

## Hawkeye loss

· You will read and hear a great many words of praise for Dr. Robert F. Ray, Iowa's Big Ten faculty representative for athletics who died Wednesday, and you can believe all of them.

Bob was honest, very intelligent, highly articulate, unusually well educated and he possessed great powers of leadership and the ability to work with people. He was a good husband and father as well as a loyal friend.

Perhaps Bob's outstanding attribute for his job as faculty representative to the Big Ten was this: He never lost sight of the premise that college athletes should be students, and athletics are only one function of an education institution. It's not easy for administrators to resist the win-at-any-cost pressure of big-time sports.

His was always the voice of moderation, of common sense. That's why he was president of the NCAA for two years, as well as president of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

Another of Bob's virtues was durability. He was appointed faculty representative by President Virgil M. Hancher in 1955, and his 27-year tenure was by far the longest of any currently serving in the Big Ten.

His closest competitor for length of service was Frank Remington, who has been Wisconsin's faculty rep for 11 years. Bob served with five different reps from each of Illinois, Minnesota and Northwestern, four each from Indiana, Michigan State, Ohio State and Wisconsin, three from Purdue and two from Michigan.

Indeed, he had been appointed (or re-appointed) to the job by four differents Iowa presidents Hancher, Howard Bowen, Sandy Boyd and James Freedman - plus at least one acting president.

Since Bob was named faculty rep in 1955, Iowa has had three athletic directors, six head football coaches, five head basketball coaches, plus many in the small-revenue sports. The only Hawkeye head coach who comes close to his tenure is Chuck Zwiener, who has been golf coach since 1958.

Bob also owned a refreshing sense of humor, which usually surfaced in public speeches. He was pretty close to the top of his game last Dec. 30 while serving as emcee for the Iowa party at the Palladium in Los Angeles.

"Iowa has come halfway across the continent to play a homecoming game in the Rose Bowl," Bob said, calling attention to the estimated 20,000 Iowans who flocked to Pasadena. "We don't intend to let the Big Ten go to the dogs (Washington Huskies).

'We often are reminded our state doesn't have as many entertainment attractions as the Los Angeles area. It's true we don't have a Disneyland in Iowa, but we're thinking of putting a fence

• Nobody in football had a better completion percentage last season than Chuck Long, Iowa's soph quarterback. He completed the only pass he threw.

Chuck is from Wheaton, Ill. Can you name Wheaton's most famous football player of all time?

Sure, Red Grange, Illinois leg-end of 1923, '24 and '25 who was called "the Wheaton Iceman" because his summer job was delivering ice in those days before electric appliances.


"Oh, yes, I know all about Red Grange," Chuck told us. "He comes back to Wheaton (from his home in Florida) about once a year. His name is still big there.

"I met him during my junior year and again the next year when he came back to lead the homecoming parade for Wheaton Central. I went to Wheaton North, which wasn't in existence when he played. He came over to wish us well."

Chuck said he doesn't have a nickname, but he adds, "Oh, some of the newspapers have had fun with my name in stories or headlines. For instance, one paper said, 'Chuck throws long.'

# Regis starts fast to top Kennedy, 13-7

If anything, Eastern Iowa's first high school football game of the season Thursday night proved one team had better inexperience than

Cedar Rapids Regis parlayed a productive option attack and superior line play into a 13-7 victory over eastside Metro rival Cedar Rapids Kennedy before about 4,000 fans at Kingston Stadium.

It was Regis' fourth straight victory over Kennedy, and all have been decided by seven points or less. Coach Tom Good also posted his 146th career victory at the Royals' helm.

Good and his counterpart, Greg Reed, shared a common theme in their post-game remarks: inexperi-

"Our kids with the inexperience did an excellent job in the line," Good said. "It was a very encouraging game, but I see an awful lot of things we need to work on. We have the potential to be a good ball club, but it'll be challenge for us every week."

Reed, whose team was held to 40 yards rushing, was a picture of disgust and frustration in the Cougar lockerroom

'Attribute this loss to inexperience," he said. "In the first half the inexperience burned us. We didn't grow up until the second half."

Indeed, the Cougars' 5-2 defense limited Regis to 61 total yards in the second half. The Royals had piled up 151 yards and their two touchdowns in the first two quarters.

# Young sizzles for BYU

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) - Steve Young passed for 271 yards and a touchdown and ran for a second TD Thursday night to lead 19th-ranked Brigham Young to a 27-0 rout of Nevada-Las Vegas.

The victory avenged BYU's 45-41 loss to the Rebels in the last 20 seconds of their 1981 meeting and

spoiled the coaching debut of UNLV's Harvey Hyde. The last time the Rebels were blanked was in the the third game of the 1978 season.

In the other game Thursday night, Stephen F. Austin State University used a strong second quarter to beat Prairie View A&M, Young, who played behind All-

America quarterback Jim McMahon last year, hit 19-of-26 passes. He was 7-of-8 for 110 yards in the first quarter, including a 3-yard touchdown pass to Scott Pettes with 5:33 Two plays into the second quar-

ter, Cougar safety Kevin Walker intercepted Steve White's pass on the Rebel 28. Following a 19-yard pass, Young handed off to running back Casey Tiumalu, who scampered off tackle for 9 yards and a touchdown.

