The "Milton Turner Express" keeps rolling and it couldn't make Washington high coach Wally Sheets happier.

But the veteran Wash grid boss had other reasons for delight Friday night after watching his Warriors smash defensive-minded Clinton 41-7 at Kingston stadium.

"We've experienced some problems with our passing game and it really was causing us some concern," admitted Sheets, "But Craig (Roalson) threw the ball very well tonight and our receivers were really getting open."

The addition of the new-found passing attack and a wishbone running game that Sheets feels is increasing in effectiveness each week, was too much for the River Kings league-leading Mississippi Valley defensive unit.

The Warriors riddled Clinton with ease from the very outset and it was Turner and fullback Steve Blood who provided the bulk of the work.

"The line is starting to pick up the blocking necessary in our offense and that as much as anything was the reason we ran so well," offered Sheets, who handed his old pupil at Wash, Dick Olin, his fourth straight loss in head-to-head competition.

"Our line must be able to read the defensive alignments very quickly and I don't think we were doing that very well until the last two games."

Turner ran up 140 yards in 13 carries and electrified the crowd with a 50-yard dash to paydirt with 4:24 left in the second quarter.

Caught up in traffic at the line of scrimmage, the fleet 165-pounder shook loose from several tackles and bolted to the end zone.

That TD came just seconds after it took Clinton 15 plays and seven minutes to score its only touchdown on a 68-yard march. Center Bill Cunningham tallied the score when he recovered a fumble by Jeff Lind in the end zone.

Wash's Roalson and Gary Fries outpitched Valley passing leader Jeff Truninger 109-101 and it was Curt Milroy who did most of the catching. The big end nabbed four for 32 yards.

Turner tallied Wash's first TD and Steve Blood, who didn't play in the second half, also scored twice.

Sheets used the second and third units throughout most of the second half and Brad Arenz went nine yards for the final score.

Roalson capped his best night of the year passing when he arched a 14-yard scoring strike to Bill Davis with just 21 seconds left in the first half, making the score 34-7.

Sheets also lauded his defensive unit. And well he should.

Clinton managed only 33 yards rushing, all by Dan Quick. Oddly enough, with Truninger losing nine after a sack and Lind and Williams picking up nine, Quick's individual total wound up as the team total.

