

Cougars hold off I.C. West

Mistakes continue to riddle the Iowa City West football squad and probably the most serious one of the young season occurred Friday night, denying the Trojans any hopes of an upset win over Cedar Rapids Kennedy.

With 3:49 remaining in the fourth period, the Trojans sent two safeties deep to receive a Kennedy punt. One called for a fair catch, but the other promptly fielded the ball and ran upfield. Instead of being penalized yardage, the Trojans were forced to give up possession of the ball and Kennedy took over on the West 30-yard line. Kennedy was able to run out the clock and preserve

Moments earlier the outcome had been in some doubt despite Kennedy's domination of the game with its defense and a capable running

West quarterback Matt Thornton engineered an 80-yard, 10-play drive that included pass completions of 20 and 36 yards to fleet receiver Gene Lytle. On the first play of the fourth quarter, Lytle swept left on an end around and raced the intervening 10 yards into the end zone. The extra point narrowed the Cougar lead to four, 18-14. Momentum seemed to have clearly shifted to West.

Kennedy Coach Greg Reed, recording his initial victory off the season after suffering an opening game loss to Regis last week, said he wasn't surprised by West's challenge.

'I've said all the time that they'd be tough. John (West Coach Meskimen) has brought them

around — they will beat some people this year.'

In the first half, the idea that West could defeat anyone might have seemed wildly ridiculous, given the way they were rudely manhandled by Kennedy's defensive and offensive units. West could only muster seven yards rushing and another 26 passing, 22 of that coming on the final

By contrast, the Cougars ran and passed for 173 first half yards which allowed them to control the ball the majority of the time. However, it was the tried and true Kennedy defense which set up the first Cougar score.

Shane Berry stole a Thornton pass at midfield and returned it to the West 34-yard line late in the first quarter. Moments later, Joel Smith went off right tackle for eight yards and a touchdown, giving the Cougars a 6-0 lead. On its next possession Kennedy rolled 79 yards in 14 plays to up its lead

The Kennedy defense turned heroic three plays later when linebacker Jeff Lane snatched a Trojan pass and returned it six yards. But on the next play West's Dave Schrock returned the favor by intercepting and racing 79 yards up the left sideline and scoring with the aid of Steve Gragg's two key blocks.

At that point Kennedy held a narrow 12-7 lead, but virtually no one expected the Trojans to make a game of it in the final 24 minutes.
