### It's all hash today

• If Wisconsin beats Ohio State today at Madison, it would be the first time since 1965 that Ohio State and Michigan have lost to the same Big Ten foe in the same season. Wow, 16 years!

• "I'm glad to see underdogs like Iowa, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota and Indiana coming up in the Big Ten," Iowa athletic director Bump Elliott told the Linn County I Club Friday noon.

"Our conference is going to have to convince Michigan and Ohio State it's not necessary for them to meet in the final game for the title every season. Maybe they ought to open the season against each other for a change."

Bump said, incidentally, the Big Ten no longer requires members to play conference foes only in November.

"It would be possible for us to play Iowa State after our conference season is completed," he said. "Some people have suggested that. However, I think it probably is better to play Iowa State early in the season and get the game out of the way."

"A loss then is hard for either team to take, but it doesn't have to ruin a season. Look at 1977, when we resumed the Iowa State series. Iowa won, but Earle Bruce still brought Iowa State to an 8-3 season and a bowl game."

The Iowa director also noted Iowa will close the season against Minnesota each year starting in 1983. He said he likes that because (1) it provides a natural rivalry for a season climax, and (2) presumably the Gophers will be playing inside the H.H. Humphrey MetroDome in 1982.

• Guess we left Coach Denny Green's press conference too soon after Northwestern's 64-0 loss to Iowa. Mike Kiley, who covered for the Chicago Tribune, said Green told the news media:

"One of these days one of us isn't going to show up. I don't know which of us that will be."

Later in the week, however, Green was quoted as saying:

"I die a thousand deaths during a game like the one with Iowa, but all that makes me is fighting mad. That word p-i-t-y, I detest it. A lot of people in the stands, that's what they feel. A lot of people reading the papers, that's what they feel. I don't want that. If a good butt-kicking is what we deserve, give it to us and spare the pity. The only way to react to a butt-kicking is to fight back, and I think that's what we'll do. Am I the eternal optimist? Yes. Do I know how to turn a program around? Yes. Will I? Yes. But it won't be painless."

• Steve Waite, 6-11 former Iowa center, is playing pro basketball for a team in Ortez, France. Steve went there in mid-August and his team had won its first two games — by one point each — the last time he phoned his parents, the Jack Waite of North Liberty and Iowa City.

"Paul Henderson, formerly of USC, has played with Ortez three seasons," Jack said, "and he was high in their opener with 35 points. Steve led in the second one — over LeMans — with 22 points and 17 rebounds."

Steve said he is enjoying himself. He has a three-bedroom house in Ortez (southeastern corner of France) and the use of a French-made Chrysler.

"Steve said he was surprised to see Steve Krafclisin at one of the games," Jack related. "Krafclisin had tryouts with Italian and Spanish teams, but apparently both wanted a big name. He turned down an offer from a Belgian team and returned to Chicago. William Mayfield, we understand, is playing for an Italian team."

Steve was an A student at Iowa. He debated whether to enter law school or seek his MBA in business. They'll have to wait.

# Center Point's star rises with 8-2 victory

CENTER POINT — It didn't go according to script, but Center Point won the battle of unbeaten Tri-Rivers Conference football powers here Friday night before a standing-room-only crowd.

The Pointers scored the first time they handled the ball and wound up with an 8-2 victory over Starmont in a game that was expected to be a high-scoring affair.

But rain, which helped produce eight lost fumbles, and intense rivalry turned it into a defensive

struggle that went right down to the wire.

Coach Ted Rogers' defending champs marched 74 yards with the opening kickoff for the game's only TD. It took 14 plays and Andy Siechert carried it over from the four.

Siechert, who had 132 yards in 24 carries, also ran for the extra point.

The only other scoring came just as the first quarter ended when Center Point fumbled at its own five. Quarterback Kevin Kudrna fell on the ball in the end zone for a Starmont safety.

## Area Football Roundup

Dave Barclay's Stars had plenty of opportunities to score. They had a drive bog down with a fumble on the Center Point one, a play that set the stage for the 2-point safety.

Dave Rima actually hit Paul

Gaffney for a touchdown midway in the second period, but the play was called back by penalty. That drive bogged down on the 15.

Sarmont got to the Pointers' 11 in the third period where the Center Point defense held and the losers fumbled later in the period at the Center Point 28.

The last bid came with about three minutes to go when Starmont's Jeff Johans recovered a fumble on the Center Point 20. The Stars got to the 13, where a fourth down pass went astray.

"We had plenty of chances,"

admitted Starmont Coach Dave Barclay, a former Upper Iowa University teammate of Center Point boss Rogers. "But we didn't capitalize on our opportunities."

"Yes the rain hurt, but it hurt both teams. It was a tough one to lose, but we still can have a heck of a good season."

Barclay admitted that an ankle injury to running star Mike Breckenfelder hurt the Stars' cause. Mike had 50 yards on 11 carries in the first half, but carried the ball only twice in the last two periods.

