Cedar Rapids Washington kept its Mississippi Valley conference title hopes and its chances for a state playoff berth alive Thursday night at Kingston stadium on the strong kicking toe of 190-pound senior Mike Lawrence.

His three extra points were the final margin of victory and helped dictate the strategy as the league-leading Warriors scored a 21-18 victory over city rival Kennedy

Although Wash completely dominated the first half statistics and exploded for all of its 21 points in the second quarter, the issue was in doubt right down to the wire.

Tracy Crocker, who scored Kennedy's two first half touchdowns from three and four yards out, then rolled out and passed to Harley Williams on a 14 yard play with 1:23 left in the third quarter to put the Cougars back in con-

Wash Coach Wally Sheets, who made a special trip to the Kennedy lockerroom to congratulate loser Greg Reed and his young Cougars, was glad to escape, even though his squad had actually dominated.

"Kennedy played a fine game," he admitted ", and their defensive switches plus poor field position and the wind cut into our offense in the second half. They were moving out wider to stop us and I thought we could move the ball up the middle. But we didn't.

Sheets conceded that the Cougars may have been more mentally ready than his own squad.

"We have had a rough schedule the past four weeks," explained Sheets, "and it is hard for the kids to be up four weeks in a row

Reed was emotionally drained by the battle. "Our kids played very well," he said. "Give my coaching staff a lot of credit, they really had our club prepared for Washington."

Reed was also pleased with the way the Cougars slowed down the Wash attack in the second half. "Yes, we made a few changes and it helped a lot."

It was really more than that. With its 21-point barrage in the second period the Warriors seemed to be on the way to a lop-sided victory. In the first two quarters, Wash piled up 225 yards rushing and a dozen first downs. But Wash didn't get its first first down of the second half until early in the fourth quarter, and it mounted only one serious second half drive.

Bill Keister was a key factor in the Wash surge. He carried the ball 16 times for 185 yards, including a sparkling 83-yard touchdown jaunt with 4:05 left in the half that produced what proved to be the winning touchdown.

The young Wash defense played a big role, too. It held Crocker to just 64 yards in 22 carries. Crocker, switched from quarterback to tailback two weeks ago, had rushed for 195 yards with a spectacperformance City last Friday.

'This was Kyle's first start, and he did an excellent job, "said Reed.

Kennedy scored first Thursday after picking up a Wash fumble on the Wash 37, and that marked the first time the Cougars had scored first all season. Galles hit Randy Schultz on a 32-yard pass and Crocker carried it in.

Wash then marched 48 yards in 11 plays with Otto Moore scoring from the three. Then the Warriors went 60 yards in 10 plays with alternate fullback Robin Leonard going the final three

After Crocker had capped a 73-yard Kennedy drive from three yards out, Keister then broke his long, 83-yard TD run after the ensuing kickoff.



DICK ANDERSON, president of the National Football League Players Assn., has split publicly with executive director Ed Garvey in a personal letter to player representatives of the 26 NFL teams.

Anderson's letter, dated Oct. 14, has been posted in several NFL locker rooms and by challenging Garvey. Anderson could create a power struggle for control. The Washington Redskins' defensive back also acknowledged there was a split in the ranks on how to deal with owners. "I really believe that we will never be able to achieve an agreement with the owners that would be acceptable to Ed Garvey," Anderson wrote in the letter. "He wants too many things from them that they will never give up."

He also refuted accusations that he had sold out the players to owners while working out an agreement with Dan Rooney, president of the Pittsburgh Steelers. Anderson said he may have been hasty calling a board of representatives meeting Aug. 31 in regard to squad size. A tentative agreement after that meeting called for a player limit of 43 plus a taxi squad of four players. That was tabled and a flat limit of 43 established. "If the proposal in principle was agreed upon," said Anderson, "then we would have saved 112 jobs for players." Anderson also said in the letter he favors a common draft.

OTHER NFL NEWS: The Chicago Bears listed six players on the injury report for a Sunday game against the Vikings. Roger Stillwell is questionable and Walter Payton, Larry Schreiber, Bob Avellini, Jim Osborne and wide receiver Bo Rather are probable participants.
