

#### Long shot

• Statistics, they say, are like a bikini: what they reveal is interesting, but what they conceal is vital.

For instance, this week Iowa ranks dead last in Big Ten passing, averaging only 120.2 yards per game. Yet lowa's Chuck Long leads the league in passing efficiency and has completed a hot 71.11 pct.

Incidentally, the Big Ten record for passing percentage in one season is 68.2 percent, set by Purdue's Mark Herrmann in 1980. That was for conference games only, of course. Long's 71.11 percent includes all four games so far, but he was 9 for 11 in his only league contest.

The Big Ten record for best completion percentage in one game (10 or more attempts) is held by Purdue's Dale Samuels. He hit 12 of 14 against Illinois in 1952.

#### Forsch persisted

• Long-time Cedar Rapids pro baseball fans got a thrill out of seeing Bob Forsch pitch the Cardinals to their 7-0 win over Atlanta in the National League playoff opener.

Bob was drafted by the parent Cardinals — as an infielder — in the 38th round in 1968. He was very persistent, however, even though he batted .224 at Sarasota in 1968, .203 at Lewiston in 1969 and .235 at Modesto, also in 1969.

In 1970 the Cards sent him back to Modesto but he hit only .149 before they packed him off to Cedar Rapids. His average skidded to .088 here. He switched to pitching. His start wasn't impressive, either, as he hurled in one game and was shelled for six hits and four earned runs in three innings.

Back to Lewiston, he had a 2-3 record, winning a promotion to Cedar Rapids in 1971. Then his pitching career really took off. He finished 11-7 here and four years later he made the bigs.

While here, Bob met a Cedar Rapids teacher he later married. The TV cameras showed her in the stands as he stopped the Braves on three singles. He also cracked two singles and a sacrifice fly.

# Kennedy dunked 7-0 by Hempstead

Prep football's version of the trickle down theory went swimmingly Friday night, but it proved little more than which team had a better 10-yard freestyle relay.

Dubuque Hempstead's Mustangs, arguably the No. 1-ranked mudders in the state, dunked Cedar Rapids Kennedy with a 7-0 overtime triumph under conditions fit only for ducks and pigs.

Taking note of a driving rain that turned the Kingston Stadium field into a quagmire, Kennedy Coach Greg Reed said he thought the Mississippi Valley Conference contest could have been postponed until this after-

"It was ridiculous to have to play a football game in that kind of weather," Reed said. "It

proved nothing. Sure, we wanted to throw the football, but how could you?"

Kennedy was No. 1 in conference passing vards and had the league's top receiver (Rick Fry) and top passer (Brad Sleep). But the footing was hardly conducive to passing.

Reed apparently wasn't singing the song of sore loser, either.

"I told our coaching staff during the timeout before the overtime that this game doesn't prove anything - regardless of who wins or loses."

Brett Bordewick's four-yard run on third down in the overtime, plus Dennis Debolt's conversion kick, was the only scoring. Kennedy had four downs from the 10-yard line, but suffered an incompletion, one rushing loss and two quarterback sacks. Sleep's pass into the end zone on second down

just eluded Steve Schenatzki's grasp.

The outcome left Hempstead with a 4-2 overall record and 3-1 in the Valley, while Kennedy slipped to 2-4 and 2-3.

Hempstead Coach Bob Timmerman indicated his teams are at their best under the most adverse conditions.

"Our motto is 'Pain is good, but rain is better," he said. "We like it best when it's

Hempstead gained all of its 112 yards on the ground, while Kennedy managed just 44 rushing yards and 43 passing. Each team punted eight times and had five fumbles.

Kennedy had the best scoring chances in regulation time, taking possession three times inside the Hempstead 20-yard line in the third

Mustang back Doug Dunham fumbled on

the first scrimmage play of the second half and Jeff Blake recovered at the Hempstead 27. Three runs by Tim Batterson for 11 yards and two rushes by John Smith for eight gave Kennedy a fourth-and-three at the Hempstead



But Kevin Mote's 26-yard field goal try barely missed to the right.

# Pointers Linn-Mar sails past Benton

VAN HORNE - Homecoming went aground Friday night at Bobcat Lake. Only Linn-Mar's Lions swam home happy

The unbeaten Lions struck for two quick touchdowns in the opening four minutes, taking advantage of Benton Community turnovers, before coasting home to a 26-8 rainplagued East Central Iowa Conference football victory.