Junior quarterback Eric Krzmarzick replaced Young with 59 seconds to go in the second quarter and tossed a 5-yard pass to running back Jimmy Jones, upping the Cougars' lead to 20-0 at the half. Young made it 27-0 and closed the scoring when he scored from a yard out on a keeper in the third quarter.

The Rebels crossed the 50-yard line just once in the first half but the Cougars picked off a pass at their 48. UNLV failed to cross midfield again until the third period, reaching the Cougars' 49 with the benefit of a 15-yard penalty. The Rebels made it as far as BYU's 23 before a 15-yard holding penalty forced them to punt from the Cougars' 39, ending their best and last threat.

Brigham Young rolled up 468 yards to 160 for the Rebels.

# Tigers get relief with Lopez

Aurelio Lopez's worries about lack of work are over if he pitches the way he did Thursday night against the California Angels.

Lopez, his effectiveness restored by a stay in the minors, hurled six innings of one-hit relief to help the Detroit Tigers gain a 6-3 victory over California at Tiger Stadium.

-Rookie Glenn Wilson singled in the tie-breaking run in the fifth inning to extend his hitting streak to 19 games. And Lance Parrish set a record for home runs by a Detroit catcher by hitting two of them to help Detroit take 2-of-3 from a team that is challenging for the AL West lead.

"That's the way Lopez pitched when he was a good reliever two or three years ago," California Manager Gene Mauch said. "I couldn't believe it then and I still can't believe it."

"He threw much better," Detroit Manager Sparky Anderson said. "He threw this time like he did before. "I'm certainly going to suggest that he pitch winter ball. In fact, I'll be the first one to suggest it."

Lopez did not pitch winter ball two seasons ago after posting a 13-6 record and getting 21 saves for the second year in a row. He immediately declined to just three saves and a 5-2 mark in 1981 and was 1-1 with no saves and a 6.67 ERA at the time he was sent to the minors.

His ERA is still unhealthy at 5.45 but the 33-year-old right-hander is now 2-1. He took over for starter double-header, 2-1, before dropping



#### Prep coach wins in court BROWNWOOD

Texas (AP) - A high school football coach who settled out of court with ABC-TV after suing the network for suggesting that he hit his players says he is ready to put the matter behind him.

The out of court settlement was reached Tuesday at an Austin bank, Wood said Wednesday. Wood, 68, declined to reveal terms of the settlement but said published reports that he sought \$20,000 were too low.Wood's civil suit stemmed from a Sept. 15 broadcast of "Good Morning America" in which he appeared as a panelist during a segment on violence in high school football.





## Malone heading for Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Moses Malone, the two-time most valuable player in the National Basketball Association, signed an offer sheet for a reported \$13.2 million for six years with the Philadelphia 76ers Thursday.

Malone's agent, Lee Fentress, refused to disclose the terms of the 76ers' offer.

But earlier Thursday, radio station WSSV in Malone's home town of Petersburg, Va., reported the 76ers had offered Malone a \$13.2 million contract over the next six years. The station said it was told by Malone that the 76ers' contract would pay him about \$2.2 million a

"Moses brings a great strength to us offensively," 76ers Coach Billy Cunningham said at a press conference to announce the signing.

Last season, Malone won his second MVP Award. He played in 81 games with the Houston Rockets and averaged 31.1 points and better than 14 rebounds per game. In the playoffs, he averaged 24.2 points per game and more than 16 rebounds.

"Most important," Cunningham said, "he has improved every year he has been a professional."

Cunningham said he would rank Malone with the calibre of 76ers forward Julius Erving, the NBA's MVP in 1980-81, but predicted there would be no conflict between the two stars.

Again in the second set, Austin fell behind, 2-1, when she had her service broken, but she then won the next four games to assume command.

Cedar Rapids' Micki Schillig will meet unseeded Jennifer Mundel of South Africa today at 10 a.m. in the second round. Schillig is one of 76 women players remaining in competi-



SAN DIEGO (AP) - The National Football League has no intention of suspending or disciplining San Diego Chargers running back Chuck Muncie, who resumed practicing with his team after completing a 21-day drug treat-

ment program, a spokesman said. "The whole concept behind our drug rehabilitation program is that no punitive action will be taken," said Pete Abitante, a spokesman for NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

"Muncie entered the rehabilitation program of his own accord, came forward and sought treatment," Abitante said in a telephone interview from New York. "The owners have decided that players won't be punished if that's the case. If a player was being prosecuted on drug charges, that might be a different story.'

Muncie, the Chargers leading rusher for the past two seasons, rejoined his teammates Wednesday and took part in a two-hour practice session.

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) - Veteran quarterback Dan Pastorini has agreed in principle to terms with the Philadelphia Eagles and will take his place on the team's taxi squad, the Eagles announced Thursday.

In announcing the verbal agreement, Eagles General Manager Jim Murray said that Pastorini had to clean up some matters at his Los Angeles home but added, "He has agreed to come here."

#### Goble charged
