ager Frank Robinson of the San Francisco Giants said Friday that a fight between Giants' fans and Los Angeles Dodger outfielder Reggie Smith wouldn't have happened Thursday night if Dodger Manager Tom Lasorda had kept his players in

"If Lasorda would keep his club in the dugout, it wouldn't have happened," said Robinson of the fight which sent Smith into the stands to tussle with the fans. "But he's got his head in the TV camera. If the players had stayed in the dugout, it wouldn't have happened.'

Thursday night's off-field events, which resulted in nine fans being arrested, began in the sixth inning of what turned out to be a 7-3 Dodger victory over the Giants.

Lasorda complained to a security guard about an obnoxious fan sitting behind the Dodgers' dugout.

"He was harassing our ballplayers," Lasorda said. "He was calling 'em names. A fan don't have the harassing our players. If you don't,

we'll have problems." Problems were right. Smith sauntered out of the dugout, apparently to see what all the fuss was about, and that's when the brawl really got started

Smith said the heckler challenged him. "He said to me 'If I come down onto the field, my company will lose a \$40,000-a-year employee. If I break your neck, you guys may lose the

pennant race. Smith said the man, later identified by police as Michael Dooley, 37

of Menlo Park, then threw a plastic souvenir helmet at him. "He whizzed the thing at me and I

went after him," Smith said. Dooley and the other fans were cited at Candlestick Park on charges ranging from disturbing the peace to resisting arrest. One person, Clinton Schreiber, 33, of San Jose, was cited for threatening a police officer.
