The Kennedy defense got the first half credit as the Cougars took a 10-0 lead, and the offense took charge in the third as Coach Greg Reed's club handed Regis a 17-6 football defeat in the state's opening football game.
Regis never got out of its own territory in the

early going and Kennedy turned a pair of interceptions into a 10-0 first quarter lead Thursday night at Kingston Stadium.

Kennedy's Mike Beer intercepted a Steve O'Connell pass on the first series of plays at the Regis 21 and four plays later big Pete Oates crashed over from the 11 for the first of his two

If Iowa State's pass defense is as good as Coach Earle Bruce hopes, the Cyclones should have little trouble starting their football season with the school's first victory ever over a Southwest Conference team.

Iowa State meets Rice, last-place team in the Southwest last year with a 1-10 record, and the Owls' main hope of victory lies in the right arm of Randy Hertel.

The game will begin at 7:30 p.m. Iowa time Saturday and is expected to draw a crowd of 20,000 in the vast. 70,000-seat Rice Stadium in Hous-

Last year Hertel was the Southwest Conference's leading passer, the first freshman ever to do so. He passed for 1,620 yards and nine touchdowns, but Ohio State's Woody Hayes would note with satisfaction that "passing teams rarely win championships.

He has two top receivers back, too: Dave Houser, who caught 55 and 59 passes the last two seasons, and Doug Cunningham, who was a medical red-shirt last season after suffering a rib injury in the opener.