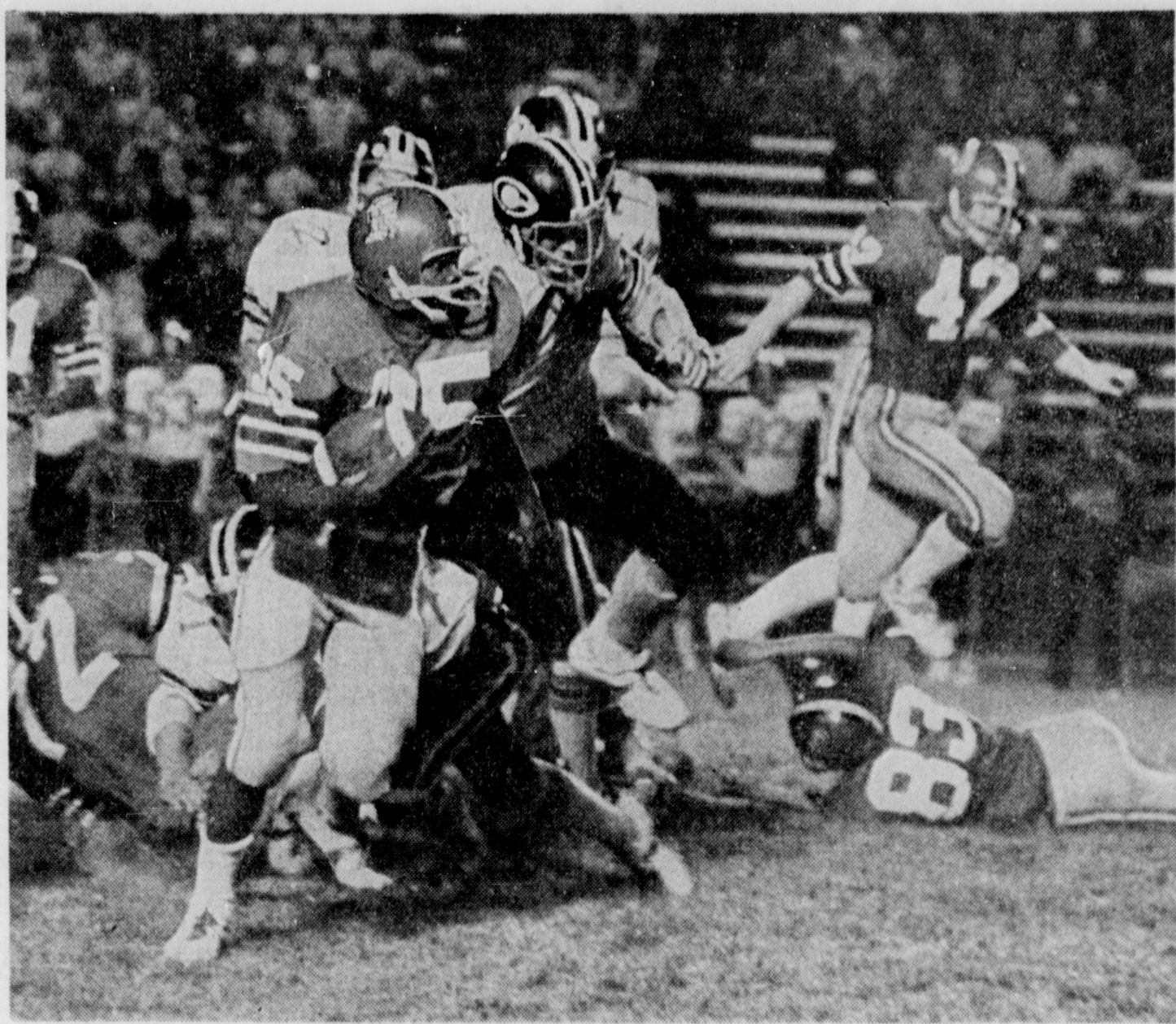

Linn-Mar jolted Dyersville Beckman with a devastating 16-point third quarter as the Lions edged their East Central Iowa conference counterparts 22-19 in a struggle of unbeaten high school football teams Friday.

The victory enabled Linn-Mar to vault alone into the top spot in the loop with a 2-0 mark. The Lions are 4-0 overall while Beckman dropped to 1-1 in the ECIC and 3-1 in all games.

There was no doubt in the eyes of the respective coaches, Arnold McCoy (L-M) and Tom Shea (Beckman), that the big Lion third frame was the difference.

"We've had trouble getting going in the third quarter of previous games and tonight was the same story," explained Shea. "We came out of the locker room for the second half stale and

Linn-Mar took it to us, that's all," he continued.

"Our club knew we had to come out the second half and play our utmost and that's exactly what we did, especially the interior offensive linemen," McCoy revealed.

Beckman took the opening kickoff from their own 45-yard line and marched the length of the field in 10 plays capped by quarterback Jude Milbert's one-yard plunge with 7:45 remaining

