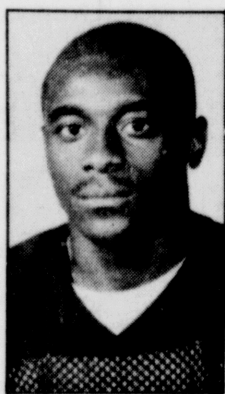
### Sims brothers

• Ken Sims, Iowa freshman cornerback from East St. Louis, Ill., will get his first starting job today at Illinois.

Although Sims told us Tuesday he is excited about it, this young man should know how to take care of himself in a crowd. You see, he is the ninth of 10 children, and three of his older brothers have played big-time college football.

"My brother, Eddie, was a running back at Arkansas," Ken said. "Perry played running back at Kansas. Clint finished his college career last season as a cornerback at Wisconsin. Clint is coaching this year at Madison West High School."

Their father died when Ken was very young. Their mother is manager of Tim & Joe's Restaurant in East St. Louis.

To answer your question, no, these Sims brothers are not related to Billy Sims, Oklahoma's great running back.

Ken played most of the second half against Iowa State, saw service only with the special teams in the Penn State game and went the rest of the way against Ohio State after regular Keith Hunter was injured late in the second quarter.

"Yes, starting against Illinois will be especially exciting because that's my home state, and Champaign is less than two hours' drive from East St. Louis," Ken said. "Illinois did recruit me, but I didn't visit there. I went to Iowa, Wisconsin, Purdue and Nebraska."

"My brother, Clint, advised me not to go to Wisconsin, but he encouraged me to stay in the Big Ten. Actually, I had always wanted to play for Iowa, but (prior to 1981) I had never heard much about Iowa in a football way. I also figured I'd get the chance to play here quicker than at Nebraska."

Ken, who hopes to major in physical therapy and recreation, said his hobbies include "fishing, playing electronic games and people watching." He catches bass, catfish and carp back home in the Mississippi. He finally got the chance to fish in Iowa — at Red Rock Lake — but he added, "I caught only a couple of little ones — nothing to brag about."

He's hoping to catch something to brag about today.

"We've seen and heard a lot about Jack Trudeau, the Illinois quarterback," Ken said. "So he's going to be throwing, and I'm hoping I can get one for my first interception."

# Teams trade cities in weird USFL swap

CHICAGO (AP) — The Chicago Blitz and Arizona Wranglers of the United States Football League announced jointly Friday that they had swapped franchises, including the entire roster of players.

"It's the culmination of a struggle of the past 60 days," Ronald Potocnik, the Blitz's new general manager, said at a news conference in Chicago.

The financial terms of the swap were not announced.

It's a confusing trade. The Blitz name will stay in Chicago, but the Blitz players will become the Wranglers in Phoenix. The Wrangler name will stay in Arizona, but the Wranglers players will become the Blitz in Chicago.

The Blitz last year under head Coach George Allen finished 12-6 and lost to the Philadelphia Stars in the playoffs. The Wranglers finished 4-14.

The Chicago franchise also announced Friday that former National Football League coach Marv Levy will guide the 1984 team.

Allen will stay on with his players as head coach at Arizona.

Levy is a former player and coach at Coe College in Cedar Rapids.

"People ask why would you trade a 12-6 team for a 4-14 one? There wouldn't have been a deal without it," said Levy.

Asked why he was willing to accept the Chicago job, Levy responded, "I'm too old to play and I'm a football coach first and foremost."

"This was an opportunity to coach in a place with people I like and believe in," said Levy, a Chicago native.

At a news conference in Phoenix, Dr. Ted Diethrich, former Chicago owner and now owner of the Wranglers, said, "I believe this is the first time in football history that a franchise with all of its players have been transferred."

"We are the new Arizona Wranglers, but we hope to carry on the new winning tradition that we had in Chicago," Diethrich added.

The new Chicago Blitz owner is Dr. James Hoffman Jr., a heart surgeon who is chief of

the cardiovascular surgery unit at Good Samaritan Medical Center in Milwaukee.

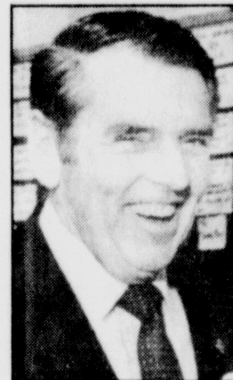
Asked if he expected to put enough people in Soldier Field to show a profit, he responded, "We'll wait and see. I've never lost anything before in my life . . . We're not promising what was promised a year ago — a championship football team. But we'll be exciting."

