• The Michigan band won't be playing "Bill Bailey, Won't You Please Come Home" in honor of Iowa's No. 2 offensive left guard Saturday, but Bailey will be delighted to be going "home" again. Bailey, you see, grew up in Ypsilanti, Mich., just a few miles from Michigan's vast stadium. It was there that he played the most memorable game of his life and his first as a starting center — Iowa's 9-7 win over the Wolverines in 1981.

"Yes, they moved me from guard to center that week because both Joel Hilgenberg and Dave Oakes were injured," Bailey recalled this week as the Hawkeyes prepare to invade Ann Arbor again. "My center snaps weren't too good. I wouldn't call them 'knucklers,' but they were a little soft. At least we didn't get any kicks blocked."

Bailey was disappointed that Michigan didn't try to recruit him when he finished high school. We asked if he used to attend Michigan games when he was a kid.

"Oh, sure," he replied, grinning impishly at the recollection. "Some of us used to sneak in."

Sneak in? You mean find a hole in the fence?

"No, five or six of us would get together and pick out a gate that had the oldest guy taking tickets. Then one of us — the fastest afoot — would go up and create a distraction. The others would rush through the gate and scatter so they couldn't catch us. Then we'd meet at an agreed-upon spot and watch the game."

Bailey won't have to sneak in Saturday. His broken kneecap is healed, and he will walk in with the other Hawkeyes and see if the nation's No. 12-rated team can knock off No. 10.

Morgan's praise

• Sports Illustrated came out this week with a dandy double-truck (two-page) color picture of Norway's Mike Boddicker pitching against the Phillies in the World Series.

The SI story said Boddicker threw 34 fastballs (29 for strikes), 42 curves (28 for strikes), six sliders and 23 "foshballs," the Orioles' term for a hybrid — between a forkball and a "fish" (change-up).

Incidentally, it's not true the Phillies dumped the fifth game of the World Series so they wouldn't have to face Boddicker in a sixth contest. However, the Orioles' star rookie certainly did baffle some of the Phils' old-timers.

The N.Y. Times' Ira Berkow had a fascinating quote from Joe Morgan, Phillies 40-year-old star:

"I'm leading off the game in Baltimore. The game before, I led off with a homer. So I figure this guy (Boddicker) is thinking this, and he's a rookie and I'm a 19-year veteran. I mean, he's got to be a little intimidated, right?"

"Well, the count goes to 3-2. I figure he's certain to give me some hard stuff, a fastball or a slider. But I know he wants to get the ball over the plate. He doesn't want to walk the leadoff hitter, especially because he knows I can steal. So I'm lookin' for the heater."

"When he lets it go I think immediately it's the gas, and I start to swing. Suddenly I realize it's a change-up! I'm trying to put the brakes on, but I've gone too far. The guy struck me out. I couldn't believe he'd have the nerve to throw the change-up. It's just too risky to control on a 3-2 count."

"I'm shocked. I go back to the bench and said to the guys, 'You see that?' And the guys said" — Morgan's eyes widened and his voice dropped — "they said, 'Yeah.' He messed the whole crew up with that one. We were never sure what he was going to unload."

Morgan was looking forward to another chance to bat against Boddicker: "It makes a difference the second time you see a pitcher. The odds are he's not going to be able to fool you the way he did when he was new to you. The next time — if there is a next time — I'll be a little readier. I'll just watch the ball and not try to figure him out."

Berkow also asked Manager Joe Altobelli why Boddicker was sent down to the minors early in the season.

"Because," the Orioles skipper replied, "I'm dumb."

Classic game sends Iowa to Michigan

Fry against Schembechler. Long against Smith. No. 1 offense against No. 1 defense. Big play passing team against the traditional great ground gainer.

Angles are aplenty in Saturday's nationally-televised game between Iowa and Michigan at Ann Arbor. Not the least of which is determining whether the Hawkeyes can stay in the thick of the Big Ten championship picture.