The Lions boosted their season mark to 6-0 and 3-0 in the ECIC, setting up next week's league show-

down against Cedar Rapids LaSalle, also 3-0 in the conference. Benton's Bobcats, suffering from five interceptions, two fumbles and drivestopping penalties, fell to 1-5 and 0-3 in the conference.

Linn-Mar, ranked No. 2 by AP and No. 3 by UPI, hoisted its sail early before the playing field became "Cape Van Horne." The Lions' Kevin Buisman and Scott Underwood each made interceptions deep within Bobcat territory to set up two touchdowns in the first four min-

Buisman nabbed Benton starting quarterback Steve Rohlena's pass at

the 31-yard line and returned seven yards to the 24. Three plays later, Lions' quarterback Bob Busch raced 20 yards to score. Two minutes later, Underwood intercepted No. 2 Benton quarterback Mike Garber's pass at the 11-yard line. In another three-play series, Underwood circled left end nine yards to score. Ron Rittgers booted both extra

"In a game like this, with the rain, I was very pleased with our kicking game," said Lions' Coach Greg Purnell. "We have six wins now heading into the toughest part of our schedule.'

TODAY in college football

Indeed, the Lions' kicking game shined brightly in the rain. Punter Gary Dvorak twice booted 46 yards out of trouble.

"You have to concentrate more when it rains. I like to think I punt The Lions were methodical the

first 24 minutes, accumulating 93 yards to Benton's 26, not allowing the Bobcats to cross the Linn-Mar 40-yard line.

# Sutton stays calm, keeps Brewers alive

MILWAUKEE (UPI) - Milwaukee Brewers right-hander Don Sutton, who claims he doesn't feel any pressure pitching in big games, wasn't even rattled Friday by a home run that might not have been a home run.

Sutton blanked hard-hitting California through seven innings, but Angel catcher Bob Boone led off the eighth with a deep fly ball that left fielder Ben Oglivie tried to catch at

bleachers reached over and took the catch away from him.

The disputed homer sparked a three-run California rally and Sutton was lifted after giving up a runscoring double to Don Baylor. Pete Ladd, an unheralded rookie, then came on to preserve the 5-3 victory and save the Brewers from extinction in the best-of-five playoff series.

Sutton, who last Sunday beat the Baltimore Orioles to give the Brewers the American League Eastern Division title on the final day of the season, said he was unaffected by Boone's tainted homer.

"I think that the cause of the next two pitches not going where I wanted is the fact that I'm 37 and I've pitched over 4,000 innnings and I was running out of gas," said Sutton, acquired in a late-season deal with the Houston Astros.

Asked if he had ever given up a

home run like that, Sutton quipped: "When you've given up as many home runs as I have, it's hard to remember them all.'

Paul Molitor's two-run homer in the seventh, seemingly no more than insurance runs for Milwaukee at the time, turned out to be the winning hit. And Molitor, while acknowledging the Brewers' batting slump of late, said he never doubted they could still score runs.

"There was really no difference (in Milwaukee Friday)," Molitor said. "We scored five runs, but it's still below our season average (5.5 runs per game). We are capable of scoring more runs.

Molitor also said he and his teammates knew just what they were up against in Game Three. Trailing 2-0 in the series, they hardly needed a pep talk. "I think we have enough classy

and professional people that we don't have to have anybody tell us what our jobs are," said the Brewer third baseman. "We had it staring us Ladd again assumed the short

Led by junior defensive back Tony Seedorf and end Nick Slater, the Stars stopped Center Point on a fourth and goal at the one in the second period. Seedorf, who was credited with a touchdown-saving tackle on the crucial fourth down play, later picked off a Meyer pass that halted another Pointer drive just before the half.

Neither club could mount much on the ground, as Center Point finished with 136 yards compared to Starmont's 98 yard total.


MAQUOKETA stormed to a 22-0 halftime lead and sailed to a 30-0 Wamac Conference victory over Maquoketa Friday

Garvey also vehemently denied a report that there had been behindthe-scenes maneuvering to settle the impasse, perhaps in time to resume play next weekend.

