# Dodgers and Royals Take 2-1 Playoff Leads

#### Bill Russell Paces L.A.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Bill Russell, the goat of the first game, singled home Davey Lopes as the Los Angeles Dodgers rallied for three ninth-inning runs with two out and beat the Philadelphia Phillies 6-5 Friday for a 2-1 lead in the best-offive National League championship

The Phillies had snapped a 3-3 tie catch.

in the bottom of the eighth and reliever Gene Garber set down the first two Dodgers in the top of the ninth before the West Division champions came to life with the help of two Philadelphia errors.

**Dusty Baker and Rick Monday** grounded out harmlessly for the first two outs of the ninth inning, but pinch hitter Vic Davalillo, batting for pitcher Lance Rautzhan, dropped a bunt toward second for a single.

Manny Mota, who hit .395 as a pinch hitter for the Dodgers this season, then doubled off the left field screen. Left fielder Greg Luzinski just missed a leaping, one-hand

Luzinski trapped the ball off the screen and threw to second, the ball skipping past Ted Sizemore for an error on the second baseman that allowed Davalillo to score and reduce the Phillies' lead to 5-4.

Lopes then smashed a grounder that bounced off third baseman Mike Schmidt to shortstop Larry Bowa. Bowa's throw to first appeared to nip Lopes, but first base umpire Bruce Froemming called the runner safe. The television instant replay showed first baseman Richie Hebner gloving the ball a split second before Lopes' foot hit the bag.

#### McRae Rips Yanks, 6-2

KANSAS CITY (AP) - Hal McRae, who infuriated the New York Yankees in the second game with two controversial slides, destroyed them with a pair of doubles that paced Kansas City to a 6-2 victory Friday night and a 2-1 lead in the American League championship

Dennis Leonard pitched a masterful four-hitter for the Royals' second leaving Kansas City only one triumph away from its first World

Amos Otis, angered by a lineup switch that benched him, delivered a clutch two-run pinch double that supplied the Royals' wrapup runs, but it was the two-base hits by McRae that dug the hole from which the Yankees never emerged.

McRae, whose 54 doubles during the regular season was the highest total for any American League player in 27 years, lashed lead-off twobaggers in the third and fifth innings and scored both times on infield outs by Al Cowens.

McRae had been credited Thursday night with awakening the Yankees by his aggressive slides into second baseman Willie Randolph and shortstop Bucky Dent. But Leonard put the Yankee bats right back to sleep with a powerful performance. He was in control throughout.

After Roy White doubled in the first inning but was out trying to stretch his hit, Leonard retired 12 Yankees in order, and by the time New York put another man on base, Kansas City had a lead it would never surrender.

DUBUQUE - Cedar Rapids Kennedy's dreams of enjoying its first unbeaten football season were swept away in the wind and rain of Dalzell Field Friday night as the Cougars were shocked by Dubuque Senior 7-

Previously 4-0 and ranked fourth in both state polls, Kennedy suffered its first loss in its first venture on the road. The Cougars' previous four games had been played at Kingston

And as a result of Kennedy's initial loss, there is a five-way tie for first place in the Mississippi Valley Conference football race. Tied with 3-1 records are all three C.R. teams -Jefferson, Kennedy and Washington

- as well as Clinton and Dubuque Hempstead.

The Cougars, who never have won more than seven football games in a season, scored first. The touchdown came when halfback Tracy Crocker sped off-tackle for 58 yards with 2:46 left in the first quarter. But the extra-point kick was wide.

Senior, now 2-3, took the ensuing kickoff and marched 66 yards in 13 plays for the winning touchdown. The score, on Joe Kearney's twoyard plunge, came with 10:04 remaining in the first half. Bob Edwards kicked the decisive PAT.

Kennedy's Crocker, the leading rusher and leading scorer in the Mississippi Valley Conference, led all runners with 134 yards in 25 carries.

The senior scatback has rushed for 678 yards in five games.
"I didn't think the 7-6 lead would

hold up," said Senior Coach Roger Bentley. "I was afraid all of the time that Crocker would break another

A key play in Senior's scoring drive was a 12-yard pass from Dave Metille to Rick Link in a third downand-8 situation. And a personal foul on Kennedy moved the ball to the Cougars' 35-yard line. From the 35, Kearney ran three


times for 18 yards and Link passed to Troy Budde for 10 yards and to Link for 13.

Kennedy moved to the Senior 29 in the third quarter but gave up possession on downs.





From there, Rooney punched in from a yard out and a two-point extra run made it 24-0 at half time. Exit all offensive machinery as the mud took its toll in the final 16 minutes.

Piro, the slender senior who had hit 23 of 33 passes for 263 yards to lead the Valley going in, hit six of 14, but for only 32 yards as the J-Hawk defense completely stymied the Little Hawks.

Burly 235-pound Iowa City fullback Scott Wilson logged 52 yards in 14 carries, but three Piro sacks helped check the Little Hawks to only 44 yards rushing.

Jeff hiked its Valley record to 3-1

and Iowa City fell to 1-3. The Little Hawks did block a Jeff punt just before half time and took over at the Jeff 16, but two pass attempts failed to yield a first down and a field goal attempt was missed from the 14.