Michigan's 51st straight sellout crowd of 105,000-plus fans will gather for an 11:25 a.m. (Iowa time) kickoff. The ABC network, including KCRG Channel 9 in Cedar Rapids, will begin coverage at 11.

This will be Iowa's first appearance on national television (excluding bowl games) since 1965, a 27-7 win over Oregon State. The Hawkeyes have won five straight televised

games and have a lusty 25-8-1 all-time record on TV.

In addition to the national exposure, a dozen or so bowl scouts will be on hand.

Both teams are 5-1 overall, but Michigan's No. 10 ranking by Associated Press is two notches higher than Iowa's.

More important at this point, though, is their position in the Big Ten. The Wolverines are tied with Illinois for the league leadership at 4-0, while Iowa is just a step behind at 3-1. At this point, it appears likely a team with two conference losses would have only a slim chance of contending for the top. However, Michigan still must face Illinois and 2-2 Ohio State.

"We haven't played any contenders yet," said Michigan Coach Bo Schembechler earlier this week. "No Iowa, no Illinois, no Ohio State, no people like that."

"It's a stretch drive now. I think Iowa, Illinois and Michigan have the inside track for

the Rose Bowl. We're fraudulently mentioned in the top three because we haven't played any of the contenders.

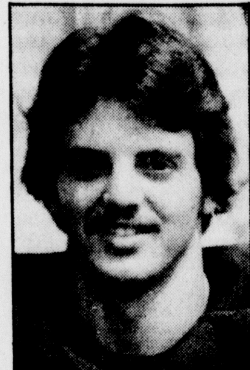
Iowa already has split with Illinois and Ohio State, and Michigan appears to be the Hawkeyes' toughest remaining competition. But that doesn't make Hawkeye Coach Hayden Fry rest any easier.

"Michigan is the best football team we've seen on film so far," Fry said. "They're the best coached, the soundest team. It's a typical Michigan team, one of the best rushing teams in the country."

The primary angles going into the clash are these:

Coaches — Fry is 1-1 against Schembechler, handing Bo a stinging 9-7 loss in Ann Arbor two years ago. Chances are, Bo and the Wolves haven't forgotten.

Their philosophies are similar in that both believe you succeed with solid defense, but their offensive background is different.



