Hempstead ruins Kennedy title bid, 14-7

Reed proud of Cougars in windup

DUBUOUE - Cedar Rapids Kennedy football coach Greg Reed was a disappointed but proud man Friday night after his Cougars ended their greatest season by losing to Du-buque Hempstead 14-7 in the Missis-sippi Valley Conference champion-

The loss boosted Hempstead (6-3) into the state Class 4A playoffs for the first time.

"I'm proud of these kids," said second-year coach Reed. "We had a 2-7 record last year and finished 7-2 this year. That's quite an improvement.'

Kennedy's 7-2 record is the best in its football history. Ironically, both Cougar losses were suffered at Dalzell Field here; they also lost to Dubuque Senior 7-6.

The Cougars played without starting fullback Pete Oates, who was sidelined with a deep thigh bruise suffered in last week's 7-0 victory over C.R. Washington. The 190pound junior was Kennedy's secondleading rusher with 674 yards in 119

"I don't think Pete being out of the game was the difference, though," said Reed. "Jeff Johnson did a good job for us." Johnson ran eight times for 34 yards.

"We're not going to make excuses," Reed said. "They just beat us.

'Their line came off the ball very well. I thought the game would be won up front in the line, and it was."

Led by the running of fullback Marty Ball, Hempstead outgained Kennedy 219-113. Ball rushed for 105 yards in 23 carries. Mustang tailback Steve Maas added 58 yards in

'Ball looked like an all-American tonight," Reed said. "He's my allconference fullback."

Although held in check by a swarming Hempstead defense, Kennedy tailback Tracy Crocker also is certain to be a first team all-Valley choice - for the second time.

The 6-foot-1, 185-pound senior was limited to 51 yards in 23 carries. He finished his final prep season with a school-record 1,058 yards in 204 carries. During his final 13 games as the Cougars' starting tailback, Crocker ran for 1,661 yards.

On its second possession, Hempstead marched 88 yards in 17 plays to lead 7-0 with five seconds left in the first quarter. Ball ran for 38 of those on six carries, but Maas scored the touchdown on a three-yard slant.

A big play in the drive was a pass interference penalty on the Cougars. The pass was overthrown and Hempstead would have been forced to punt from the Cougars' 45.

Instead, the Mustangs received a first down at Kennedy's 30. Six plays later, they scored.

With 8:06 left in the first half, Hempstead began a time-consuming drive which ended at the Kennedy 15. A lost fumble — recovered by Kennedy's Jack Clark — stopped the Mustangs' advance with 4:25 left until intermission.

Hempstead gained 137 yards in the first half while limiting Kennedy to only 42. Ball had rushed 13 times for 71 yards at the intermission. He was limited to 34 yards on nine carries in the final half.

On Hempstead's first possession of the second half, the Mustangs used 13 plays to drive 54 yards for a 14-0 lead with 1:55 left in the third period. Junior quarterback Rick Crews scored on a one-yard keeper.



Cunningham new boss for Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - Billy Cunningham, who never has coached, accepted a great challenge Friday and took over the squabbling faltering Philadelphia 76ers, a team of millionaire superstars regarded as the toughest team to coach in the National Basketball Association.

"I feel it was an opportunity that could come once in a lifetime," the former 76ers' star told a news conference. "What shocked me most is that my wife was in favor of it."

Cunningham, who quit the NBA in 1976 because of a knee injury, said 76ers owner Eugene "Fitz" Dixon offered him the coaching job just before midnight Wednesday, after the team lost at home to the Chicago Bulls. The loss was the third straight for the faltering Sixers, now 2-4.

That was when he decided to fire Gene Shue, who in his four years as coach of the 76ers led Philadelphia out of pro basketball's cellar to the championship finals last season before being wiped out by Portland.

'I have felt for some time that our team has not been progressing sufficiently," Dixon said as Cunningham sat silently beside him. "It was a difficult decision to make, but I felt it had to be done.'

Would Cunningham have to bring home a title to keep the job?

"No," said Dixon, who has paid more than \$15 million for his franchise and players and expects a win-

"No," echoed Cunningham. "That is not the case at all," Dix-

"That is the objective, but I don't need basketball to survive in life," added Cunningham. "It is a great challenge to me, and when you are involved in basketball for 28 years of your life it's hard to walk away from.

The 34-year-old Cunningham is a native of New York City who came to the Sixers in 1965 from North Carolina. He scored 16,000 points in an outstanding pro career before he mer Indianapolis Racers and one retired and the Sixers retired his "No. 32" jersey.


