DUBUQUE — Cedar Rapids Jefferson had its defensive pride wounded slightly here Friday night by Dubuque's air game, but the No. 2 rated J-Hawks put on a powerful offensive display to overrun Senior high, 41-8.

Jeff also had to come from behind for the first time this season as it boosted its unbeaten mark to 6-0 and its league-leading record in the Mississippi Valley conference to 5-0.

The J-Hawks fell behind 8-7 early in the second quarter when Dubuque's Ben Richardson connected on a 79-yard scoring strike to Tom McLaughlin for a touchdown, and then hit end Dave Every with a 2-point pass conversion after faking a kick.

The long TD pass cut into Jeff's Valley defense lead, but it also turned the J-Hawks on.

They stormed back with an 80-yard, 13-play touchdown drive with Jim Dulin going the final 12 on a pass from Craig

Wilford to regain the lead at 14-8, and it was all Jeff the rest of the way.

Dulin wound up with three touchdowns, his others coming on a 35-yard run and a 22-yard pass from Wilford.

Marty Hale also scored three times, on runs of one and seven yards and on a 37-yard pass from Wilford.

Jeff Coach Jack Fisk had much to be pleased about, but he also had a few worries.

"Wilford did a fine job passing (8 for 13)," he admitted. "But I don't think our performance compared with the way we played against Wash last week, even though we bounced back with a lot of yardage."

He was most concerned with the fact that Dubuque's Richardson completed 11 of 22 attempts for 195 yards in the air.

"We get Iowa City next week, and they can really throw the ball. You'd better believe we'll spend a lot of time on pass defense this week."

Actually, Jeff's pass defense was more than adequate most of the way. The J-Hawks did let McLaughlin, who transferred to Senior two weeks ago from Hempstead, get behind on the 69-yard second quarter bomb.

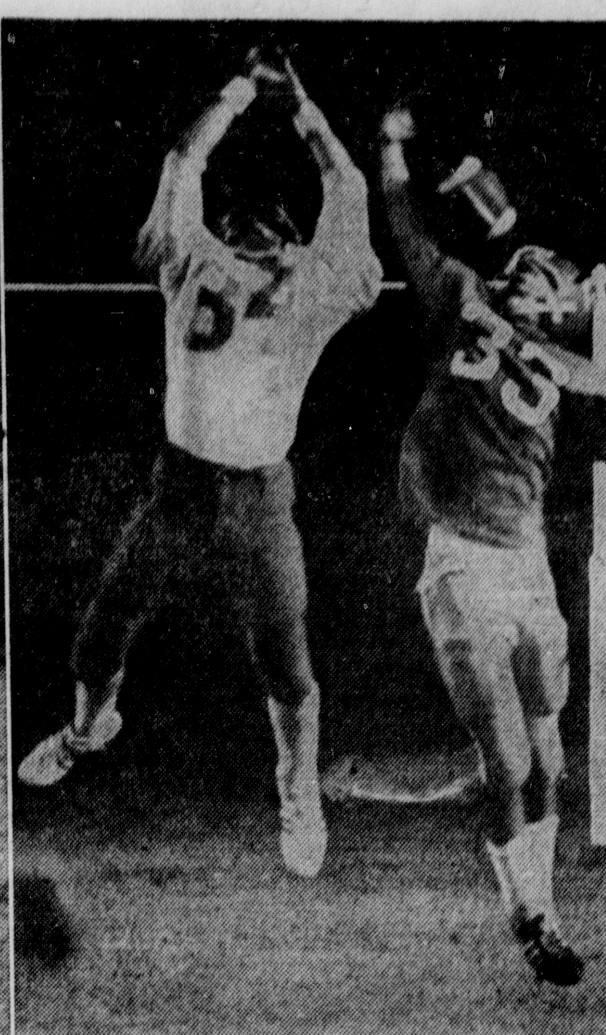
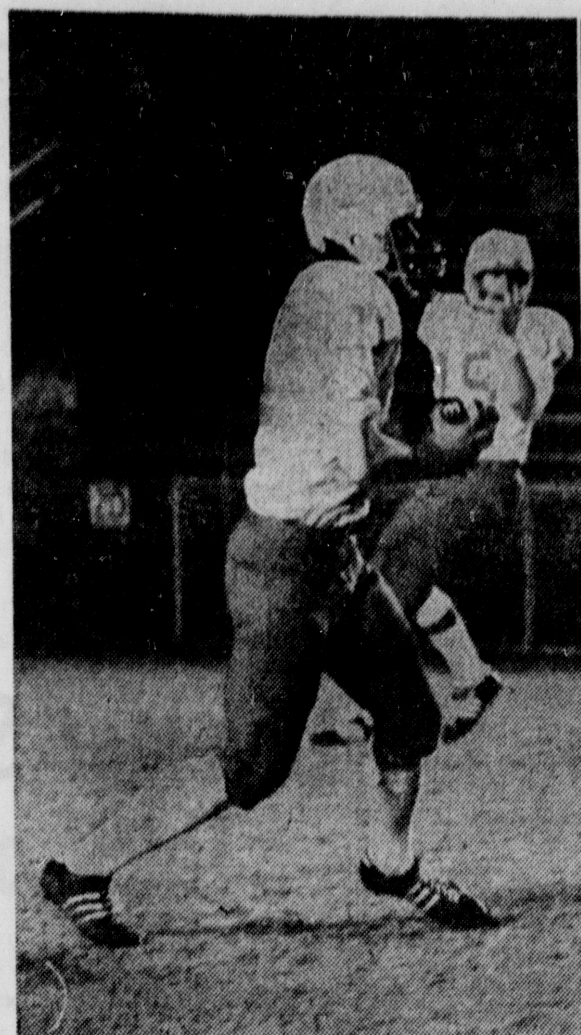
And they gave the Rams some short passes late in the first half as they protected a 21-8 lead. But the big Jeff front line also dumped Richardson for five losses to totaling 41 yards that helped hold the losers to a net of only 57 yards on the ground.

