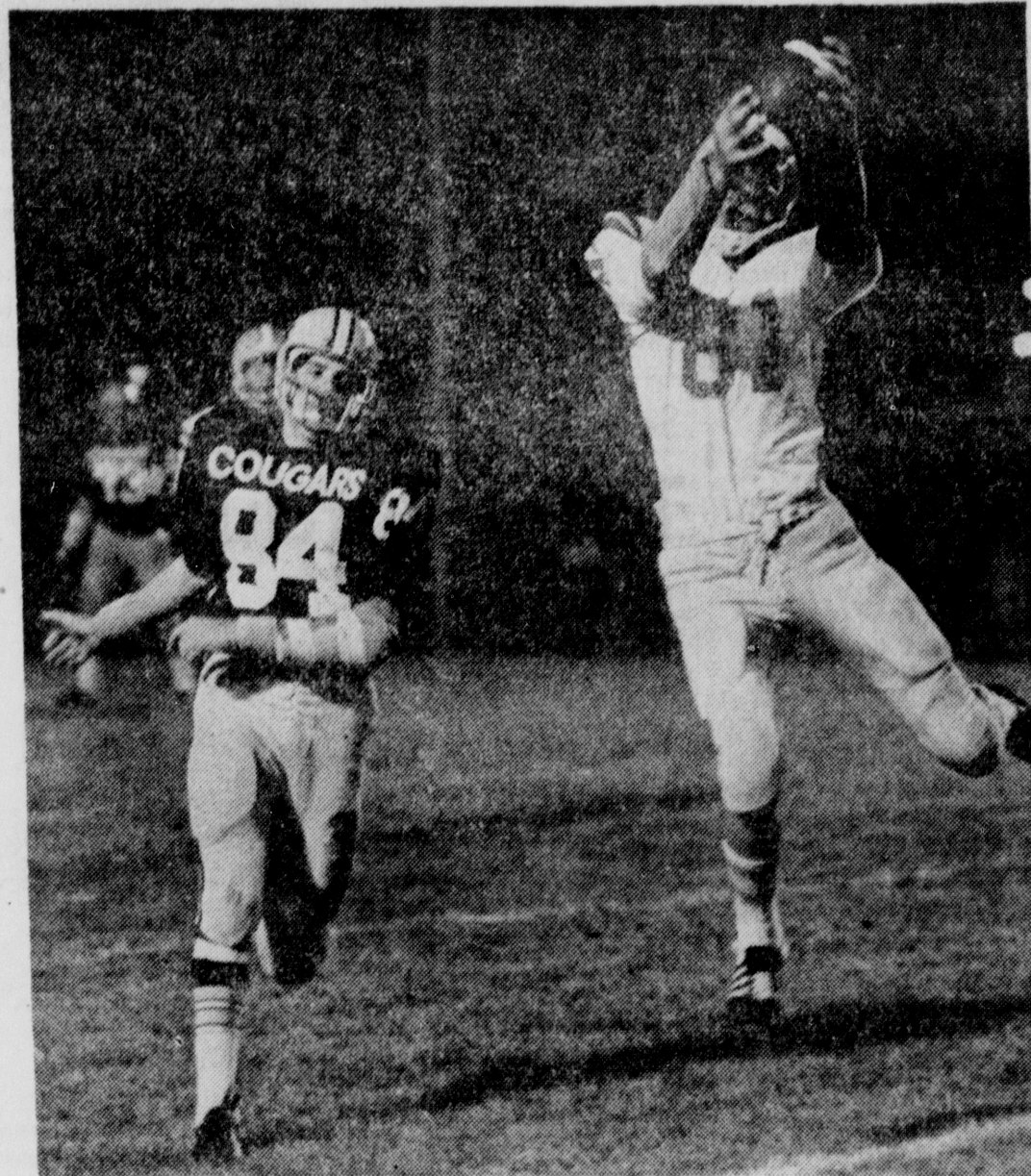
The rugged Regis defense limited Kennedy to just 24 net yards on the ground and 37 more in the air.

The alert defenders also pounced on three Cougar fumbles and intercepted one of 13 Kennedy passes.

Fumbles set up two of the Regis touchdown drives, but the big march may have come after

Kennedy bogged down on the Regis 24 midway in the third quarter.