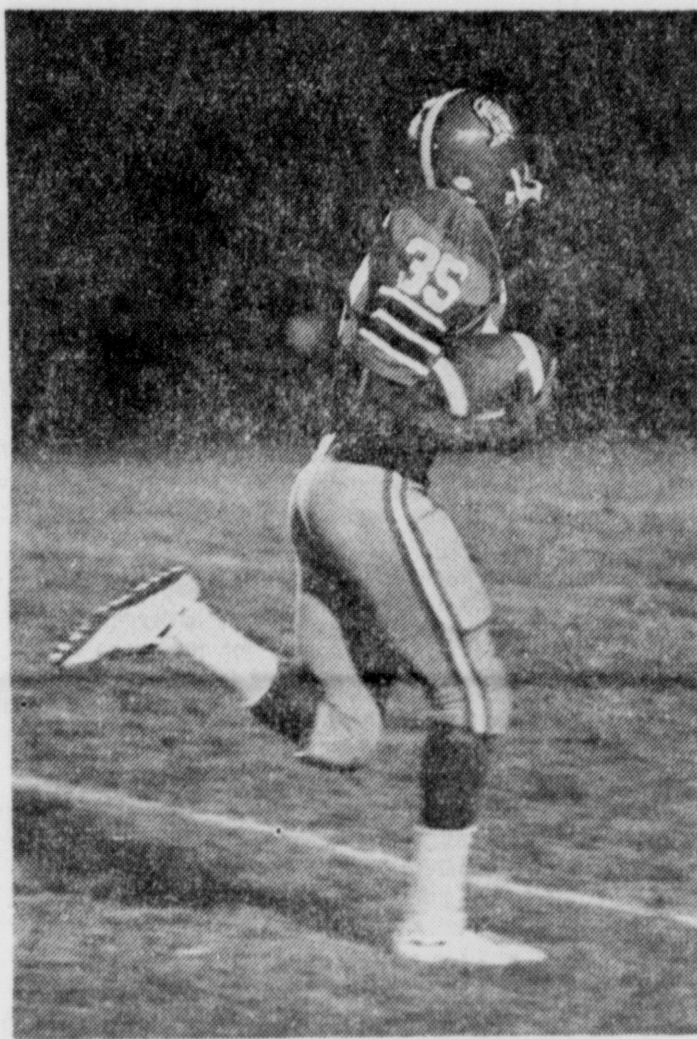

DUBUQUE — Cedar Rapids Jefferson, thanks to an assist from Iowa City West, is all alone in the driver's seat of the Mississippi Valley conference football race.

Jeff delivered a rather methodical 31-0 thrashing to Dubuque Senior Friday night and upped its unbeaten Valley record to 3-0.

But Iowa City high, the co-leader going into Friday's action, got stung by city-rival West and dropped into a tie for fourth place with Bettendorf at 2-1. C.R. Washington and Dubuque Hempstead now share second with 3-1 marks.

Jeff meets Washington next Friday. Enough said.

Friday night Jeff's defense sparkled, as the final score indicates. Senior, which was coming off a win at Clinton, was limited to a paltry 82 yards by the J-Hawk defenders.

"I'd need to see the game film to be able to single out any individuals on defense," said Jeff coach Jack Fisk, "but it was obvious our pass defense did a good job."

"We figured Senior would be a lot tougher after getting that win. And they were tougher on defense."

The J-Hawks didn't have an awesome yardage total, collecting only 237 yards. That included 175 on the ground. Field position was the key.

Only two of Jeff's five scoring drives were over 48 yards. One of those—66 yards—resulted in a 25-yard field goal by quarterback Fred Stoeker to cap the scoring.

The other was a 76-yard march with the second-half kickoff and was climaxed by Randy Johnson's five-yard dash into the end zone.

The rest of Jeff's starting backfield, Bruce Feuerhelm and Bob Jenkins, accounted for the other three TDs. Feuerhelm hit paydirt twice on runs of two and 12 yards, respectively, while Jenkins banged across from a yard out.

Jacobson, who carried only once in the first half, finished with 10 carries for 77 yards to lead all rushers. Feuerbach was the workhorse with 20 shots for 68 yards and Jenkins had 10 for 50.

"I thought our running game looked better, for the most part," said Fisk.

Stoeker's passing wasn't all that bad, either. Fred completed five of nine for 57 yards. Plus he kicked all four conversions, in addition to the field goal.

Jeff's over-all mark is 3-1, the lone loss coming by a single point to top-ranked Davenport West.
