# Regis Tops Wash; Jeff Wins, Cougars Fall

## Royals Get 21-7 Win In Opener

The final score was Regis 21, Washington 7, but it wasn't really that easy.

For the second straight year, the Royals held the Warriors scoreless from scrimmage while scoring three touchdowns themselves and posting a season-opening football victory over their eastside rivals.

Yet Wash coach Wally Sheets, with six juniors starting on defense, had reason to be optimistic.

"I wasn't disappointed at all in the way our kids played," said Sheets, who was the only head coach available for comment following the game witnessed by more than 7,000 fans at Kingston stadium last night.

We have a young ball club and we saw some things we've got to improve on. Still, I think the key to the game was the breaks they

And the breaks Regis MADE, too.

Sheets was talking about a Regis punt that dropped dead on the Wash one-yard line midway through the second quarter, and Dennis Martin's weaving 77-yard touchdown and around right end at 11:02 of the third quarter, giving the Royals a 14-0 lead.

The punt, which skidded past a Warrior at about the ten, ultimately forced Wash to punt from its own eightvard line, giving Regis possession at the Warrior 25.

Five plays later, Royal quarterback John Gavin dealt husky (6-7, 234-pound) tight end Matt Petrzelka a look-in jump pass to score the season's first football points at the stadium.

Later came Martin's electrifying run, which chewed up much of the senior fullback's career-high 210 yards rushing in 31 workmanlike

But Wash came right back with a record-breaking effort of its own. Vernon Brown, a 154-pounder junior speedster, took the ensuing kickoff 94 yards for the Warriors' first touchdown against Regis in two years. (The Roy als won last year's opener against Wash 21-0.)

Brown's burst ranks as the longest run in Warrior football history.

Martin also scored Regis' third TD on a three-yard burst off tackle with 4:18 left in the third period. That score was set up when Royal junior Kip Kula (who ran 12 times for 61 yards in his varsity debut at halfback) pounced on a Wash fumble at the Warrior three-yard line.

Wash had plenty of scoring opportunities but the rugged Regis defense - starring Petrzelka, John Gavin, Kent Wanzek and Bob Pfeiffer, among others - stymied each threat.

The Warriors went inside the Regis 25-yard line five times without scoring.

Wash gained just 55 yards in the second half to 187 by



Varrick Wilson was the Warriors' most consistent ground threat as he totaled 92 yards in 17 carries.

Regis ran for 272 yards in 59 carries and largely spurned the forward pass. But when the Royals did throw they were effective: Gavin completed three of five passes for 31 yards.






