So Cedar Rapids Washington scrapped its I formation, unveiled its overtime Ceschin offense and defeated C.R. Kennedy 10-7 in a doubleovertime football thriller Thursday night at Kingston Stadium.

A throng estimated at 11,000 watched Wash senior Dan Ceschin end the battle of unbeatens by booting a 20-yard field goal. The 160pound senior, a part-time starter at quarterback, had missed a 25-yarder with 4:19 left in regulation.

It wasn't unusual that the Warriors won in overtime; they've never lost an extra-session game. But it was unusual that Ceschin provided the game-winning kick.

After all, he had never kicked a field goal before.

"I used to kick off in junior high," Ceschin said, "but I've never even kicked an extra point before.'

We just found out about Dan's kicking ability this week," said Wash Coach Wally Sheets.

"We've played 10 overtime periods now," added Sheets, "and the Good Lord's been with us, because we haven't lost one yet. We beat Bettendorf in five overtimes two years ago and Clinton in two overtimes four or five years ago.'

While Ceschin and Sheets were savoring Wash's fourth straight vickicking himself for not kicking.

The 5-9, 172-pound Green reportedly played with a bruised knee against Iowa but is expected to be Grant and linebacker Tom Boskey also will play with nagging knees.

The closest they came to meeting in a game was in 1974, when Rubley led Davenport West to the state Class 4A high school title.

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

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# SPORTS Guidry, Rice Yanda hits 651 set more records

It's status quo in the American League East — the New York Yankees are still one game ahead of the Boston Red Sox, and Ron Guidry and Jim Rice are still destroying the opposition.

Guidry fired a four-hitter and struck out nine to set a club record of 243 strikeouts for the season as the Yankees beat the Toronto Blue Jays 3-1 Thursday night.

'He's a remarkable young man," Yankees Manager Bob Lemon said of Guidry, 24-3 after posting his 11th victory in his last 13 starts. His win-

ning percentage of .889 is the best of any 20-game winner in major league history. His earned run average of 1.72 is the lowest by a left-hander since Carl Hubbell's 1.66 in 1933. Rice, meanwhile, belted his 45th home run of the season to back the

three-hit pitching of Mike Torrez as the Red Sox stayed within one gme of the first-place Yankees by defeating the Detroit Tigers 1-0. "He has to be just about the

strongest guy I've ever seen with a bat," said Detroit Manager Ralph Houk, after Rice muscled a drive through a stiff crosswind into the center field bleachers leading off the fourth inning for the only run of the game. "I didn't think it could be done, but he did it.'