Both Levy and Hoffman maintained the new Chicago team would be competitive "swiftly," because the USFL has only been in existence for one year. They promised to be aggressive in the area of player acquisition, but at the same time criticized Diethrich for what they called negotiating "disastrous" contracts.

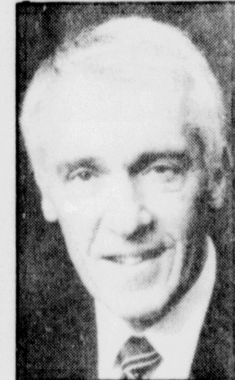
They cited specifically the deal that brought linebacker Stan White from the NFL's Detroit Lions to the Blitz last year.

"You don't give a 34-year-old NFL linebacker a Mercedes and a van in addition to paying him," said Hoffman.

In Phoenix, Allen said: "I've rebuilt four

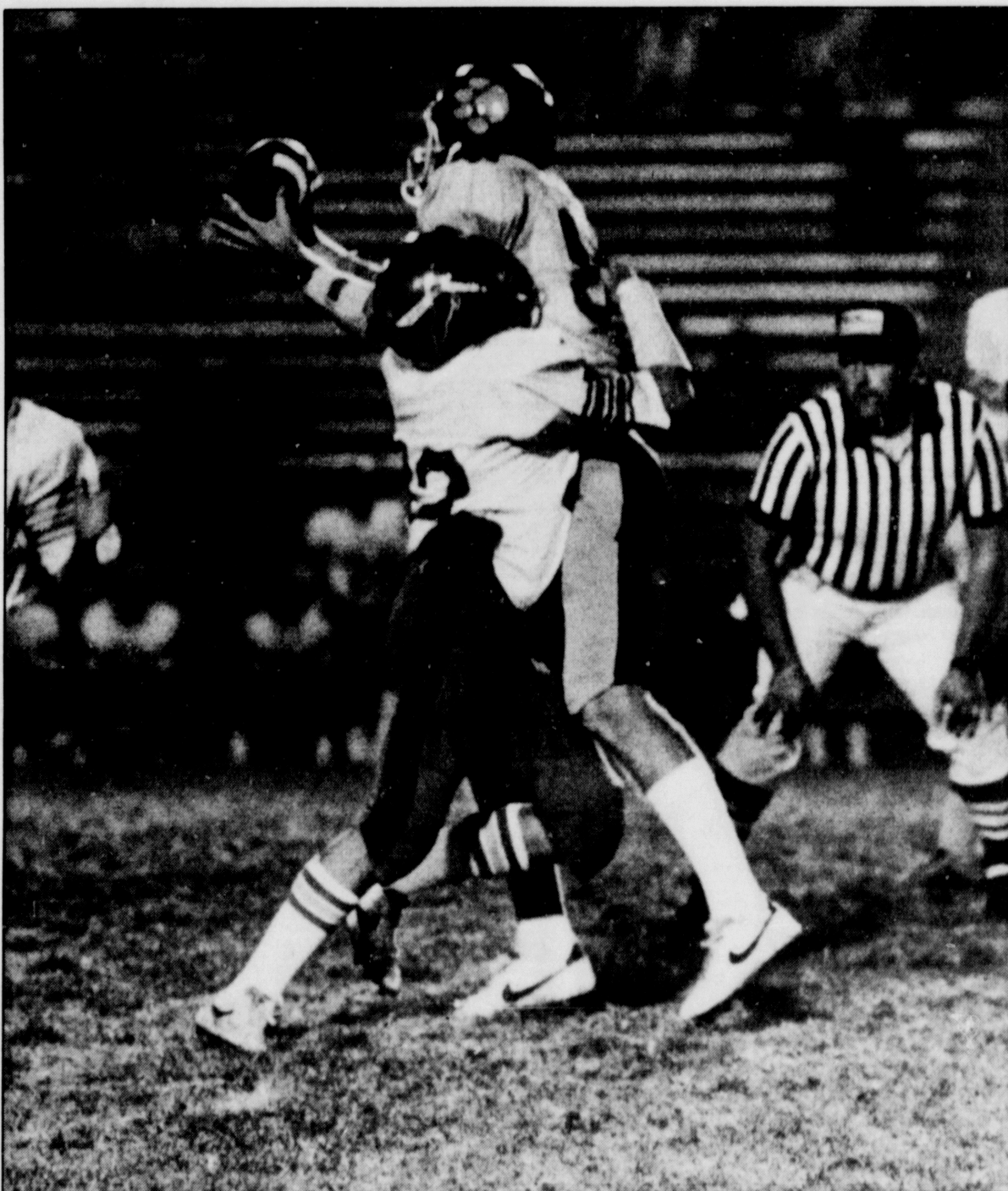


Allen To Arizona

franchises, but I've never gone through this type of transition. It's a psychological problem with any change or shift, no matter how smooth it is. We have a big rebuilding job here. I've got to find out what a Wrangler is myself."

