Fedderson stars as Linn-Mar raps Regis, 30-14

Junior varsity high school football IS important.

Rod Fedderson will tell you so. Fedderson, 6-3, 185-pound split end, caught seven passes - two for touchdowns — for 97 yards to lead Linn-Mar to its sixth straight victory and first over Cedar Rapids Regis, 30-14, Friday night.

A Parent's Night crowd of about 2,700 at Linn-Mar's Armstrong field saw quarterback Mike Woodhouse — in his first full game in many weeks — riddle the Royals' defensive secondary with passes to Fed-

"We discovered Rod about a year ago when he was playing junior varsity football," assistant Linn-Mar Coach Bill Nash said. "He started catching some crucial passes for the JV and that's when we decided he was our man.

"Tex (head coach McCoy) does not use a pass-oriented offense. Fedderson has made some brilliant catches this season and this was probably his best game.'

Odd as it may seem (with a final score of 30-14), Linn-Mar advanced its record to 8-1 with solid defense - one which limited Regis to only two first downs and just six yards

rushing in the second half.

'We weren't blocking in the second half," said Regis Coach Tom Good, who saw his team's record plunge to 1-7. "Linn-Mar just outplayed us. Maybe Linn-Mar's kids wanted to win more than our kids."

Linn-Mar dominated the second half, as it was on offense nearly 16 minutes. In the first half, Regis had the ball 14 minutes.

Seniors Mike Fillmore (co-cap-

Prairie got on the board first Friday night on Randy Hurlbert's 71yard run with 2:44 left in the first


The Hawks didn't have another chance until late in the game, and were smothered then.




