Linn-Mar 'jams' Regina in ECIC opener, 15-6

IOWA CITY — With the playing conditions about as navigable as a bowl of jam, the Linn-Mar Lions decided to go back to a plain old bread and butter offense.

With fullback Greg Nielson leading the way, the No.2-ranked Lions kept things simple as they hammered out a 15-6 victory over Iowa City Regina in high school football action at Regina Friday night.

Nielson carried the football 31 times through the mud, gaining 175 yards, as Linn-Mar upped its season record to 3-0 and its East Central Iowa Conference record to 1-0. Regina is now 2-1 and 0-1.

'Since the footing was going to be bad, we decided to just go right

at 'em," said Nielson, who was effective all night, gaining 88 yards in the first half and 87 in the second.

'You can't make a lot of quick cuts on a field like that. You just have to keep your feet moving and keep going forward. The linemen really did a super job. I can't say enough about them."

Despite the low score, the Lions actually controlled the ball most of the night, piling up 352 yards and 21 first downs. They had the football eight different times and seven of those times moved it forward at least 30 yards. They had four drives of 45 yards or more, three of which resulted in points and the last of which ran the final seven minutes off the clock.

The longest of their drives came

in their first possession as the visitors marched 77 yards in 10 plays. Nielson carried on six straight plays at one point but it was wingback Scott Underwood who sloshed the final 33 yards into the end zone. Ron Rittgers' extra point kick was wide but the Lions led, 6-0.

They advanced the ball 44 yards in their next possession, too, but that drive ended with their only turnover of the game - an intercep-

tion by the Regals' Dan Wirtz. Rittgers barely missed a 47-yard field goal after a 30-yard march the next time they had the ball but they got it back moments later on a controversial interception by defensive lineman Joe Heyer.

Almost everything a fan could hope to see in a football game was on display in Kingston Stadium Friday night.

And, for that matter, everything that would make a coach's knees quiver and his stomach ache, too.

Cedar Rapids Washington outlasted crosstown rival Kennedy, 21-14, but it wasn't your standard game. Not by a country mile.

To be sure, there was plenty of "normal" excitement in abundance: pass interceptions, fumbles lost, quarterback sacks, long pass completions and longer runs

Sprinkle in a bit of the unusual, like a center snap that sailed over the punter's head, a couple of flea flickers and a halfback pass that appeared doomed for failure only to turn into a touchdown, and you've got excitement!

The workman-like Warrior troops of Wally Sheets mounted what was a seemingly unclimbable 21-0 lead in the first half.

Kennedy came out for the second half after sputtering and misfiring most of the first two periods. The trend continued, and the Cougars punted after three downs.

Wash tailback Randy Nelson, who turned in a stellar performance by picking up 144 yards on 28

committed his only error of the night — a fumble.

Kennedy, with the ball on the Warrior 42, caught fire.

Cougar quarterback Brad Sleep dropped a long aerial over a defensive back and into the hands of Rick Fry for 31 yards. Three plays and three yards later, tailback Tim Batterson rolled right and seemed to be looking for an opportunity to pass. Kennedy's receivers were covered, but several blockers came to Batterson's aid and the 6-3, 197pounder darted up the sideline for a

Following a 14-yard gain, the Warriors lost 1, 1, and 7 yards. The fourth down snap was short and quarterback-punter Bob Happel was nailed for a short loss

It wasn't long before Kennedy closed the game to 21-14.

Sleep connected with Fry, who was waiting in the right flat, and the scatback immediately flicked the ball to running back John Smith. The play went for 20 yards.

On the next snap Sleep fired a pass to Batterson, again in the right flat, and Batterson danced up the sideline for a 14-yard touchdown.

Early in the fourth quarter, events turned from bad to worse for Washington. A Happel punt bounced its way to the Kennedy two, but a penalty brought the ball back. The next snap sailed over

Marion hikes Wamac string in 37-6 stroll

Oddsmakers would have made Marion a prohibitive favorite to defeat Vinton Friday night, and they wouldn't have lost a dime.

The Indians, recording their 20th straight Wamac Conference victory, opened defense of their league title with a 37-6 waltz over Vinton in high school football at Marion.

In winning its second game in three starts, Marion posted its 15th consecutive victory over the Vikings. The Indians have not lost to Vinton since 1967 and have not dropped a Wamac game since an

overtime defeat to Anamosa in 1979. "Everybody thought we should have won, yet we played a good football game," Marion Coach Dave Messerli said. "We didn't mess around and that's why I'm proud of

the way we played.

"We're excited because this was a big game. It started our Wamac season off on the right note and we got to play a lot of kids. But it was also a very tough game, because this was one of the hardest hitting Vinton teams I've seen recently."

Most of Marion's starters went to the sidelines midway through the third period, carrying with them a 37-0 cushion. Marion's front-liners were impressive, as they outgained Vinton 271-105 and had no turn-

overs nor penalties. The Indians, ranked No. 10 in Class 3A by UPI, gained 315 of their 356 total yards on the ground. Jeff Wisehart and Todd Twachtmann -Mr. Inside, Mr. Outside? - combined for 28 carries and 215 yards.