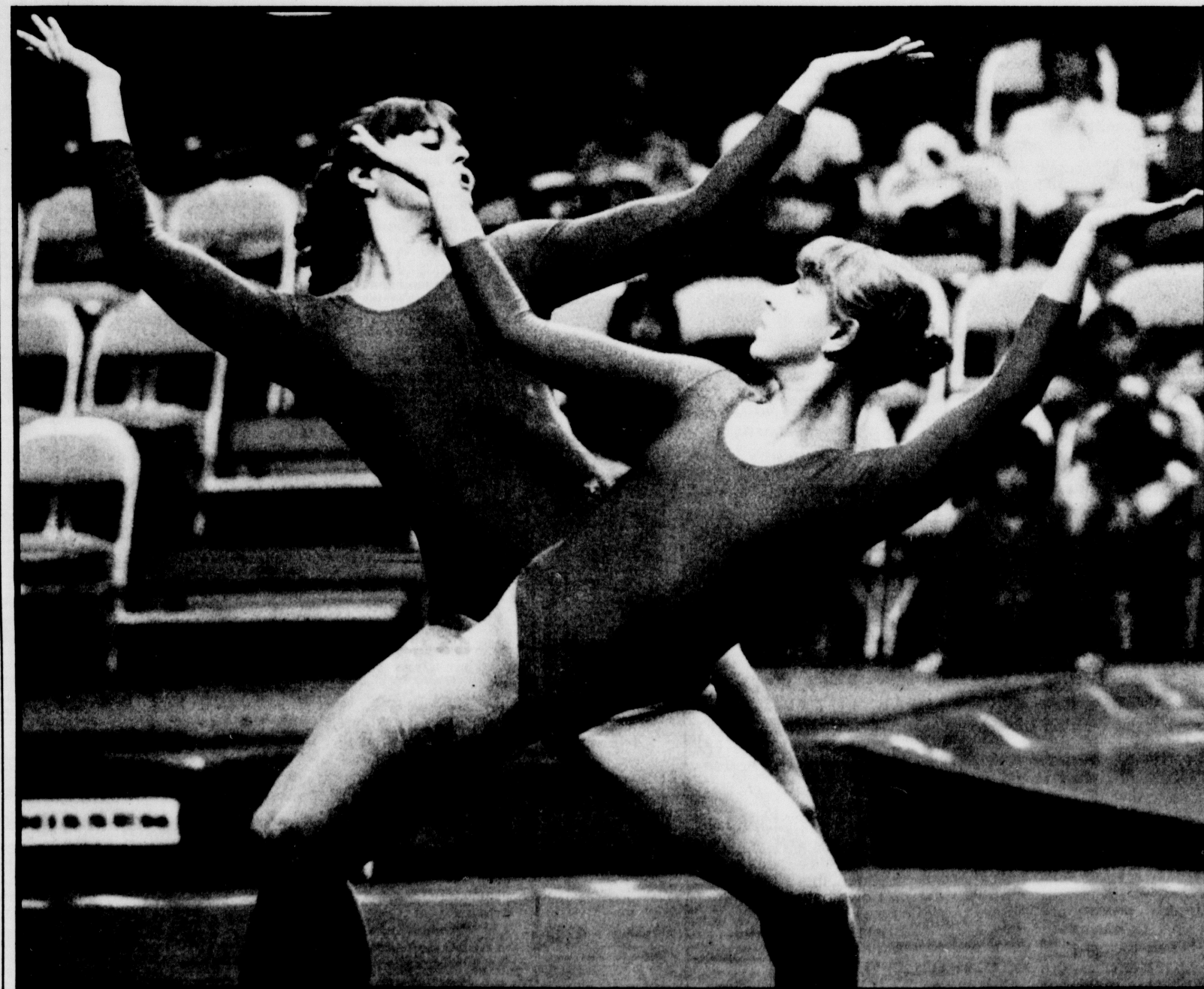

Sports acrobatics truly 'spectacular'

After the first two rounds of preliminary competition Thursday, it's clear the 6th Annual World Cup of Sports Acrobatics at the Five Seasons Center will be "incredible" and "spectacular."

Originated in the Soviet Union, sports acrobatics involves a combination of gymnastics, acrobatic tricks and dance. The routines, with the exception of tumbling, are done to music. The only equipment used by the contestants are tumbling mats.

Of the seven events that will be contested tonight, the Republic of China and Bulgaria hold down first place in four and three, respectively.

Among tonight's and Saturday's finals will be representatives from CBS and ABC-TV shows who are in town to tape this new international sport.

The finals will be taped by "CBS Sports Spectacular" to be shown at a later date, probably after the football season. On Sunday,

ABC will shoot some of the more unusual tricks for a future segment of "That's Incredible".

"It is pretty much as I expected," said U.S. Coach Dan Hoff. "Our people did well, but the Chinese and the Bulgarians are doing the more difficult tricks and getting the higher scores."

Thursday's competition was closed to the public, but the competitors went all out.

Although there were several outstanding routines, it was the Chinese men's fours team, leading the competition after the preliminaries, which brought the select audience of guests to life. The Chinese men did several unusual tricks, including one in which three of the men play jump rope using the fourth as a human rope.

All of the American contingent of eleven

advanced to tonight's overall finals, led by men's tumbler Jerry Hardy.

Hardy is currently tied for second with Bulgarian Plamen Issionov going into the finals. Although Hardy injured his right hamstring, he is ready to challenge China's Hu Xinggang for the overall men's tumbling title.

Hardy trails Xinggang by .14 of a point.

Former Nebraska gymnast Steve Elliott, a pre-meet favorite in men's tumbling, was first after the first round, but did not have a good second round and fell to sixth. He was fourth at the World Championships last year in the overall men's tumbling event.

The American mixed pairs team (Sonny Brown and Christina VanLoo) and the women's pairs team (Chris Patterson and Lori Roan) both are in third place after the prelims and are in the hunt for bronze medals.

