Kennedy claws Little Hawks with awesome defense, 17-13

You didn't need to read Greg Reed's face to know Cedar Rapids Kennedy had just played one of the finest defensive games in his coaching career.

The Cougars, allowing Iowa City High only 15 yards rushing and forcing countless mistakes, downed the Little Hawks, 17-13, in Mississippi Valley Conference football at Kingston Stadium Friday night.

It left both teams with 3-4 overall records. Kennedy is 3-3 in the Valley, City High 2-3.

"It was an awesome defensive performance, the best we've had in five years at Kennedy," Reed beamed. "That's the third week in a row we've had good defense. And the offense put the ball in the end zone when they had to. The defense and special teams were just outstanding, though.'

Kennedy's defense was led by Jeff Blake, Paul Scott, Tim Woods and Bob Rose. In the second half, the Cougars threw City High for minus-10 yards rushing.

Blake had three sacks and a fumble recovery; Scott had eight tackles, including two sacks; Woods recovered two fumbles, returning one for a touchdown, and Rose had seven tackles and blocked a punt.

Meanwhile, quarterback Brad Friedrich for a 13-yard loss. Sleep rebounded from a miserable first half (1-of-9), completing 10-of-18 attempts for 124 yards and a touchdown in the final two quarters. He finished with 158 yards passing.

Reed no doubt will strive for sharper play Friday against Cedar Rapids Jefferson, though. The Cougars were assessed 14 penalties totaling 136 yards.

City High's defense was slightly better against the rush, allowing Kennedy 11 yards in 27 attempts minus-8 in the second half.

The Little Hawks played without starting quarterback Scott Flynn, a 6-foot-2 junior who suffered a concussion last week in a 19-0 win over Dubuque Wahlert. That forced John Friedrich into his first start.

"Flynn being out had a lot to do with our offensive problems," Brown said. "Friedrich was put in a terrible situation, because he hadn't played quarterback in two years.

"But Kennedy played a heckuva game and stopped our running game cold. We knew they had a good defense, but we thought we could run a little better on them."

Woods' 30-yard fumble return caught the ball. with 3:23 left in the first quarter, plus the first of two Kevin Mote kicks, gave Kennedy a 7-0 lead.

Neither team had a first down in the first 19 minutes. But Kennedy broke the ice on John Smith's 11yard sweep and a City High face mask penalty. Mote's 27-yard field goal increased the lead to 10-0 with 21/2 minutes left in the half.

Iowa City High scored with 13 seconds left in the half on a 9-yard pass from Friedrich to Tom Ward. Two major penalties on Kennedy aided the 76-yard, 2-minute drive.

The Cougars were on the verge of scoring on their second possession of the second half when Tim Batterson fumbled into the end zone after a 16-yard screen pass. City High's Steve Thorne recovered.

But on its next possession, Kennedy hiked the lead to 17-7 on a 7yard scoring strike from Sleep to Kris Kvach. Blake's fumble recovery at the 34, plus a 14-yard pass to Steve Schenatzki and a 13-yarder to Kvach set up the TD.

The Little Hawks managed to score a consolation touchdown with 11 seconds left on a 23-yard circus catch by Ward. He was flipped in the end zone by Rose, but still

Kvach caught four passes for 26 yards, Smith and Rick Fry each had two catches for 43, and Schenatzki Scott forced the fumble, sacking had two receptions for 30.

Marion crushes Anamosa, 43

ANAMOSA - Bob Algoe would rather have been wrong. He wasn't. Beyond their records - 4-0 in the Warnac Conference and 5-1 overall - Algoe's Anamosa Blue Raiders and the Marion Indians were not a match.

Dave Messerli's Marion crew took control at the first center-snap Friday night and rolled to a 43-0 victory that assured it at least a share of the Wamac Conference

The Indians can win it outright for the third straight time by beating the only remaining contender, Monticello (3-2), next Friday.

Marion has not lost in Wamac play since its 1979 meeting with Anamosa. The two shared the crown with Maquoketa that year.

A broken-down punt try gave Oelwein the ball on the Prairie 38 just over a minute later. Bailey scored on a one-yard keeper six plays later, putting the Huskies up, 12-7, with 5:25 left.

After trading turnovers and committing a pair of penalties, the Hawks were at their own three. Oelwein's Paul Langel then completed the scoring blitz with 2:53 to go by intercepting a Bill Shebetka pass and running 23 yards for a TD.

"We have a lot of young people in our defensive secondary, and it showed," Prairie Coach John Oertel said. "They're not going up for the football and it gets taken away."

Oelwein Coach Butch Grob appeared thoroughly pleased with the win, the Huskies' fifth in seven games.

More restrooms planned for lowa sports arenas

DES MOINES - Relief is on the way for female basketball and football fans at the University of Iowa who are tired of standing in restroom lines while games are

A report to be presented to the State Board of Regents next week says the planned addition of 71 toilets for women at Kinnick Stadium will mean the stadium will have better facilities for women than 17 other universities surveyed.

Currently, the report said, there is only one toilet for every 160 women at University of Iowa football games. For men, the ratio is one to 149. With the 71 new toilets for

women, there will be only 105 women per toilet, assuming that about 40 percent of the crowd is female.

At Iowa State's stadium, there are 102 women for every toilet, and 113 males for each facility. "This will bring the University of Iowa to approximate parity with the

number of females served in the Iowa State University stadium," the report said. "The University of Iowa and Iowa State University stadiums will by far have the best toilet facilites for females of those in the survey.

The situation will improve even more at Kinnick when more restrooms are added in the north end

The survey was done at the urging of Regent Peg Anderson of Bettendorf who complained about lack of restroom facilities at Kinnick last winter.

Regents staff surveyed universities in the Big Eight and Big Ten, excluding Northwestern. It found that nearly all the

universities' facilities discriminate

"Restroom facilities may, in fact, have been built with the concept in mind that approximately 80 to 90 percent of the attendance at sporting events was male. In recent years, however, the difference in percentage has narrowed substantially," the staff reported.

Women not only have to wait longer because there are fewer toilets to serve them, the report said, but because women take nearly twice as long in the restroom.

A survey at ISU stadium found that the average male fan spent about two minutes in the restroom, while the average female spent four to five minutes.

This would seem to indicate that all stadiums should have more fixtures for females than for males. How many more is the question. The real question is what constitutes an acceptable waiting time to use a toilet facility," the report said.

Women basketball fans at the U of I will fare much better at the new Carver-Hawkeye Arena than they did at the old Field House. But the report says a close eye should be kept on the restroom problem anyway.

The Field House had only one toilet for every 495 women, a figure more than twice as bad as any of the 17 schools in the survey.

The new arena will have one toilet for every 158 women and one toilet for every 132 men.

The report said the Hawkeye Arena will have 68 toilets for men and 38 for women. ISU's Hilton Coliseum has 41 male toilets and 36 female.

"The adequacy of restroom facilities in both the Hawkeye Arena and the Hilton Coliseum should continue to be monitored. Necessary adjustments should be made if there appears to be a problem," the report
