• It's fine to get excited about today's Iowa-Iowa State game -Corn Bowl IV — at Iowa City, but please don't regard it as something more than a friendly athletic contest.

It's not a civil war, not an excuse for drunkenness and bad manners, not an invitation to rush onto the field to tear down the goal posts - no matter who wins.

Each side has had a turn at childish fun. ISU loyalists ripped down the goal posts after the 1978 game, and Iowa fans did it last year.

So now that both are grown up, let's cut out the violent acts that could lead to serious injury, property damage and ugly situa-

After all, this one is just for the state championship. Each football team has eight games to play, including seven conference contests apiece. So keep the champagne — and tempers cool until after that.

Player examples

• If you think today's game is a real shooting war, then you should talk to the players involved. They'll belt the bejabbers out of each other from 1:05 to 4 p.m. today, but after that they'll shake hands with old friends on the other team and be peaceful until same time next year.

For instance, Doug Dunham, Iowa senior end from Iowa City, is looking foward to greeting some amigos among the Cyclones.

"Brian Neal (Iowa State guard who missed the entire 1979 season with a knee injury) and I are good friends," Dunham said. "We roomed together in the Shrine All-Star game after we finished high school.

"Brian has come to Iowa City a few times to see me. Last year he brought along Jack Seabrooke, Iowa State's fullback, and Scotty Hansen, their former linebacker. They stayed at the dorm with us and went over to watch the Iowa-Iowa State wrestling meet with Jay Hilgenberg, me and a bunch of others. They're great guys, and we get along fine.

Dunham is the youngest of five children. His mother attended Iowa for one year. His father is a foreman on a construction crew laying natural-gas pipeline near Chicago, but you may be sure he gets away weekends to see Doug

Red Peppers Will Iowa State have 'special' help today?

Two questions concerned Iowa's football camp on the eve of today's "state championship" game that will draw a turn-

away crowd of 60,000 to Kinnick Stadium: • 1. Did Nebraska benefit from special information about Iowa's offense and defense in the 57-0 rout of the Hawks last

week at Lincoln, Neb.? • 2. If Nebraska actually did have such information, did Coach Tom Osborne's staff share it with Iowa State to help the Cyclones prepare for today's contest?

Iowa Coach Hayden Fry declined to answer questions about either possibility Friday, but he did make a comment that raised eyebrows at the Johnson County I Club breakfast Friday morning at the Highlander Restaurant in Iowa City.

look," Fry said. "We are hopeful Nebraska is that good, because that would make us look better.

"However, after looking at the films, we're not sure Nebraska was that good. We were fighting something that

wasn't evident to the eye in just watching the game. "We know Iowa State is an excellent team, and we just hope they don't benefit from things we weren't aware of last

Fry refused to elaborate on his comments when asked how Nebraska came by any special information or if he thought the Nebraska staff would pass along useful tips to Iowa State's

staff. Schools in the same conference have been known to share scouting reports on a non-league opponent.

At a press conference in Ames Tuesday, ISU Coach Donnie Duncan was asked if he had consulted with the Nebraska staff "We are not as bad as last week's (57-0) loss made us on how they handled the Hawkeyes' offense and defense so

well. Duncan said he had not, adding he and Fry had too good a relationship to do that.

In contrast to the last three years, when Iowa State's squad worked out in Iowa's Kinnick Stadium on the Friday before the game, the Cyclones this year were bused to Cedar Rapids late Friday afternoon and were scheduled to spend Friday night at Stouffer's Five Seasons Hotel.

At the Friday noon Linn County I Club luncheon at the Roosevelt Hotel in Cedar Rapids, Iowa assistant coach Donnie Patterson also made comments hinting at Nebraska's unusually good scouting report on Iowa.

"They (Nebraska) knew very well what we were going to do," Patterson said. "We believe that from things that have

Kennedy stays tied for MVC lead

Cedar Rapids Kennedy racked up 392 yards in total offense, scored more points than it has in two years and remained in a tie for the Mississippi Valley Conference football lead Friday night.