## Kennedy shines in defensive gem, 12-0

For three quarters Friday night in Kingston Stadium, Cedar Rapids Kennedy and Dubuque Senior — two of the best defensive football teams in the Mississippi Valley Conference or anywhere — played to a stalemate.

The only thing decided at that point was the crowning of Kennedy homecoming queen Stephanie Jill Goodin. Offensively, it wasn't a royal performance for 3,500 fans.

Defensively, it was a gem.

Kennedy rallied behind Graig Cone's 86-yard punt return and a 15-yard interception return by Dan Hilker — both coming in the final 9 minutes — to post a 12-0 victory.

The win boosted the Cougars to a 4-1 mark, and 3-1 in the Valley, while Senior slipped to 3-2 and 1-2.

It was a pivotal game for Kennedy, allowing it a chance to get back in the Valley title chase. The Cougars have a difficult assignment next week, however, traveling to league leader and No. 6-rated Dubuque Hempstead (5-0), which downed Dubuque Wahlert, 20-11 Friday.

"Man, there aren't any softies at all in this conference," said a relieved Kennedy Coach Al Stiers. "I really felt overtime was coming, but I'm glad it didn't happen. Our defense did a magnificent job. They were on the field a lot, but one thing that helped was that we controlled the ball a lot the first half (15 minutes, 24 seconds to be exact)."

The two teams scrimmaged back and forth between the 20-yard lines the first half. Kennedy, outrushing the Rams 84-10, never penetrated further than the Rams' 25-yard line with 5:22 left in the third quarter. Cougar junior running back Jeff Cuddes led both teams with 65

yards in 19 attempts.

The big break for the Cougars resulted when Senior was penalized for illegal procedure on fourth down and two yards to go on the Kennedy 36. Senior's Greg Scharnau punted 36 yards to Cone, who almost slipped at the 14-yard line, then bounced free from a group of Rams at the 20-yard line.

Let him tell the rest.

"I saw a hole and went to it, and just started running," said the 175-pound senior. "I saw the end zone but I didn't think I'd ever get there. I was dying by the time I got to the 20-yard line. But, I got there."

The Rams' Greg Mehrl was the last to grab for Cone's jersey, but missed. Barry Mercer's extra point kick was wide.

"We never should have had our specialty team on the field then," said Rams Coach Roger Bentley. "We had tried to draw Kennedy offside with the long cadence, but it didn't go. Sometimes you can be too smart. I thought our defense played outstanding, and Kennedy's defense played just super."

The Cougars' defense, headed by linebacker Jeff Blake and tackle Ritchie Sturgeon, held Senior to minus-4 net yards rushing the first half. In addition, Rams quarterback Dean Shaw (with a 60 percent completion rate entering the contest) was sacked five times and held to only 4 completions in 13 attempts for 24 yards. He was intercepted twice, the first by Dave Monk in the end zone with 11:16 left in the first half.

The second steal was by Hilker, a 5-8 free safety. He snatched Shaw's pass on the 15 with 1:48 left, and raced untouched to the end zone.

"We knew we had to play hard after the extra point attempt was missed," Hilker said. "We just sucked it up. I love homecoming."

## Marion turns out the lights on Indy

Marion took the phrase "Turn out the lights, the parties over" one step further Friday night in its prep football game with Independence.

With 3:15 left to play, and the Indians on top 52-6, all the lights in and around Thomas Park went out. The Homecoming game was called and Marion had its 29th straight Wamac Conference win.

"Overall, I thought it was our best game offensively and defensively . . . and without that kickoff return, I thought our specialty teams played well too," said Marion Coach Dave Messerli, whose team stands 5-0 overall, 3-0 in the Wamac.

Marion's offense rolled up 375 yards total offense to the Mustangs' 110.

All but 68 of the Indians' yards

came on the ground as senior wingback Ron Knapp racked up 112 on only nine carries. In five games this season, the 172-pound Knapp has rushed for 451 yards.

The only sour note for Marion came with 6:17 left in the second quarter. After rolling up 21 yards and one touchdown on six carries, senior tailback Joe Sondag went down with an ankle injury. He was helped off and Messerli reported later that Sondag had "fractured three bones in his foot . . . he'll be out for a while."

"If we happen to make it to the playoffs, we hope he'll be ready to go by then."

Marion got on the board first without even bringing its offense out on the field.