Tickets for tonight's and Saturday's finals are priced at \$8.50 and \$6.50. Both finals start at 7:30 p.m. The teams begin warming up at 6:30 p.m.

Kennedy defense jolts Jeff

If this year's Cedar Rapids Kennedy football team is remembered for anything, it may be defense.

The Cougars held Cedar Rapids Jefferson to minus-17 yards on 31 rushing attempts and recorded their third shutout in a 7-0 Mississippi Valley Conference win Thursday night at Kingston Stadium.

Kennedy, 5-3, clinched its first winning season since 1980 and concluded its Valley campaign at 4-3. The Cougars will finish either in a tie for fourth or alone in fifth, depending on how Cedar Rapids Washington (3-2 in the league) fares in its final two games.

A chilly night and muddy field undoubtedly altered the game plans of both teams. And in such conditions, the defenses usually dominate.

Except for one Kennedy running play.

On the Cougars' first play of the second quarter, Jeff Pavcek cut back

on a sweep, broke three or four tackles, picked up a couple blocks and raced 51 yards for a touchdown. Barry Mercer's kick gave Kennedy a 7-0 lead with 9:51 left in the half.

"It was a 21 power sweep and I cut through a gap on the inside," said Pavcek, who finished with 134 yards on 23 carries. "John Lynch threw a heckuva block and Kris Kvach gave me another one at about the 10, or I might not have gotten in."

Kennedy's first-year coach Al Stiers was disturbed about Kennedy's 11 penalties and four fumbles, but lauded his defense.

"The defense did an outstanding job, as it has all year," Stiers said. "But I think the offense might have got a little satisfied when we got the lead and decided to let the defense do the work."

"Our pass defense has probably been the brightest spot all year. We had good deep coverage and that allowed our line to get in on Jefferson. I'm pleased we have a winning record, but the fact of the matter is we still should have won a couple games we didn't."

Defensive ends Jeff Zimmerman and Tony Kriz were in the Jefferson backfield repeatedly. Both had three sacks, while Kriz partially blocked a punt and Zimmerman recovered a fumble. Kennedy threw Jeff for losses on 14 of its 31 running plays.

"The conditions were part of it," Zimmerman analyzed, "but I think our front seven put a lot of heat on them, too. We did some stunting, but mostly it was a basic rush."

Sooners better without Dupree? ISU will find out

You'd think a college football team that suddenly lost its potential Heisman Trophy winner to another campus would be in dire straits. But, that's not the way life is at the University of Oklahoma.

Marcus Dupree, the star Sooner tailback, has left for greener pastures at Southern Mississippi in Hattiesburg, but his absence won't leave Oklahoma's cupboard bare for Iowa State's football invasion Saturday at Norman, Okla.

Oklahoma football stock never dwindles, it just gets reshuffled. The 16th-ranked Sooners host the Cyclones in a 1:30 p.m. Dad's Day game at Owen Field.

It's a contest that isn't expected to be a contest on paper. The Cyclones (3-3) are as

high as 21-point underdogs against a 4-2 Sooner team that has lost only twice in 35 league home games under Coach Barry Switzer.

To complicate matters, Cyclone Coach Jim

Criner admitted he feels Oklahoma is a better team without Dupree. To all of this, Switzer just enjoyed a small chuckle.

"I feel we were a more talented team with Marcus, but I appreciate what Coach Criner is trying to say," Switzer said by telephone Wednesday. "He felt the Dupree situation was a disruptive influence. I'm glad Marcus made his decision, and that he is happy with it. I know our other backs are a lot happier now that he's not here. They know they'll be getting their chance."

Switzer said his team has yet to play up to its capabilities, which makes Saturday an unpleasant time for ISU to visit Norman.

But then, when is it a good time for any Big Eight Conference team to visit Norman? The Cyclones are making only their second road trip of the season, after completing a 4-game home stand with back-to-back wins over

Kansas (38-35) and Colorado (22-10). The Cyclones are tied with Oklahoma and Nebraska for the Big Eight lead.

