Cougars feel their Oates: Pete pounds for 178 yards, 4 TDs

"Home" hasn't been so sweet for Cedar Rapids Kennedy's football team this season, but its seniors showed no bitterness Thursday

The upperclassmen spent some minutes on the Kingston Stadium field celebrating a 28-8 victory over Iowa City, acting as if they had just won a championship rather than played their last home game.

'The seniors just wanted to give a proper goodbye to Kingston," Kennedy Coach Greg Reed said. "We had won nine straight games on this field before we lost three in a row."

Successive losses to C.R. Washington, Dubuque Hempstead and C.R. Jefferson - all at Kingston had knocked the Cougars out of Mississippi Valley Conference and state playoff contention.

Then Coach Greg Reed and his staff faced the difficult job of motivating a team with no direction left, trying to prepare it for an Iowa City school with only one victory.

"In practice this week, Coach Reed told us a story about the Iowa City game two years ago," said fullback Pete Oates, who ran for 178 yards and four touchdowns.

"It was about how Iowa City was way ahead, about 40 points, and they put a big guard in at fullback to grind out some more yardage in the last

This time it was Kennedy that kept grinding and grinding.

The 215-pound Oates pounded Iowa City's defense 36 times for his

178 yards, a personal high but 21 short of Tracy Crocker's school record. In the first half, Oates had 118 yards in 21 tries.

There's just too much of him," City High School Clyde Bean said of Oates. "He's a heckuva back and we tried just about everything to stop

"Seriously, I don't think it was my best game," Oates said. "That's because the line opened such big holes. I've worked harder in other games this year against better defenses but got less yards. But it makes things fun when the line does that for you."

'Our game plan was to have Pete carry 35 times," Reed said. "Our offensive line was super and I was really happy our defense came alive in the second half."

Iowa City, which has the lowest total yards average in the conference, held the Cougars to a surprising 14-8 halftime lead.

In fact, the Little Hawks outgained Kennedy 167-161 the first 24

But then the Cougar defense detained Iowa City, allowing only 23 second-half total yards and sacking Little Hawk rushers six times behind the line of scrimmage.

Junior Jeff White, who scored all

eight Iowa City points, had 74 firsthalf yards but finished with only 79.

Cougar quarterback Mike Bennett completed five of six passes in the last 20 minutes for 62 yards. He ended up 8 of 16 for 100.

Toby Michael caught five and needs only four more receptions to break Don Greenwood's single-season record of 27. Michael has 22 conference catches, 24 overall.

"We just felt like we had nothing to lose," Michael said. "We decided to go all out and if we blow a play, big deal. We just wanted to have

Oates' four-yard, first-quarter touchdown run came only three plays after defensive end Gary Lovik recovered White's fumble on the City High 31-yard line.

The Cougars (4-3) ticked 61/2 minutes off in the second quarter on a 16-play, 68-yard march that resulted in Oates' one-yard surge. He rushed 11 times and caught one pass in the drive.

Iowa City (1-6), which hasn't won at Kingston in over five years, countered by moving 60 yards in 13 plays as White scored from six yards (4:33 left in the half).

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) - Whitey Herzog, the man who brought the Kansas City Royals their first American League West title and then twice repeated the feat, will be back at the Royals' helm in 1979.

But Charley Lau, the man credited with making star hitters out of George Brett and Hal McRae, won't be returning as bat-

Whitey will be one of the highest-paid managers in baseball. And he should be," Joe Burke, Royals executive vice president and general manager, said Thursday.

Herzog had sought a multi-year contract, but agreed to his fourth one-year pact after a 45-minute meeting with Burke, then left for a weekend of fishing in the Ozark Mountains. He was unavailable for comment.

Burke did not disclose details of the contract, but reports placed it at near \$100,000.

The 46-year-old Herzog's decision to manage in 1979 was not unexpected, but the announcement that Lau, at Herzog's recommendation, would not be rehired came as a surprise.

And if most of the Royals were relieved that the affable Herzog would be back, some also were disappointed that Lau, 45, an advocate of making contact and hitting to all fields, would not.

"I didn't want to see Charley go because he helped me too much," said Brett, the 1976 AL batting champ with a .333 mark. "He helped me with my hitting, but he was also a per-

Lau, considered by many to be one of the game's top batting instructors, joined the Royals in 1971, but was fired by thenmanager Jack McKeon in 1974. Herzog's first act when he became manager on July 24, 1975, was to rehire the popular Lau. But, said Burke, Herzog gradually felt the Royals needed a

hitting approach that keyed more on each hitter's individual ability than did Lau's philosophy. "He feels Charley did a great job with some hitters and not

so great with others," said Burke. "He just feels one man can't teach 50 players to hit like each other.' Brett said he respected Herzog and would not criticize him

for the move, but McRae, who had three straight plus-.300 seasons before dipping to .298 in 1977 and .273 this year, was far "It's a manager's decision, but I think the players should

have something to say about a thing like this," McRae said.

'Next season we'll have a team of pull hitters, .240 hitters. I think if there's a conflict between a manager and one of his coaches, a good hitting instructor like Charley Lau, they should be able to work things out."

Herzog said he would handle hitting instruction with help from the rest of the coaching staff.

Lau, who had been in the Royals' organization since 1971, will be replaced by John Sullivan, who managed the Omaha Royals to the American Association title in 1978 and will be

the bullpen coach. Herzog, who has been critical of the Royals' reluctance to be more aggressive in the free agent market and their policy of not discussing contracts until after the season, had raised

doubts about his managerial future after Kansas City's third straight AL playoff loss to the New York Yankees. Speculation rose when Herzog said last week he was not happy with the team's contract offer, then took several days


longer than expected to mull it over. Burke said Thursday that all meetings between the two were cordial, praising Herzog for a "tremendous job" and adding that everything has been resolved "to the satisfaction of the Royals and Whitey."

Herzog, who has been manager longer than anyone in the Royals' 10-year history, has compiled a 325-227 won-loss record in 31/2 seasons.

A first baseman-outfielder for eight seasons with the old Washington Senators, Kansas City Athletics, Baltimore Orioles and Detroit Tigers, he spent seven years in the New York Mets' organization before managing Texas in 1973.

Matt Petrzelka, starting left tackle on offense, was left at home because of a neck injury. Jeff DeVilder will start.

Both starting defensive tackles are injured. Joe Hufford won't make the trip because of a knee injury that may have ended his collegiate career. John Harty hasn't practiced all week because of a sprained ankle but Commings hopes he can play, and Baylor. but Doug Benschoter and Mark Mahmens probably will start.

Commings says centers Jay Hilgenberg and Dave Oakes are ready for full-time duty, but both have been hindered by leg injuries. Mike last two weeks, with Hilgy and much pressure on Jeff Green, who

Oakes doing the long snaps.

Cornerback Cedric Shaw also missed the trip again because of a knee injury, as did defensive end Steve Wagner. Another absentee is Bob Commings Jr., formerly the starting QB but now out with a rib


