Bulldogs Tip Kennedy

When your football team is 0-4, you've got to look for the bright spots and Cedar Rapids Kennedy Coach Greg Reed found at least two in a 13-0 Mississippi Valley loss to Bettendorf, Friday in Kingston stadium.

First, Reed accentuated the positive, although the loss put a damper on Kennedy's homecoming festivities and brightened Bettendorf's outlook because the Bulldogs won for the first time after

"Harley Williams ran like a million dollars when we finally got the football to him in the second half and Ty Payton played another terrific game defensively.

"Other than that, though, we just didn't do the job. They beat us on the line of scrimmage. We just couldn't get our defense off the field and eventually they wore us

Williams was the only offensive weapon that bothered Bettendorf. The fleet senior carried only twice for six yards in the first half, but picked up 61 in 12 secondhaif trips. He finished with

Payton, the tackling terror who operates at defensive end, was shifted to middle linebacker in what was basically a seven-diamond defensive setup.

"We did that because people were running away from him," explained Reed. "We figured by putting him in the middle there was no way to elude him. We shifted him back to end later in the game, though," added Reed.

Payton did make five un assisted tackles in the first quarter but durable Dave Horton was one Bulldog back who evaded Kennedy defend



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Brian Gottfried Gains in Tennis

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) -Brian Gottfried of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., swept into the quarter-finals of the \$125,000 Fireman's Fund International Open Tennis championships Friday, beating Andrew Pattison of Rhodesia 6-3, 6-2.

It was the third straight-set victory by Gottfried, who has limited each opponent to a two-set total of five games. Next opponent for Gottfried, seeded No. 5, will be secondseeded Harold Solomon of Silver Spring, Md.

Gottfried also reached the quarter-finals in doubles, when he and Bob Hewitt of South Africa - the top-seeded pair - beat Pattison and Haroon Rahim of Pakistan, 7-6, 6-3.

Hank Pfister, who upset fourth-seeded Stan Smith Thursday, lost to another unseeded player, Sherwood Stewart of Goose Creek, Texas, 6-1, 6-4. Stewart broke Pfister's service in a long opening game and had easy going from there, building a 5-2 lead in the second set.

Another Texan reaching the quarter-finals was sixthseeded Dick Stockton of Dallas with a 7-5, 6-2 victory over Cliff Richey of San Angelo, Texas. After losing, Richey, No. 13 seed, left for Hawaii, defaulting on a second-round doubles match.



'The Bird' Top Bet **For Rookie Honors**

CLEVELAND (AP) - By any measure, Mark "The Bird" Fidrych has had an eventful first year playing major league baseball.

With victory No. 18 in his pocket following a five-hit shutout of the Cleveland Indians Tuesday night, Fidrych may have American League Rookie of the Year honors in the bag.

The game's top attraction this season reflected on his first year in the "bigs" between games of Tuesday night's doubleheader, with a beer in one fist and a sandwich in the other.

'I always liked getting all the attention," he said, "but sometimes I just had to get

"I mean, I've got to get some privacy in my life, and it took me awhile to learn that.

"And I'll tell you," he added, "I may get all the attention but I need all those guys

behind me to get it." Fidrych, whose 2.39 ERA is tops among starters in the league, says he isn't particu-

larly infatuated with the prospect of winning 20 'I don't set goals. I want to win as many as I can, and

whatever else happens, happens," he said. Fidrych's instant rise to stardom began with a two-hit performance against the Indians on May 15 in his first major league start. Since then,

he has beaten the Indians three more times. But in short order his success on the mound was overshadowed by his humorous antics and boyish enthusiasm, and soon people were filling American League parks in every city to watch Bird talk to the ball, landscape the mound and do any

Fidrych said he hasn't learned a great deal about pitching this season but has learned quite a bit about himself as a person.

'It's more of a maturity thing," he said. "I've learned to take my lumps, how to bounce back from them, and also how to get along with the veterans.

"Pitching is still the same; you're still trying to get the batters out," he said.