Oklahoma is fresh from a 21-20 scare by cross-state rival Oklahoma State — a victory enhanced by an onsidest kick that wasn't ordered by Switzer and not communicated to kicker Tim Lasher.

"We're going to keep the kicker informed next time," said Switzer.

The last time ISU visited Norman (1981), placekicker Alex Giffords missed a chip-shot field goal in the fourth quarter, resulting in a 7-7 tie.

The Sooners haven't lost to the Cyclones in 21 consecutive games — the longest current non-losing streak against a conference foe. "I've seen everything they've done this

Jefferson was sent reeling to its seventh straight loss, and its sixth in a row in Valley play. The J-Hawks had pass plays of 40, 15 and 13 yards, but otherwise the Cougars kept them in check.

"No question about it, Kennedy has a good defense," J-Hawk Coach Bill Calloway said. "We had a little different look on defense on that touchdown run, but the kid made a good cutback, broke some tackles and made a great run. Basically, it was a one-play game, and they got it."

Other than Pavek's touchdown run and Mercer's missed 36-yard field goal in the first quarter, Kennedy didn't threaten. In fact, the Cougars didn't cross mid-field in the second half.

Jefferson, which was outgained 180-56, rallied with a drive mid-way through the second half.

Scott Gull's 40-yard reception from Marty Pearson gave the J-Hawks a first down at the Kennedy 12. Two running plays gained six yards and Pearson was stopped for no gain on third down. On fourth-and-four from the six, Zimmerman barely tipped away a pass into the end zone from Gull.

Long is the nation's No. 2 passer and is No. 5 in total offense. He leads the Big Ten in both categories, having completed 58 percent of his passes for 1,685 yards and 10 TDs.

Smith is not as good a passer, but is a better runner. With 4.5 yards per carry, he's dangerous on the option (he's averaged 6.4 yards per carry). Smith has passed for just 567 yards and four TDs, but he hits 55 percent of his attempts.

No. 1 offense, No. 1 defense — No question, the game pits the irresistible force against the immovable object.

Iowa ranks first in Big Ten passing offense, total offense and scoring offense. The Hawkeyes are averaging 493 total yards per game, including 328.3 passing, and have scored an average of 34.2 points.

Nationally, Iowa is second in passing offense, third in total offense and seventh in scoring.

"The key to this game is to be able to handle their offense," Schembechler said. "Actually in the last two years they've really only scored one touchdown on our defense. But this is a much better offensive team than we've met the last two years."

Michigan tops the league in rushing defense and total defense, and is second in pass and scoring defense. Nationally, the Wolverines are No. 2 in total defense, No. 5 in rushing defense.

Big play team, great ground team — Iowa and Michigan are 1-2 in the Big Ten in total offense and scoring offense, but for different reasons.

Iowa has been a big play team. The Hawkeyes have had 49 plays gain 20 or more yards this season. Fifteen players have caught passes, and all are averaging 9.5 yards per reception or better. Long has averaged 18 yards per completion.

Michigan, of course, has an amazing rushing tradition. Rushing plays have accounted for 73 percent of the Wolverines' total yards this season. They are averaging an even five yards per running play.

By contrast, passing has accounted for 66 percent of Iowa's yards.

Injuries have been damaging to both

year," said Criner. "I don't know what else I could do. And, I'll tell you what. It's the same. Whew! Just white jerseys, red jerseys flying down the field. It'll make a guy sober up real fast."

There are other factors working against the Cyclones.

Oklahoma not only has an outstanding quarterback in Danny Bradley, but also boasts a defensive unit that is ranked No. 8 nationally in total defense. The Sooners top the Big Eight in rushing defense (92.7 yard average); passing (167.7), and total defense (260.3). Iowa State's ground attack has made improved strides the past two weeks, but the Cyclones are still being outgained by an average of 170 to 72.3 yards.

The Cyclones, therefore, have relied upon their passing attack led by quarterback David Archer (1,365 yards and 11 touchdowns).

