

Usual halfback starter Scott Pospisil was held out because of an ankle injury and fullback Ron Gorsh, a 230-pounder, was used primarily on defense, carrying the ball just twice.

Mike Tackaberry started the rout for Jeff early in the first period by recovering a Muscatine fumble at the Muskie 25 and, four plays later, Crosby crunched through left tackle for a 16-yard score. But the point-after attempt by Ken Samek was no good.

Mike Schmitt's interception started the next touchdown drive. Quarterback Rick Samek, Ken Samek's cousin, scored from a yard out and Frank added another PAT to make it 20-0 with fully 8:28 remaining until half-

Jeff's fourth touchdown was a two-yard plunge off left tackle by Harrelson, capping another methodical 12-play, 60-yard drive. Frank's kick was blocked and Jeff led 26-0 with 6:26 left in the third quarter

The first play of the fourth period gave Jeff it's final score as Mike Ferry exploded in from a yard out

The key play during the 62yard drive was a third-andsix, 36-vard Rick Samek pass to end Steve Rooks. Rooks was pushed just barely outof-bounds at about the twofoot line.

Muscatine's deepest penetration was to the Jeff 35yard line in the waning seconds. And that advance was stopped when second-string quarterback Brian Litten fumbled.

Moreover, Jeff's Tim Rischer achieved a lineman's dream by picking up the loose pigskin and romping 53 yards into the end zone. But a clipping call nullified the TD.


