Jefferson high maintained its hold on a share of first place in the Mississippi Valley conference football race Friday night with a stunning 21-20 double-overtime victory over Kennedy at Kingston stadium.

The heart-stopping win before a crowd of about 6,000 put Jeff's league record at 2-0, the same as Iowa City high, and left winning coach Jack Fisk in awe.

"That was some experience!" offered Fisk, whose J-Hawks were involved in an overtime for the first time. "That's really an exciting way to win."

"What is fantastic is that both teams scored so easily after the regulation game was so tight."

The "regular" game was 7-7. Jeff, which trailed for three quarters, tied it in the fourth period, then missed an opportunity for early victory when an 18-yard field goal attempt failed with only three seconds remaining.

The high school overtime rule allows each team four downs in which to score from 10 yards out and the J-Hawks didn't jack around when it was their calling.

They scored on first down in both overtimes. Bruce Feuerhelm got the first touchdown on a sweep around the left side and Randy Jacobson tallied the second over right tackle.

Fred Stoeker kicked the extra points for the margin of victory.

Kennedy, which held every statistical advantage except for the final score, countered in the overtimes with Jud Coleman firing scoring strikes of 14 yards to Ken Kramer and 17 yards to Rocky Dales.

They were in second- and third-down situations, respectively.

Chuck Johnson booted the first point-after, but his second was wide to the right and that was it.

It was the second straight 21-20 loss for Kennedy and left coach Jerry Mauren at a loss for words. "I feel like a rag," he sighed.

"I don't know what to say about our defense in the overtimes. Instead of playing our techniques, we were standing up and looking for the ball. Jeff just blew us out."

Fumbles proved costly to the Cougars. Twice in regulation they drove inside the Jeff 10, only to lose the ball on bobbles. Jeff also came up with a fine goal-line stand to stop Kennedy on downs at the seven midway through the third quarter.

Temper flared during one play in that series and Kennedy's Bob Ellis and Kevin Murray and Jeff's Mike Sojka were ejected.

"We were our own worst enemy at times, but our mental outlook took a complete turnaround from the fourth quarter on," said Fisk. "We just came alive."

Kennedy's Dave Draxton led all ground gainers with 70 yards in 20 carries. Jacobson was Jeff's best with 57 yards in 12 tries.

Mick Bertelli got Kennedy's first TD on a 20-yard scamper, while Stoeker scored Jeff's on a two-yard run.

Ironically, Jeff's only defeat this season was by the same 21-20 score, to non-conference foe Davenport West. Kennedy now is 1-2 in the conference.

Jeff now holds a whopping 8-0 edge in the series.

Regis Hits Quick, Enjoys 48-0 Blitz

EPWORTH — Cedar Rapids Regis blitzed Western Dubuque for 35 first-quarter points and went on to claim its third football victory of the season, 48-0, here Friday night.

Halfback Kurt Downey got the Royals off to a rolling start on the opening play of the game with a 50-yard jaunt to paydirt, Dave Marshall's first of six extra points was good to give Regis an early 7-0 lead.

Downey's second touchdown of the contest came on Dubuque's first series of downs. He snared a stray Dubuque pass on the 20-yard line and scampered into the end zone untouched. Marshall's kick made it 14-0.

took the handoff from quarterback Tom Fagan and scampered 31 yards to a first down at midfield.

After Downey was thrown for a one-yard loss, Fagan hit end Pat Quinn with a 51-yard touchdown aerial that put the Royals out in front 21-0, after Marshall's third kick.

Regis wasted no time in upping the count to 28-0 on the next series of downs with Kevin Kregel scoring from

seven yards out. Fagan's 30-yard pass to Quinn set up the score.

With seconds remaining in the initial stanza, Quinn intercepted an errant Dubuque pass and ran 47 yards to the West 25 yard line. Two plays later Dave Brost tallied from the eight to cap Regis' first-period scoring.

Regis coach Tom Good pulled his starters after the high-scoring first quarter. Brost tallied his second touchdown of the game on a two-yard run in the second period. The Royals capped their scoring when reserve Marty Stanley plunged over from the one in the third quarter.

Regis ground out 236 yards in the contest, with Downey claiming game honors with 51 yards in three carries. Regis now prepares for next Thursday's match-up with city rival Prairie.

Benton Community Bows 31-14

Sioway Sparks Prairie

VAN HORNE — Cedar Rapids Prairie sported an explosive rushing attack in grinding out 241 yards and 13 first downs on the ground in whipping Benton Community 31-14 in an East Central Iowa conference football game Friday night.

The Hawks were sparked by the running of Rob Sioway, who picked up 98 yards in 10 carries, to up their record to 3-0. Benton dropped to 1-2.

Sioway had jaunts of 37 and 27 yards and his 37-yard in the second period paved the way for a 21-point first half.

Terry Feye, senior flanker, opened the Hawk scoring with an 18-yard interception return with :25 left in the initial frame.

Prairie got the ball on its own 37 after a magnificent 59-yard punt by Benton's Bill Wilson and quarterback Jim Ross engineered his mates to a 9-play, 63-yard drive.

Sioway's run of 27 yards put Prairie on the Benton 15 from where Ross served up an aerial to Feye, who made a one-handed TD catch with 4:06 left in the half.