The second leading passer in the Big Eight, Archer is averaging 227.5 yards per outing, and is 227 yards shy of becoming the No. 3 all-time Cyclone passer.

Despite his team's passing success, Criner's primary concern is running against Oklahoma.

"Even though they are a great, great team up front, we've got to be able to establish a running game," he said. "We can't go into the game and say we're going to throw the ball. We've got to keep them off balance."

The Cyclone running attack, currently led by the 269 yards of tailback Tommy Davis, must face a Sooner defense bolstered by the likes of defensive ends Kevin Murphy and Daryl Goodlow, All-American tackle Ricky Bryan and nose-guard Tony Casillas. The quartet has a combined 237 tackles and 13 quarterback sacks.

Without Dupree, Switzer has alternated his talented pair of redshirt freshmen running backs. He'll start 195-pound Earl Johnson, who was at fullback last week, in Dupree's spot. Spencer Tillman, a 5-11, 205-pounder, will open at fullback. Johnson has rushed for 374 yards and three touchdowns. Tillman leads the Sooners with 458 yards and four TDs.

The only thing stopping the Sooners is

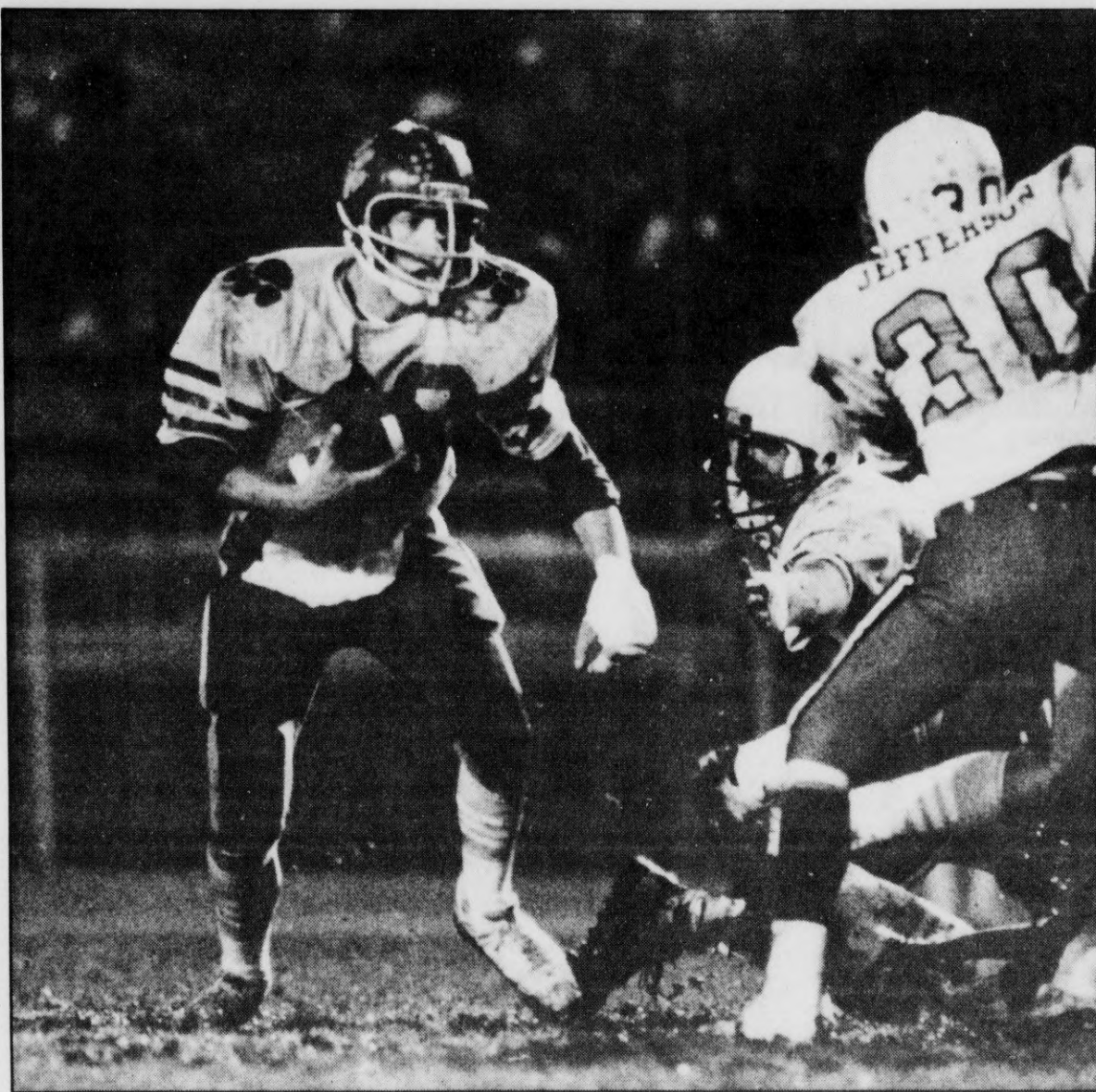
Clubs shying away from Rose

Will there be 'Lucky 8' ball tonight?

Eight teams, including Mount Vernon, can lock up berths in the Iowa high school football playoffs with victories tonight.

Mount Vernon concludes its 8-game schedule against winless Durant tonight. The section 4 automatic berth may ultimately go to Cedar Rapids LaSalle, but Mount Vernon would gain an at-large spot with a win.

Other teams that could secure playoff spots with victories tonight are Dubuque Hempstead, West Des Moines Dowling or West Des Moines Valley, Davenport Central, Emmetsburg, Roland-Story, Sheldon and Sutherland.

Hempstead could lock up the Mississippi Valley Conference championship with a win at Iowa City High. But the Little Hawks, by beating Hempstead and Dubuque Senior the following week, could gain the automatic berth.

The Des Moines Metro championship will be decided tonight, as West Des Moines foes Dowling and Valley clash.

Top-ranked Davenport Central is looking for a win over Muscatine to wrap up the Mississippi Eight crown and an automatic berth.