Jeff broke in front on a 5-play, 20 yard drive after a Dubuque fumble early in the second period and the Rams struck back on its first play from scrimmage to their brief 8-7 lead.

After marching 80 yards for the go-ahead score, the J-Hawks came back with a Wilford to Dulin scoring pass less than two minutes later after Thad Miller intercepted a Richardson pass.

The J-Hawks took the second half kickoff on its own 37 and went 63 yards in just four plays as Dulin raced over from 26 yards out to make it 28-8. Late in the same quarter, another interception launched a 58-yard drive in 12 plays with Hale going seven for the score.

The last TD came on a 76-yard march in just five plays, with Wilford passing to Hale for the final 23.

Confusion Surrounds Winning Extra Point

Down 14-0, Prairie Rallies 15-14

Whatever it was Prairie high football Coach Chuck Dostal told his team at halftime of Friday's game against LaSalle, he ought to bottle and patent.

The Hawks, after being totally monopolized by the fired up Lancers the first half, roared back in the final half to edge LaSalle, 15-14, in an exciting East Central Iowa conference clash at Prairie.

The Hawks are now 3-0 in the conference (5-1 over-all) and tied with Linn-Mar for the league lead. LaSalle dipped to 1-3 in loop play and 3-3 overall. In the team series, Prairie now leads 4-2.

Badly outplayed and trailing 14-0 at intermission, Prairie mounted a devastating ground attack in the second half and finally shut off LaSalle's potent ground game.

"We were a different football team in the second half," said a relieved Dostal after the game. "It was all mental."

"Our series with LaSalle is equivalent to the Wash-Jeff series," Dostal went on. "People get up for us."

"We didn't do anything different in the second half, we just went right at 'em. Actually, I didn't do much talking at halftime — I let my assistants do the talking for me."

game on a nine-play, 55-yard drive capped by quarterback Gary Pegump's one-yard dive with 6:39 left in the third quarter. Tom Wilson's run for two points sliced the LaSalle lead to 14-8.

Prairie scored the winning points with 7:28 left in the last quarter. With tailback Tim Kay and fullback Mark Sheely going out huge chunks of yardage, the Hawks moved 58 yards in seven plays, Kay going the final seven to tie the score, 14-14.

Lynn Novotny, who kicked the deciding point in Prairie's favor last week in an overtime victory

over Dyersville, then came in to try for the clincher against LaSalle.

The timing on the play was bad, though, and the kick sailed far to the right. A flag was dropped, however, and confusion on all parts ensued.

Prairie was penalized five yards for illegal procedure, but LaSalle was never given the option to decline the penalty. Instead, the referees simply moved the ball back to the eight and gave Novotny a second chance, which he made good on.

"There were a few inadvertent calls out there," said LaSalle Coach Jon Meskimen. "That's all I have to say about the officiating."

Dostal likewise did not understand the ruling, and the officials were not available for comment after the game.

Meskimen was well-pleased with his team's effort, and said, "We showed a lot of people to

night that we play tough football. Our kids were super."

"We let up a little in the second quarter, but they didn't score then."

"We knew Prairie would be tough, and they were just that the second half."

LaSalle scored early in the first quarter on a 33-yard scamper by halfback Steve Ritchart. Moments earlier, he had a 51-yard touchdown run nullified by a penalty.

Ritchart also ran for the two-point conversion, and was in the end zone again minutes later after a four-yard run culminating a grinding 90-yard drive which took 14 plays.

Operating out of the Power-I, Ritchart led all ground-gainers with 155 yards on 23 carries while teammate Kevin Sippy had 56 on nine tries.

Kay carried 18 times for 122 yards, 121 of them in the second half. Sheely bulled his way for an even 100 yards on 19 attempts.

Kennedy Stunned by West 6-3

IOWA CITY — Cedar Rapids Kennedy was upset 6-3 as Iowa City West drove 85 yards to score in the fourth quarter Friday night.

The win was the first of the

year for West. Kennedy now has a 3-2 Mississippi Valley conference record and is 3-3 over-all.

West's touchdown came with 1:56 left in the game on a nine-yard pass from Tom Huber to John Waite. John Kaebler's extra point kick was wide.

Kennedy's attempts at a comeback failed when an offensive pass interference call on Rocky Woods gave it fourth and 23 on the Kennedy 26-yard line. A fake punt play with Woods passing failed with 47 seconds left. West took over and ran out the clock.

Cougar Coach Jerry Mauren refused to talk to reporters after the game saying, "I have nothing to say to anybody."

Kennedy scored in the second quarter on a 28-yard field goal by Randy Clapp.

Mark DeSotel had intercepted a Trojan pass at Kennedy's 10-yard line and returned it 30 yards to the 40.

After two running plays moved the ball across mid-field, West coach Don Lamm complained bitterly about a quick whistle on a fumble. Two 15-yard penalties on the West bench moved the ball to the 14-yard line.

But West's defense stiffened and Clapp kicked his field goal with 6:45 left in the half.

Later in the quarter DeSotel intercepted another West pass and returned it nine yards to the Trojan 26. West again held and Clapp's 40-yard field goal

attempted with a minute left in the half was short.

Kennedy couldn't get its offense in gear all night, although the Trojan defense ranks at the conference bottom statistically.

West held one of the loop's leading rushers, Larry Covington, to just 38 yards in 15 carries.

Covington was the only Cougar rusher in the second half with seven carries for 11 yards.
