After the Cougar defense held Jefferson on downs, the offense embarked on a 13-play march capped again by a one-yard McClintic sneak. The running of McClintic for 32 yards and Myers for 17 were instrumental.

Illinois QB will play today

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (UPI) - A three-judge state appeals court Friday cleared the way for University of Illinois quarterback Dave Wilson to play in today's game against Missouri.

Wilson's attorney, Robert Auler, said Wilson would catch a flight late Friday to Columbia, Mo., to participate in the Illini's third game of the season. Wilson did not attend Friday's hearing. Attorneys for the Big Ten would not say what

their next step might be but said conference officials would be immediately notified of the court's ruling.

The judges, in a 2-1 decision, granted an emergency injunction, in essence overturning a Champaign County circuit judge's order that Wilson was ineligible to play for Illinois. Wilson's attorneys and supporters burst into applause after the decision was announced following just 35 minutes of deliberation.

In its written opinion issued shortly thereafter, the appeals court said too many serious "issues of constitutional dimensions" needed to be settled in the case. The court noted that Wilson likely would win in a full trial.

"Accordingly he is entitled to an injunction until the final adjudication," the 4th District Appellate Court said.

Questions of Wilson's eligibility center around a lack of sufficient academic credit hours.


