

Kennedy Attack in High Gear, Grinds Down I.C. West

Bertelli, Johnson Set Pace

For a guy who was on the doubtful list before game time, Mick Bertelli did quite a job for Kennedy Friday night at Kingston stadium as the Cougars scored an exciting 35-27 football victory over Iowa City West.

"We really didn't think Bertelli would be able to play," explained a pleased Kennedy coach, Jerry Maurer, "but we are sure glad he did."

"It was his best night of running for the year."

Bertelli, strangely, never scored in a game that produced 62 points, but he rushed for 106 yards in 18 carries and was a key performer for the Cougars as they had a 184-73 edge in rushing.

pense-filled Mississippi Valley test as he completed 20 of 30 attempts, two for touchdowns, and also ran four yards for a West TD.

But Kennedy quarterback Chuck Johnson was a key figure, too.

He tried only nine passes, but completed five for 92 yards, one for a TD to Rocky Dales. He ran two and seven yards for two more scores and successfully booted five extra points.

West got off to a 6-0 lead on a five-yard run by Jack Anderson, but Kennedy dominated the first half and had a 14-12 halftime advantage.

It looked routine for a while as Dennis Baskerville scored from 11 yards out to put Kennedy ahead 21-12 in the third quarter, but West cut that to 21-18 when Allen raced in from the four with just seconds gone in the fourth quarter.

The Cougars again took charge and marched to a 28-19 lead with 4:24 left in the game as Mark Alexander tallied from the seven.

Then Johnson ran in from the two for a 35-19 lead with just two minutes left.

But West came right back to trim that margin to 35-27 on an Allen to Dave Osborne pass for the final 35-27 margin.

John Hadl Is Enthusiastic

Hadl, who was traded Tuesday by the Rams for five high draft choices, reported despite the fact the contract was not renegotiated.

Prairie's high defensive unit limited Iowa City Regina to 58 yards total offense, including a minus six yards in the second half in a 12-0 Hawk Dad's Night victory Friday night.

The win put Prairie at 3-1 in the East Central Iowa conference race while Regina dropped to 1-4 in the loop.

Regina quarterback Jack Thoman was sacked by Prairie defenders on five occasions resulting in a minus 54 yards, accounting for the low count of total offense.

The Regals, however, did win one trivial part of the encounter, that of the punting game. The two teams exchanged punts 16 times and

night of year, free-wheeling for 124 yards in ten carries. He also scored on runs of 12 and 9 yards.

Quarterback Von Hollingsworth connected on five of eight passes for 142 yards, including a toss to Brad Reid that Reid made a diving catch on to set a third quarter TD.

Again, neither squad moved the pigskin well in a scoreless third quarter, but both clubs had scoring opportunities in the fourth, with Prairie the one to capitalize.

The Hawks got good field position on the Regina 47 and eight plays later, Ross scored his second six-pointer, this time from nine yards out with 8:11 remaining. Back Chris Reed's 14-yard burst was the big play in the march.

Regina's best scoring chance all evening came with 4:33 left when Jim Wagner recovered a Sirowy fumble on the Hawk 29.

However, after two incomplete passes, a holding penalty totaling 23 yards set the Regals back on their own 48 and out of scoring range on fourth down.

The Hawk offense, led by Sirowy, produced 188 yards on the ground and 14 via the pass. Fullback Steve McArtor had 43 yards on 13 tries for the Hawks.

Regina, without a single first down in the second half, had 44 yards on the ground. Dan Lynch had 54 yards but Thoman