The automatic berths in the Big Seven and Sioux Interstate still are up for grabs. The Big Eight edge is to Fort Dodge, but the league still could see a four-way tie. Sioux City East and Sioux City Heelan both are 4-1 in

league play with one game remaining.

Once again this season, playoff spots in classes other than 4A will be decided on a point basis. Point leaders in each of four sections gain berths, while the remaining four spots will go to the top point reducers across the state.

In Class 2A, Emmetsburg and Roland-Story both finish 8-game regular seasons tonight and wins for both will lock up spots. In addition, Sheldon could finish 7-1 by beating Storm Lake and gain an at-large berth.

In Class 1A, Sutherland will advance to post-season play with a win over Aurelia.

Several Gazette area teams still are in the running for playoff berths.

LaSalle, the defending 2A state champion and season-long top-ranked team, possibly could afford a loss in its last two games and still advance. The Lancers benefit under the point system by playing six 3A teams and a 4A.

Marion is the lone unbeaten team remaining in section 3 of 3A and would gain that berth with wins the last two weeks. Cedar Rapids Regis, which plays four 4A teams, is 5-2 but still alive for an at-large spot. Once-beaten Dyersville Beckman also still is in the 3A chase.

Other area schools that are very much in the playoff picture include Starport in 2A, North Tama and Center Point in 1A, and Garwin in A. Garwin is the only unbeaten left in its section and appears to be a shoo-in for a berth.

Evans, Cruz join list of baseball's free agents

NEW YORK (AP) — Darrell Evans of the San Francisco Giants, who hit 30 home runs during the season, and base-stealing whiz Julio Cruz of the Chicago White Sox declared their free agency Thursday, the players' union said.

The two filings brought to 28 the number of players who thus far have filed to be eligible for the free agent re-entry draft. Players have until midnight, Oct. 31, to file for free agency.

At the same time, the Los Angeles Times reported Thursday that third baseman Doug DeCinces, who was eligible for free agency, had reached an agreement on a multi-year contract with the California Angels.