The Royals took over and went 76 yards in 13 plays with Corrigan breaking loose over the Royals' right side for 22 yards and the score that made it 18-6. Purdy then hit Tim Trcka in the end zone for the winners' only conversion.

Hawkeyes Face Purdue, Honor Nile Kinnick

The University of Iowa will turn back the calendar 33 years Saturday to dedicate its football stadium in honor of its only Heisman trophy winner.

Nile Clark Kinnick, jr., who

led the Hawkeye Iron Men to an amazing 6-1-1 record in 1939, will be the official name of the 60,000-seat stadium as Iowa's 1972 team faces Purdue at 1:30 p.m.

A crowd of 55,000 is expected to be on hand to see if Iowa

can throw off the yoke of 11 straight losses to the Boilermakers, who are slight favorites despite losing eight games in a row (five last year and three in 1972).

While Iowa plans no halftime observance of the Nile Kinnick

stadium dedication, officials say a brief ceremony will be held before the contest. At 1:15 p.m. the father of "the Cornbelt Comet", Nile Kinnick, sr., will be introduced.

Purdue has been plagued by injuries in losing to Bowling Green 17-14, Washington 22-21 and powerful Notre Dame 35-14.

"I don't have to see the film of last Saturday's game to know what we did right," growled Purdue Coach Bobby DeMoss. "I can't forget those stupid mistakes early in the game that gave Notre Dame momentum. Some of our veteran people played their worst game both mentally and physically. Our play selection wasn't sparkling either."

"Iowa is a vastly improved team over the one we beat last year and we're going to have to play them nose to nose. We need a victory right now, and the fact it's the Big Ten opener for us makes it doubly important."

Iowa must stop Purdue's wish-bone-T attack, led by QB Gary Danielson and starring halfback Otis Armstrong.

"It's no disgrace for Purdue to lose to Notre Dame," suggested Iowa Coach Frank Lau-

terbur. "Notre Dame is going to beat a lot of people. . . . Purdue has excellent personnel, a big defensive team that probably is going to make us throw the ball more than we have."

FXL says Iowa needs a real win far more than another "moral victory." Last year Iowa lost to Ohio State, Penn State and Oregon State by a combined margin of 129-54 and

was outgained 1,459-680. This year the Hawks have lost to the same three 46-29 and have gained more yardage, 847-762.

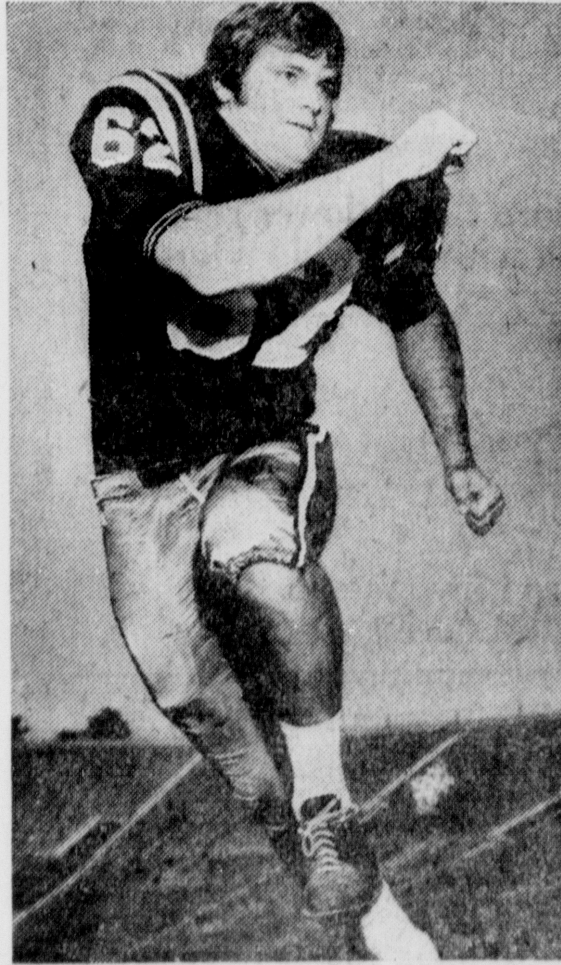
The Wash-Jeff test highlights another busy weekend for Metro area preps.
