## College season starts today in high style

The college football season begins in high style today with Georgia starting defense of its 1980 national championship and Alabama's Bear Bryant trying to get one of the nine victories he needs to become the winningest coach in history.

Michigan, Oklahoma and Notre Dame, ranked 1-2-3 in The Associated Press pre-season poll, all will be idle until next weekend. However, fourth-ranked Alabama visits Louisiana State for a nationally televised (ABC-TV, 8 p.m., CDT) Southeastern Conference game; eighth-ranked Pitt, last year's runner-up, entertains Illinois, and Georgia, only No. 10 in the pre-season poll, is home against Tennessee in another SEC

The rest of the Top Ten includes fifth-ranked Southern California, No. 6 Nebraska, seventh-rated Penn State and No. 9

Four members of the Second Ten will be in action. No. 14 Mississippi State meets Memphis State at Jackson, Miss., No. 16 Brigham Young visits Long Beach State, No. 17 Florida seeks revenge for last year's embarrassment against Miami,