# Warriors escape hungry Cougars

Football polls. Hogwash! Forget them when Cedar Rapids Washington meets Kennedy on Friday.

Washington's unbeaten Warriors, emerging with a 14-12 victory over Kennedy Friday night at Kingston Stadium, will probably still be ranked No. 1 next week. But Kennedy's valiant Cougars may at least be picked "No. 1½."

It was a textbook Washington-Kennedy thriller. The Warriors (6-0) escaped with timely defensive plays to boost their Mississippi Valley Conference record to 4-0. Kennedy is 2-4 overall and 2-3 in the Valley.

"This was the best effort by a Kennedy team since I've been here," said Cougar Coach Greg Reed, who's been here six seasons. "It was a hard one to lose, but we're not holding our heads. If Washington is No. 1, and they certainly deserve to be, then our kids played as well as any in the state of Iowa."

And Washington Coach Wally Sheets added, "Kennedy deserves a hell of a lot of credit. They beat us up front. They did a good job of preparing for us."

Not only were coaches praising the Kennedy effort, but so were players. Washington senior defensive back Alan Carlson, who intercepted three passes, was still shaking his head.

"Kennedy is a damn good ball club, and they played up to their ability tonight," said Carlson, who has five pass thefts this season. "They hadn't been playing consistent all season, but now have it together."

Kennedy struck first blood, limiting the Washington running attack the first half (55 yards), and putting pressure on standout Warrior quarterback Brad White. White finished by hitting on 13 of 22 passes for 133 yards, but had two interceptions.

The Cougars opened a scoreless game with 4:37 to go in the first half, as Scott Owens finished a nine-play, 46-yard drive with a two-yard scoring run. The march was aided by pass interference and offside penalties.

Then, in the night's key play, Cougar placement holder Dan Brendes couldn't handle the center snap and kicker Kevin Mote ended

up with the ball and nowhere to run. Washington came back three minutes later to take the lead, 7-6, on a 10-play, 60-yard march. White completed passes of eight yards to Mark Clymer, 13 to Kyle Akers and 15 to Bill Happel. Fullback Randy Nelson capped the drive with a four-yard run with 1:57 to go. Karl Rosenberg's kick was the big cushion.

Kennedy relied upon the strong arm of quarterback Brad Sleep, who completed 12 of 28 passes for 95 yards, to keep Washington off balance. Meanwhile, defenders Tom Strempe and Lynn Morstad, bothered by Washington's passing attack, Morstad was credited with 13 tackles, while Strempe had nine.

Washington tightened the knot on Kennedy the third quarter. The Cougars' Sleep dropped back to pass, but was intercepted by Kirk Sadilek on the 13-yard line. Sadilek returned five yards, before quarterback White rolled around right end the next play eight yards to make it 14-6 with 7:13 left.

But Kennedy wasn't finished. The Cougars held Washington on downs, then began to march from their own 24-yard line. An apparent fourth interception by Carlson was cancelled due to an interference penalty. The Cougars then reached the Warrior 15-yard line via yet another interference penalty and the running of Tom Murphy. Three plays later, Murphy bulled his way in from six yards to score with 7:19 left. The two-point conversion pass from Sleep to Owens was broken up by Washington's John Beckfield.

## Prairie shuts down LaSalle

John Oertel isn't about to pray for rain every Friday night, even though adverse weather hasn't bothered his Cedar Rapids Prairie football team one bit.

Facing soggy conditions for the second time in three weeks, the Hawks remained on the winning

track with a 14-0 victory over Cedar Rapids LaSalle in an East Central Iowa Conference game at Prairie.

"You know, we've played two pretty good games in the rain," said Oertel, who also was referring to a 13-7 win over Cedar Rapids Regis two weeks ago. "I really think the rain was to our advantage this time, even though we had to play a little

more conservatively."

It was one-two-three-punt for the most part, as a steady drizzle hampered the game plans of both clubs and favored the defense. Indeed, there were a total of 17 punts.

But fourth-ranked Prairie, enjoying its best start ever (6-0), tackled

# Linn-Mar success story continues with 16-0 win

Linn-Mar added another chapter to its turnaround story Friday night with a 16-0 victory over East Central Iowa Conference foe Benton Community in a steady rain at Armstrong Memorial Field.

Saturday night's homecoming win lifted the Lions, who were 1-8 last season, to 5-1 overall and 3-0 in the league. Meanwhile the Bobcats fell to 3-3 overall and 1-2 in loop play.

"We really controlled the ball well," said Linn-Mar Coach Greg Purnell, who took over the reins in August. "In the second half we were able to move the ball with some outstanding blocking."

Purnell cited center Matt Vesey, guards Andy Dunn and Todd Sasek, tackle Brent Wogahn and ends Ralph Oxley and Bill Bogert for an outstanding game.

Purnell also gave credit to his running backs, Greg Nielson and Dave Albert. Nielson, a junior, generated most of the Lions' offense, rushing for 150 yards on 31 carries and scoring one touchdown. Albert added 87 yards, 52 in the first half, on 13 carries.