Still, Greg Reed, perfectionist that he is, wasn't totally satisfied while assessing Kennedy's 27-12 homecoming victory over Iowa City West before about 2,500 fans at Kingston Stadium.

"It was nice to play all 82 kids," Reed said, "but I'm not happy with the execution of our No. 1 units, both offense and defense.

"We still haven't played a complete game yet. On West's first series of plays they got a couple first downs, and that told me we weren't ready. I was happy that we got some long drives together, but not with the line

Kennedy's 27 points was its most in 16 games, dating back to a 28-8 win over Iowa City High, Oct. 19, 1978. It also was the Cougars' third straight victory, the first time the school has put together such a string since the first three games of '78.

Kennedy, 3-1 overall, now is tied for the Valley lead at 3-0 with Cedar Rapids

Washington, which escaped Dubuque Wahlert 20-14 Friday. The Cougars and Warriors clash Oct. 9 at Kingston.

The breakdown in Kennedy's total offense was 270 yards rushing in 45 attempts and 122 yards passing. Mark McClintic connected on five of 10 passes for 72 yards, Jim McDonald two of two for 50.

The Cougars rolled to a 20-0 halftime lead on two short touchdown runs by tailback Joel Smith and a 40-yard pass from McDonald to Scott Owens, Kennedy's first passing TD this year.

Greg Spicher's 75-yard scoring run on a counter play put Kennedy in front 27-0 with 9:07 left in the third quarter. It was on the next series that Reed started substituting

"It was about what I expected," said West Coach Jon Meskimen, former Cedar Rapids Jefferson star and LaSalle coach. "I would say Kennedy is the surprise team in the conference. Right now the momentum is on

their side. West lost its 10th straight game and its 14th consecutive league contest. However, the Trojans salvaged something with two fourth-quarter touchdowns, as it was the first time the school has scored more than seven

West, which accumulated 135 of its 164 yards in the fourth quarter, broke the ice by driving 78 yards in eight plays against Kennedy's reserves. Quarterback Kevin Casady's 38-yard run set up a five-yard scoring run by Tim Soper with 4:32 left.

Then Casady and Paul McKay combined for three pass plays the next possession, the last for a 19-yard TD with just nine seconds remaining. The other completions were for 13 and 30 yards.

Kennedy scored on its first three possessions on the following drives: 67 yards in 11 plays, 72 yards in eight and 77 in eight. Spicher's 75-yard run in the third period was the third play of that series.

Spicher carried the ball four times for 84 yards and caught two passes for 47. Smith was next in rushing with 53 yards in nine attempts, Tom Myers had 53 in seven and

Marc Meyer 48 in eight. Owens caught two passes totaling 49 yards and Kevin Lukes grabbed three for 26.

Jay Fitzharris killed two West drives with interceptions. McKay was the leading receiver with five

catches for 71 yards. Bill Phillips was West's top rusher with 33 yards in nine carries.

McBride hit the first pitch of the ninth inning off David Palmer over the right field fence for his ninth home run Friday night to lift the Philadelphia Phillies to a 2-1 victory over the Montreal Expos.

The victory moved the Phillies 11/2 games ahead of the second-place Expos in the National League East.

Reliever Tug McGraw, 4-4, took over for starter Dick Ruthven in the eighth inning to pick up the triumph.

The Expos, who didn't get a hit until Rowland Office singled with two out in the fourth, tied the score in the sixth when Jerry White doubled to right and scored on Rodney Scott's single to left.

Philadelphia took a 1-0 lead in the second when Garry Maddox cracked his 11th home run.

Montreal, which had only four hits, threatened in the seventh when Andre Dawson doubled high off the wall in center, but Gary Carter popped out and, after issuing an intentional walk to Warren Cromartie, Ruthven struck out Larry Parrish to end the inning.