Twachtmann scored two touchdowns, rushed for 93 yards, inter-

cepted a pass and kicked an extra point. He increased his 3-game season totals to 388 rushing yards, seven touchdowns and 44 points.

Wisehart was just as impressive, accumulating 122 yards on just eight carries, darting outside for runs of 53 and 41 yards. He scored once and ran for two, two-point conversions.

The Indians specialized in long drives in the first half, rolling to a 22-0 lead on marches measuring 76, 78 and 95 yards.

On its first possession, Marion used 11 rushing plays to move 76 yards. Twachtmann carried seven times for 33 yards, and Wisehart capped the drive with a four-yard run over the left side. Quarterback Steve Panek, Twachtmann and Wisehart combined on a triple-option run for the two-point conversion.

Five minutes later, Marion em-

barked on a five-play, 78-yard series that ended in Twachtmann's 16-yard sweep of the left end. Wisehart scooted 41 yards on the second play, as only Kipp Schoettmer's tackle saved a touchdown.

Vinton appeared to have cut the deficit to 14-6 with 6:12 left in the half, but quarterback Jim Belknap's marvelous 53-yard run was nullified by a clipping call.

Charlie Hite's 36-yard punt pinned Marion back on its five-yard line, but that didn't stop the Indians for long. Six plays into the series, Wisehart followed a beautiful block by Chris Kalous and went 53 yards to the Vinton 21. After Kalous hauled in a 20-yard pass from Panek, Twachtmann scored from the one with 44 seconds left in the half.

Panek posted his first touchdown pass of the season, hitting Kirk

Mahurin on a six-yard slant with 6:25 left in the third quarter. Scott Wilson's recovery of Belknap's fumble at the Viking 16 set up the score.

Junior Mike Simpson completed Marion's scoring, returning a punt 50 yards down the right sideline for his first varsity touchdown. Twachtmann's kick made it 37-0.

Belknap, a 5-foot-11 senior who ran for 78 yards and passed for 48, got Vinton on the board with 10:29 left. He found 6-3 senior Randy Scheel in the back of the end zone for an eight-yard scoring strike. Highlighting the six-play series was Belknap's 28-yard scramble and his 20-yard pass to Todd Bohnsack.

Scheel was the game's top receiver with three catches for 28 yards. Vinton's Steve Schwartz had 60 yards on 10 carries.

J-Hawks' wait over, whip City High, 22-8

IOWA CITY - Welcome to the Mississippi Valley Conference, Iowa City High Little Hawks. And, relax Bill Calloway. Wel-

come to victory lane.

The road was arduous the past two weeks for Cedar Rapids Jefferson's J-Hawks and first-year football coach Calloway. Two straight setbacks by a combined 49-13 margin made winning a game a must. The J-Hawks must have forgotten their trials and took their frustration out on Iowa City High Friday night at Frank Bates Field.

The J-Hawks combined the passing combination of Steve Wise to Bob Driscoll and a stiff defense for a convincing 22-8 victory over the Little Hawks. The victory made Jefferson 1-1 in the Valley, and 1-2 overall. City High, 1-2 overall and saddled with its second straight loss, will have to wait another year to stop Jefferson. The Little Hawks haven't beaten Jefferson since 1961.

Calloway, meanwhile, appeared like a man acquitted of all wrongdoing. If there was a "monkey" on his back, it was off looking for another

"The media reminds us of our problems the last two games," said

Calloway, "but last week against (Dubuque) Hempstead, we turned the ball over seven times and dropped six or seven passes. We beat ourselves.

"The kids have come back. They showed character. The offensive line has come miles for us. As a coach, it has been a period of adjustment and I'm blaming myself. We have a ways to go, but we're getting there."

The J-Hawks' interior line protected quarterback Wise with ferocity. Wise uncorked 14 passes, hitting on 11 for 157 yards and three touchdowns. His favorite target, senior tight end Bob Driscoll, couldn't have been happier.

The 191-pounder caused City High's secondary fits all evening, as he crossed over, around and under the coverage for seven receptions and 120 yards.

Driscoll highlighted the opening series of the game, capping a fiveplay, 55-yard march with a 20-yard scoring reception only three minutes into the first quarter. The extra point attempt failed.

The J-Hawks' air show set the tempo for the night on a wet and sloppy turf. Jefferson marched back after stopping City High on the 32yard line. Wise directed a nine-play • Please turn to page 4B: J-Hawks



WEST BRANCH - Turning disadvantage to advantage, West Branch fashioned its fourth straight shutout victory over Solon Friday night and earned the team-to-beat tag in the Eastern Iowa Hawkeye Conference football sweepstakes.

Both teams went into the game 2-0 and unscored upon.

Pitting its speed against Solon's superior size, West Branch figured to need a dry field to be at its best. Instead it got a field made mucky by six hours of rain.

But, as Coach Tom Nosbish observed, "the mud seemed to slow Solon more than it did us."

Led by 170-pound senior workhorse Willie Ramsey's 117 yards on 17 carries and 160-pound junior Brad Bartelt's 84, also on 17 carries, the Bears outrushed the Spartans, 287-113.

Ramsey also was in on 15 tackles. West Branch got much of its yardage up the middle, which it had been expected to avoid. And it got none passing, where it had been expected to try for much.
