Kennedy still confident despite loss to Hempstead ond-half first down with 7:15 remain-

Dubuque Hempstead's Dave Loring sure wasn't boring Friday night
— except from Cedar Rapids Kennedy's point of view.

Loring, the Mississippi Valley Conference leading rusher, forged for 153 yards (29 carries) and the winning touchdown as the Mustangs clipped the Cougars 14-7 at Kingston Stadium.

It put the sixth-ranked Mustangs 3-0 in the conference, tied with Cedar Rapids Washington. Kennedy, which lost in double overtime to Washington last week, dropped to 2-2 in the league and 3-2 overall.

'What can I say?" said Cougar Coach Greg Reed, whose team was ranked No. 7 by AP and No. 8 by UPI. "It's no fun to lose but I can't fault the kids.

"I don't think a playoff berth is out yet, either. Sure, we'll have to go 7-2, but Kennedy will pick up and be back next week.

Loring, who has now gained 435 yards in three conference games, rushed 10 times for 55 yards in Hempstead's 80-yard, fourth-quarter scoring drive.

Hempstead earned its initial sec-

ing. But that was just the beginning.

Loring picked up all four first downs in the final march and gained the last 37 yards in six carries.

He bruised the left side of Kennedy's defense for most of his yardage, including the decisive 10-yard end run with 2:49 left.

'You know, that's the same score we beat them by in last year's game to decide the championship," said Hempstead Coach Bob Timmerman, who has topped Kennedy three straight years. "It was a hard-hitting game, which is typical ever since Greg Reed has been at Kennedy.

One of those 'down' tackles, 6-1, 248-pound junior Brian Kramer, helped force three of Hempstead's four fumbles. Kramer's hit and Bob Schultz's
