

# Reds Like the Sunshine, Tee Off on A's Pitching, 5-4

CINCINNATI (AP) — A baseball game in bright sunshine can really open your eyes. Look what it did for Bobby Tolan and the rest of the Cincinnati Reds.

"It's better hitting the ball here in the daytime," said Tolan after driving in two runs to help the Reds beat the Oakland A's 5-4 in the fifth game of the World Series Friday at the Sun-flooded Oakland Coliseum.

The Reds, who had trouble hitting in the twilight in two previous games at Oakland, cut the A's margin in the series to 3-2 with their biggest run production so far.

Friday's afternoon game was made possible by an earlier rainout this week. The teams moved back to Cincinnati today for game No. 6 at Riverfront Stadium.

Others, Too  
Apparently some of the other Reds felt right at home in an afternoon game, too. Pete Rose hit Jim "catfish" Hunter's first pitch for a home run and Denis Menke drilled another one into the seats three innings later.

The circuit shots were the first for Cincinnati in this best-of-seven-game classic.

"At Cincinnati, we hit the

ball at everybody," said Tolan, referring to the first two low-scoring games of the series which the Reds lost. "Today, we hit like we were supposed to."

Hunter, who allowed just one run for the Reds in eight innings while winning game No. 2, had an idea that things weren't going to be the same Friday.

The A's 21-game winner had a 4-2 lead going into the fifth inning, but had to leave after Tolan knocked in the Reds' third run with a single. Rollie Fingers, who has pitched in every series game thus far, shut off the Reds' threat then but later gave up the tying run on another base hit by Tolan in the eighth and the winning run on Rose's single in the ninth.

**Rose Happy**  
"I was glad that I finally got some wood on the ball," said Rose. "I had been hitting lousy."

Rose had delivered only one hit in 15 at bats before going 3-for-5 Friday. He also had a single in the third inning.

"I was so happy about today," said the fiery Rose, who also made some spectacular plays in left field.

The Reds appeared on the brink of elimination after Gene

Tenace's three-run homer in the second inning gave the A's a 3-1 lead.

The capacity crowd of 49,410 gave Tenace a standing ovation as he crossed home plate after putting one over the left field fence off Cincinnati starter Jim McGlothlin. Mike Epstein walked and George Hendrick singled prior to the wallop, Tenace's fourth of the series.

history have belted four in a World Series—Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig, Duke Snider and Hank Bauer. No player has hit five homers in a series.

"Rose's home run in the first inning did a lot for our dugout until Tenace hit that three-run shot," said Cincinnati Manager Sparky Anderson.

But the Reds' dugout came to life again—and the partisan crowd quieted down—when the National League champions cut the Oakland lead to 3-2 on Menke's home run down the left field line.

Gonzalo Marquez, who tied a World Series record for pinch hits with three, gave the home team a 4-2 edge with a run-scoring single in the fourth.

Joe Morgan, Tolan and Rose—three players who hadn't done much in this series—then proved the undoing of the American League champions.

Morgan walked with two out in the fifth inning and came all the way home after getting a big jump when Tolan drilled a line-drive single to right-center.

Morgan's speed also paid off again in the eighth when he walked, stole second and roared home to tie the contest 4-4 on Tolan's base hit.

IOWA CITY — Cedar Rapids Washington went to the air on 49 percent of its offensive plays on a cold, wet and windy night here Friday to post a 21-0 victory over Iowa City West.

The victory gives ninth-rated Wash a 6-1 overall record and a 5-1 Mississippi Valley conference mark. West, which upset C.R. Kennedy a week ago, suffered its sixth loss in seven games.

"It's tough to get up for a 1-5 ball club," said Warrior coach Wally Sheets following the game. "I think we played well enough to win and that's about it."

"The reason we went with the pass is that it seemed to us West was more or less giving it to us," Sheets said. "Matt Fletcher and Mark Turner both did a fine job with the passes."

"I was also pleased with the defense," said Sheets. "They came up with some good work." Fletcher completed 15 of 33 aeriels for 197 yards. Turner was on the receiving end of eight passes for 112 yards and a touchdown with no seconds remaining on the clock.

But it wasn't until the second period, when Wash had the wind for the first time, that the passing game made any headway. In a scoreless first quarter, Fletcher put the ball in the air five times for two completions and 12 yards.

In the second period, however, after each team had punted three times, Fletcher hit Brad Nau with a 20-yard toss for Wash's initial first down.

The pass got a 69-yard touchdown drive in nine plays started.

Fletcher hit three passes for 57 yards before carrying the ball in from the one. Turner hauled in two of the aeriels for 37 yards.

Wash scored its second TD in the third period, covering 35 yards on nine rushes and a pass. Nau scored from the one for a 14-0 Warrior lead.

Turner gave Wash the ball with an interception and then caught the lone pass of the drive on a third and 10 situation at the West 11.

The final touchdown, a five-yard pass to Turner at the end of the contest, came on a 71-yard march in 13 plays and was all Turner.

The Warrior end held on to four of Fletcher's passes to eat up 55 of the 71 yards.

The Wash defense was equally impressive as the passing game.

## 'New Look' Cougars Shine 17-13

Kennedy's "new-look" offense, sometimes with three quarterbacks operating together, made an impressive debut Friday night at Kingston stadium.

The Cougars managed only a narrow 17-13 win over Muscatine, but they produced by far their biggest offensive show of the season as they piled up 19 first downs, 236 yards rushing and 71 more in passes.

"I think it worked out real

well," admitted Coach Jerry Mauren, in discussing lineup shifts that moved junior Dave Bennett into a starting quarterback role, made quarterback Mark Murdock a running back, and had the club's other quarterback, Chuck Van Hoeck, alternating at fullback with Dan Clafin.

"We have averaged only 161 yards a game on offense for the year," he explained, "and we've been around 60 for the past couple of weeks."

"It's a good thing that we made the switch, too. They (Muscatine) had Larry Covington defended real well."

Murdock was the key. The former quarterback turned running back, carried the ball 19

Regina next week would leave both teams 4-0 entering their season-finales showdown in two weeks.

"Common sense told me all week we were three touchdowns better than LaSalle," L-M Coach Paul Carney revealed after the game. "Yet I sweated it out all the way, and I'm still surprised at the final score."

"This was definitely our best effort of the season. We're doing things at Linn-Mar that have never been done before."

"Tonight we executed very well, and our backs all did good jobs," Carney continued. "As for Prairie, we think we're as good as them, and the conference statistics indicate—at least on paper—that we're better."

The Lions needed exactly one play from scrimmage Friday to forge into the lead. After Glen Colton returned the opening kickoff to his own 35, Mike Johnson took a pitchout around the left side, broke a couple of tackles and was gone on a 65-yard touchdown jaunt.

The Lions struck suddenly twice more the first half in opening a 21-0 lead at intermission.

After a short LaSalle punt, L-M went 38 yards in four plays for its second touchdown with 5:45 left in the half. Jeff Schaeffer went the final 10 off right tackle.

Then, with only 1:24 left in the half, Keith Tharp lofted a perfect pitch to Wayne Windenburg for a 45-yard TD play.

Colton, the game's leading rusher with 97 yards on 17 carries, scored L-M's final two touchdowns on runs of 7 and 11 yards as the Lion offensive line started ripping apart the LaSalle defense.

The Lancers broke L-M's shut-out with 6:37 left in the game on a 16-yard screen pass from sophomore quarterback Steve Plotz to Steve Ritchart.

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