In Houston, Ruhle tossed a four-hitter in outdueling Tom Seaver to pitch Houston to a 2-0 victory over Cincinnati.

Jose Cruz knocked in a run in the first inning and Craig Reynolds added an RBI in the second as the first place Astros dropped the third-place Reds 3 1-2 games behind in the NL West with only seven games remaining.

Ruhle, 11-4, struck out two and walked none in registering his fifth complete game. It was his second shutout of the year.

Marion prevails in key Wamac clash

MAQUOKETA - Marion High School's running backs certainly know how to run

In fact, that's about all they did Friday night, consistently slicing off big chunks of yardage behind the right side of their offensive line as the Indians scored early and held off feisty Maquoketa, 14-6, in a key

Wamac Conference football contest. Marion swept 61 yards on four plays with the opening kickoff, temporarily silencing the vocal Maquoketa home crowd.

Todd Twachtmann and Vaughn Klopfenstein cracked up the middle for 13 and eight yards before Tom Benkusky latched onto quarterback Kent Mahurin's pitchout and slipped around the right end for 24 yards, ending up on the Cardinals' nine yard line. Klopfenstein then blasted off right tackle for the game's initial score.

In the second quarter Klopfenstein picked off Jay Rollinger's errant pass and returned it 10 yards to the Maquoketa 42. Again, the Indians made short work of the Cardinals, Twachtmann ripping 37 yards on the first play of the series. Four snaps later Klopfenstein plunged one yard for his second TD and Marion led, 14-0.

Despite the quick two touchdown lead, Marion Coach Bob Thurness remained wary of the Cardinals.

'No, I was never confident of the win," he said, shaking his head. "You can't be when you play a fine football team like that. It's hard to go on the road in the Wamac (Conference); it's especially tough when you have to play a fine football team like Maquoketa.'

In preseason picks Wamac coaches had overwhelmingly named Marion as the favorite to capture the league title and tapped the Cardinals as the chief threat to sidetrack the

attempt to live up to that expectation.

The Cardinals demonstrated they, too, knew what to do with an opening kickoff. Flicking a pop pass to reserve quarterback Rich Smith, sending Troy Crawford off right tackle one time, then left tackle another, using counter action in the backfield, or just plain sneaking the ball, Rollinger orchestrated a 70-yard, 11 play march at the start of the third period.

Jon Wallace went the final four yards and cut the Marion lead to 14-6. Rollinger's pass attempt for a two point conversion fell short.

The remainder of the second half was dominated by the defenses. Twice in the fourth quarter the Cardinals denied Marion first downs on fourth and short yardage, once on the Maquoketa 16-yard line, the other on the Maguoketa 12.

But it was the Indian defense that assured Marion, ranked third in the Associated Press Class 3A poll, of its fourth win against no

After taking over on its own 12 with two minutes remaining, Maquoketa moved to its

Lopez leads at Dallas

DALLAS (UPI) — Nancy Lopez Melton birdied the final hole Friday to post a 3-under-par 69 under windy conditions and take a one-stroke lead over JoAnne Carner and hard luck rookie Myra Van Hoose after one round of the Dallas Classic.

Lopez, returning to the form that has made her the most feared player on the LPGA tour, almost holed a six-iron for an eagle on the 345yard 18th and the resulting 1-foot birdie putt gave her a start on winning for the second straight year in Dallas.

'That positive attitude I've had in the past is back and that helps me a lot," said Lopez. "I'd like to win the last three tournaments this year. If I do that would give me a chance to be Player of the Year."

Van Hoose shared second place with Carner at 2-under 70 despite being bitten on the ankle by an ant and having that ankle swell rapidly through the rest of the round.

She was rushed to a hospital following her round and the doctor who tended to her ankle suggested that she not compete in today's second round.

Alone in fourth place at 1-under 71 was Kathy Postlewait. No one else could beat par on a blustery, cloudy afternoon. Jane Blalock, Penny Pulz and Lori Garbacz shot par 72.