"There's been no progress whatsoever," he said.

In another development, the NFLPA announced establishment of a loan program in connection with several regional lending institutions to enable striking players to borrow up to \$20,000 each to meet household expenses and monthly payments during the strike.

There was also a report that President Ronald Reagan may soon become involved in the strike that now has lasted 18 days.

Meanwhile, Dave Sheridan, an NFLPA spokesman, said many player representatives have been warned by management that the season will be called off if the strike is prolonged. "We've heard that before and we don't believe it for one minute. That's a lot of money to be throwing down the drain.'

# Clarence-Lowden shuts out Lincoln

STANWOOD — It isn't the game Larry Atwater likes, but it has taken his Clarence-Lowden team from the bottom to the top in Mid-East Iowa Conference football.

With 200-pound junior fullback Dave Eckert bulling for 100 yards and two second-half touchdowns on 28 carries, the Rebels used their ball-control offense, Lincoln Community errors and a torrential second-half rain to spoil the Lions' homecoming, 14-0 Friday night.

That set up Clarence-Lowden an 0-9 team last year - for a title showdown next Friday against invading Lisbon.

Both are 4-1 in Mid-East Iowa play, 5-1 for the season. Lincoln dropped to 3-2 and 3-3.

'The game went just the way we wanted it to go," Atwater said after ducking out of the downpour. "You know how much I'd like to pass, but ball-control is our game.

"The rain hurt Lincoln, no question. Jackson (Lincoln's clever 150pound junior quarterback, Scott Jackson) is a very good passer."

While the weather obviously handicapped the Lions, so did their mistakes. They committed 11 procedure and encroachment violations, and lost two of three fumbles.

"I thought we'd cured the mistakes, but we hadn't," Lincoln Coach Steve Richardson acknowledged when he emerged from lecturing his players on that subject.

'Yes, the rain hurt us, too. But take nothing away from Clarence-Lowden. They're one of the best teams we've played this season.

They play very well, they're well-coached. They deserved to win."

The Rebels consumed most of the first period on a drive that began on their own 15 after the opening kickoff and ended 17 plays later with Jackson's last-second knock-

down of a Shawn Stolte 4th-and-14 pass from the Lions' 19.

A delay-of-game penalty had forced the Rebels to take to the air. Much of the second quarter ticked away while Clarence-Lowden attempted to exploit Lincoln's botched punt attempt. That put the Rebels on the Lions' 44.

They got to the 13 in eight plays, but wound up punting from the 33 after another delay penalty and a 14yard sack of Stolte.

On the fourth play of that abortive thrust, an Eckert pass bamboozled Lincoln's defenses and seemed certain to produce a touchdown, but the ball went through the receiver's hands.

"Yes, I was frustrated when we got down deep and couldn't get it in," Atwater confessed. "But I checked myself - I told myself if the kids see me lose it, they're going to get rattled, too."

As intermission approached, Jackson ushered Lincoln 69 yards to the Rebels 11 - he ran 13 plays in 128 seconds - but a procedure penalty thwarted the threat.

Three plays into the second half, Clarence-Lowden tackle Larry Elijah recovered a Lincoln fumble on the Lions' 35. Eckert carried six times for 30 and went the last five with 6:51 left in the period.

# LaSalle, Prairie ready for key ECIC contest

LaSalle and Prairie square off tonight at 7:30 at Kingston Stadium in what could prove to be a pivotal game in the East Central Iowa Conference prep football race.

LaSalle is 4-1 overall and 3-0 in the conference. Prairie, the defending ECIC and Class 3A state champion, has won only one of its five games but is 1-1 in the league.

"Prairie is a lot better than their record indicates," LaSalle Coach Tom Kopatich said. "With only one loss, they still have hope in the conference. Their defense has really been tough, but mistakes have cost them.'

Kopatich complained about turnovers and penalties by his team, too, adding, "We really haven't set the world on fire yet. If we start playing as good as we can, I'd start feeling better.

LaSalle has won three straight since a 20-7 loss to No. 1-ranked Regis. The Lancers have outscored their three ECIC victims by a combined total of 56-6, including shutouts over Dyersville Beckman and Benton Community.




Sutton, however, said he was tired late in the game. "It could be four or five days before I can pitch effectively again," he said.
