Kennedy aerial blitzes sink Hempstead, 34-25

Senior wingback Jon Bredeson hauled in three touchdown passes from quarterback Brad Sleep as Cedar Rapids Kennedy upset Dubuque Hempstead, 34-25, in Mississippi Valley Conference football action Friday night at Kingston Stadium.

Bredeson, a 5-9, 150-pound senior, caught nine passes on the evening for 170 yards. He also picked off three errant Hempstead passes from his free safety position to cap what was probably his greatest game ever.

Hempstead, now 4-2 in Valley play and 5-3 overall, got a break early when Kennedy's John Smith mishandled the opening kickoff and the Mustangs recovered the ball on the Cougar 29-yard line. Seven plays later, quarterback Todd Welu went in from 12 yards out on a keeper and Tom Riedl booted the extra point for a 7-0 lead.

But the Mustangs' Oscar Sanchez took the ensuing kickoff and raced 85 yards for a touchdown and Riedl blasted the extra point kick to tie it, 14-14.

Riedl added a 32-vard field goal with 1:32 left in the period to give Hempstead a 17-14 lead before the Sleep to Bredeson combination got on track again.

On second and ten from the 50-yard line with 0:06 to play in the quarter, Sleep stepped back and fired a long pass to Bredeson who hauled it in at the Mustangs 30 and outran three defenders for the score. Mote followed with the conversion to make it 21-17, Kennedy.

The Cougars, now 4-3 in the MVC and 4-4 overall, forced a fumble on Hempstead's next series and took over on their own 37. Six plays later, Sleep found Bredeson on a 75 yard touchdown pass to give Kennedy a 27-17 margin.

But the Mustangs came roaring right back behind workhorse running back Mark Steines.

Steines, the MVC rushing leader, scored on a twoyard run to cap a ten play drive that started on the Hempstead 26. His two-point conversion cut Kennedy's lead to 27-25 and it was Steines who accounted for all 74 vards on 10 carries during the drive.

But this game belonged to the Cougars.

After a Mustang onside kick failed, Owens scampered 28 yards around the right end for Kennedy's fifth and final touchdown and Mote followed with the kick to give head coach Greg Reed's Cougars the 34-25 win.

Steines, who went into the contest with 520 yards rushing, gained 227 yards on 30 carries. But it was not enough to offset an outstanding team effort by Kennedy.

Sleep, a 6-0 junior, connected on 16 of 22 passes for 200 yards. Owens totaled 125 yards rushing on 16 carries and fullback Tom Murphy added 74 more on 10 tries for a sparkling 395 yard offensive attack.

It's official - Torre to Braves

ATLANTA (UPI) - Joe Torre, fired by the New York Mets after five straight losing seasons, was named Friday to replace Bobby Cox as manager of the Atlanta Braves.

Torre, who signed a three year contract with Atlanta club owner Ted Turner, said he's "about four and a half years better" and more confident than when he began managing the Mets in May, 1977. "I feel I'm better in all areas."

'What we want to do is win," said Turner. "That's the only thing that counts."

Details of the contract were not announced, but Al Thornwell, a Braves executive, said Turner agreed to Torre's request for a three-year contract instead of the shorter term he had sought.

Sources said Torre would be paid \$80,000 by the Braves in his first season and \$150,000 each in the two successive years.

The Braves have finished no

better than fourth in the last seven years, but Torre said he wanted the Braves to go into spring training with the idea that they're going to win the pennant, not just do better than last year. There's "no substitute for

being positive," said Torre. The 41-year-old Torre, a former Brave who also played for St. Louis and the New York Mets, said the club has untapped talent and he hopes to "make things

happen in a very positive way." He blamed the Braves' not-sohot season this year (they finished fifth) on "inconsistency in the pitching staff." He called pitching "the only thing you can count on" and said he firmly believed that "good pitching can stop good hitting."

There was no immediate announcement concerning members of the Mets' coaching staff who might join Torre in Atlanta, but there was speculation that former pitchers Bob Gibson and Rube Walker would be making the change.