"Nielson and Albert did a great job running the ball and especially hanging on

to it," said Purnell, whose team committed only one fumble.

The Lions scored on their first possession. Albert returned the opening kickoff to the 29 yard line, but a clipping penalty after the first play left the Lions deep in their own territory.

Albert got the ball rolling again with a 13-yard run and after a pass interference call on the next play, Linn-Mar moved into Benton territory for the first time.

After a series of six plays the Lions settled for a 32-yard field goal by Kevin Buisman.

The score remained 3-0 until the third quarter when quarterback Bob Busch took the ball in from the 1-yard line with 2:06 remaining. Busch's touchdown capped a 73-yard, 16-play drive.

On that drive, Nielson carried the ball 13 times and picked up 59 yards.

"At halftime, we just made some slight adjustments in our blocking when we are in scoring position," said Purnell, who coached at Dubuque Hempstead and Coe College before coming to Linn-Mar. "Those short traps we ran on fourth down plays were the key to our drives."

# What's with them Phillies — Can't they learn to bunt?

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — If the Philadelphia Phillies would learn to bunt correctly, they'd save themselves a lot of trouble.

For the second year in a row in post-season competition, the Phillies got embroiled in a controversy because one of their players bunted into a double play which the opponents thought was a triple play.

In both instances, the home plate umpire made an indecisive call, resulting in the game being protested.

The Phillies' latest bunt controversy occurred Friday in the fourth inning of their 6-2 triumph over the Montreal Expos in the third game of the National League playoffs.

National League President Chub Feeney is expected to rule on the protest Saturday. Last year at Houston, Feeney had a similar decision to make on an almost identical play involving the Phillies and Astros in the fourth game of the NL playoffs.

Both teams protested in that controversy but Feeney disallowed the protest because it had no bearing on the game's outcome.

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# Marion drills Anamosa; assumes Wamac lead

Todd Twachtman and Mike Skilling each rushed for over 100 yards and quarterback Jim Koeppen threw for 129 more as Marion blasted Anamosa, 33-7, in Wamac Conference football action Friday night at Thomas Park Field.

The Indians, who were ranked 7th in the Class 3A poll by the Associated Press this week, moved the ball at will against a helpless Blue Raider defense with Twachtman and Skilling leading the way.

"Our offensive line really blocked a ton tonight," said an obviously happy Dave Messerli, Marion's first-year head coach. "We felt all along that this (offensive line play) would be one of our strong points going into this season and you can see why."

The Indian offensive line of Eric Hundorf, Scott Kacena, Mike Lempe, Dave Deeney, Dan Howe and Darrin Vigen supplied the holes for Twachtman and Skilling as Marion rolled to a 20-0 halftime lead.

Twachtman, a 190-pound fullback, picked up 116 yards on 12 carries — including a 60-yard jaunt in the third quarter that gave the Indians a commanding 26-0 advantage. The 6-1 junior also caught four Koeppen passes for 37 yards and one touchdown, the scoring catch coming just :30 seconds before the intermission.

Skilling, a 140-pound halfback, was just as effective.

The 5-8 senior rushed for 111 yards on 13 carries — including a 42-yard scoring scamper with 5:12 left to play in the initial half.

Marion, which racked up 296 yards rushing and an additional 129 through the air, picked up 19 first downs to Anamosa's 11.

"We felt Koeppen threw about as well as we've seen him throw all year," added Messerli, "and our defense did an excellent job."

Halfback Curt Hall got Marion on the board for the first time with a four-yard touchdown run on the Indians' first possession and Skilling ran for the two-point conversion giving Marion a 8-0 lead. Skilling added his 42-yard scoring run in the second period before a hurried up Marion offense produced the 13-yard touchdown pass from Koeppen to Twachtman just before the break.

The defending state champs added scores on Twachtman's 60-yard dash and Brian Driscoll's 2-yard run to make it 33-0, Indians.

Bob Wageman, Anamosa's leading ground gainer, tallied the lone Blue Raider touchdown with 1:59 to play and David Mills booted the extra point to cap the scoring.

Koeppen, a 6-2 senior, connected on 10-13 passes — including four to senior split end Dan Dixon for 49 yards.

The win put Marion all alone atop the Wamac with a 4-0 mark, 5-1 overall, while the loss dropped Anamosa to 3-1 in conference, 3-3 on the season.

Drake's football team will try to topple a "prince" at Wichita State tonight.

The prince is Wichita quarterback Prince McJunkins, a dangerous operator who leads the Missouri Valley Conference in total offense and is coming off perhaps the best game of his career.

McJunkins will be the Bulldogs' main concern as they seek to extend their record to 6-0 for the season and 2-0 in the conference.

Northern Iowa, the pre-season favorite for the Mid-Continent Conference football title, will get an indication today if that forecast was accurate.

The Panthers, who have won only one of five non-conference games, open league play at Western Illinois, which already has one MCC victory under its belt and is 3-2 overall.