"I'm pleased to say my philoso-

phy of keeping a player where he is seems to coincide with the Angels," said DeCinces' attorney, Ron Shapiro.

The outlook did not look quite so good for Evans' team, the Giants.

Evans went through the re-entry draft for the first time in 1978. At that time, Evans' agent, Jerry Kapstein, said he felt Evans had a good chance of re-signing with the Giants, and he did.

"Now, however, I firmly project that Darrell will not be in a Giants uniform in 1984," Kapstein said.

"I informed the Giants of this position in August, and we have had no discussions concerning Darrell since that point. And none are planned."

Clubs have until 48 hours prior to

the Nov. 7 draft to try to re-sign their free agents.

Evans has been with the Giants since he was acquired on June 13, 1976 in a trade with the Atlanta Braves. Primarily a third baseman, Evans played 113 games at first base for the Giants last season, committing only seven errors for a .993 fielding average.

In addition to his 30 home runs, Evans drove in 94 runs, including a team-high 15 game-winning RBIs.

Cruz, a second baseman, was traded to the White Sox from the Seattle Mariners for Tony Bernazard June 15. Cruz batted .252 for the season with 52 RBIs and 57 stolen bases, 24 with the White Sox.

Expert sees big wins for Penn St., Wolves

Kansas Coach Mike Gottfried has this comment on the ups and downs of college football:

"One week the band's waiting on you, then you play another game and the dog's barking at you."

The band hasn't played for West Virginia against Penn State since 1955. In the intervening 27 years, Penn State has won 26 times, including 24 in a row since a 14-14 tie in 1958.

This may come as a shock to those Rip Van Winkles who have been dozing for the last two decades, but times have changed and West Virginia, 6-0 and ranked No. 4 nationally, is a 3½-point favorite for Saturday's game at State College, Pa., against the defending national champions, who are 4-3 and unranked, but own a four-game winning streak.

"This is my fourth year (at WVU) and most of the time we've been a 15-to-20-point underdog (against Penn State)," says Mountaineer Coach Don Nehlen. "But kids today don't live much for what happened in the past. They weren't even born in 1955. All they know is that this team hasn't beaten Penn State."

However, Penn State Coach Joe Paterno says he'll be "very disappointed if we don't play our best game of the year. We're healthy and ready to play."

When Joe speaks, you gotta believe . . . Penn State 24-21.

Owens signs with Phils

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Paul Owens, who relinquished his general manager's duties to manage the Philadelphia Phillies in mid-season, has signed a one-year contract to continue as field boss in 1984, the team said Thursday.

Owens' decision was a complete turnaround from his earlier statement that he "definitely" would not return to the dugout next season.

"I decided I wanted to come back because we have a chance to repeat what we did this year. I'm confident we will put on as good a show as we did in 1983," Owens said at a press conference.

"I like the job and I'm confident we can win next year. It's a challenge and I like that," said Owens, adding that he changed his mind about staying on as manager within the last couple of days.

In another development, the Phillies hired former Chicago Cubs manager Lee Elia to become skipper of Portland, Ore., the Phils' Class AAA farm team in the Pacific Coast League.

Bill Giles, the Phillies' president, and the rest of the front office

hierarchy prevailed on Owens to continue in the field job.

Owens returned to the dugout July 18 to replace the fired Pat Corrales as manager. The Phillies at the time were tied for first place, one game over .500.

Under Owens, the Phillies were 47-30, a .610 clip; won the National League pennant, beat the Los Angeles Dodgers in the NL playoff, and then lost to the Baltimore Orioles in the World Series, 4-1.

Owens has said repeatedly that he is tired of the general manager's duties. He made it clear that haggling with agents over contracts and trying to make deals under the complex contracts of major league players is not his idea of baseball.

He also made it clear that managing the Phillies the last half of 1983 was a fun assignment. He liked living and sweating with the players.

Owens, 59, has been in the Phillies' organization 27 years as a manager, scout, farm director and general manager.

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
