

## Brewers beat Boddicker in bid for 19th

MILWAUKEE — Milwaukee's Willie Lozano stroked a two-run double in the seventh inning to rally the Brewers to a rain-splashed 4-2 victory Friday night over Baltimore as Mike Boddicker failed in his bid for victory No. 19.

Boddicker, the winningest pitcher in the American League, fell to 18-10, walking two and striking out four.

Doug Loman led off the Brewers' seventh with a single and Jim

Sundberg reached first on a fielding error by third baseman Todd Cruz. Both baserunners advanced on Dion James' sacrifice, and Lozano followed with his double to the gap in left-center.

After the game was held up an hour and 31 minutes by rain, Baltimore took a 2-0 lead in the first inning on Eddie Murray's 28th home run of the season. The drive over the right-field fence came after a one-out single by John Shelby.

The Brewers scored once in the third, when Lozano led off with a walk, took third on Ed Romero's single and scored one out later on Jim Gantner's groundout.

Milwaukee tied the game 2-2 in the sixth when Robin Yount opened with a triple to the gap in right-center and raced home on Gantner's groundout.

The Orioles loaded the bases with no outs in the eighth, but came up empty when Shelby hit into a double play and Cal Ripken lined out to second.

Right-hander Tom Candiotti, 2-1, scattered six hits, didn't allow a walk and struck out six before leaving in the eighth. Ray Seagee came on to earn his fifth save.

**ELSEWHERE IN the American League,** Texas stopped Minnesota, 9-2; Toronto blasted Detroit, 7-2; Boston topped New York, 7-1; Seattle nipped Kansas City, 2-1; California blanked Chicago, 5-0; and Cleveland blasted Oakland, 6-1.

In the National League, Chicago clubbed New York, 7-1; Los Angeles edged Cincinnati, 6-5; San Francisco shut out Atlanta, 3-0; Philadelphia handled Montreal, 9-5; San Diego beat Houston, 4-2; and Pittsburgh outlasted St. Louis, 8-7 in 12 innings.

### Rangers 9, Twins 2

ARLINGTON, Tex. — Larry Parrish, whose three-run homer helped Texas defeat Minnesota, says even though the Rangers are out of the pennant race, it's not hard to get motivated when playing a team in contention.

"It's a lot easier to play against clubs like California and Minnesota rather than a team like Oakland," Parrish said. "Oakland isn't going anywhere and neither are we. This way we are ready to play."

Parrish ended the night with two hits and four RBI. Charlie Hough, 16-12, continued his mastery over the Twins by pitching his league-leading 16th complete game of the season. Hough is 9-0 lifetime against the Twins. Hough, who allowed seven hits and walked two, credited good hitting and not pitching for the victory.

"Wow, nine runs," he said. "Not a bad game, not too shabby of a performance. I had a little better command tonight. I felt like I could get out of any jam."

Hough struck out seven and walked two.

### Mariners 2, Royals 1

SEATTLE — Rookie Alvin Davis belted his 26th home run with one out in the bottom of the ninth inning to give Seattle a victory over Kansas City.

Davis lofted a 1-1 pitch from Danny Jackson, 1-6, over the left field fence for the winning run. Jackson allowed just four hits, struck out four and walked two.

### Blue Jays 7, Tigers 2

DETROIT — Willie Aikens belted two home runs and Ernie Whitt added another to lead Toronto to victory over Detroit.


The victory moved the Blue Jays within 10 games of the Tigers in the American League East and left Detroit's magic number for clinching the division at six.

After Friday's play, Houston and Atlanta were tied for second, 10½ games behind the Padres.

## Marion thunders past league foe Monticello

Going into Friday night's Wamac Conference prep football opener against Monticello, Marion head coach Dave Messerli felt his club would have to establish its running game in order to win.

The Indians followed Messerli's words of wisdom to a T en route to a 28-6 victory over the Panthers at Thomas Park Field.

Senior running backs Greg Hall and Jeff Gollaher rushed for 92 and 52 yards, respectively, as Marion rolled up 184 yards on the ground. Hall scored one touchdown, Gollaher three as the Indians posted their 34th straight loop win and their second victory of the '84 season.

"I told the kids all week we'd have to establish our running game to beat Monticello," said Messerli afterward. "Monti has some excellent athletes, they're tough to run against."

"But our running game did the job tonight," added the Marion field boss. "So did our defense. It was a good team effort."

It didn't take the Indians long to "establish" their ground attack.

Marion's first possession resulted in a 65-yard touchdown march led by Hall and Gollaher. The 5-foot-8, 157-pound Gollaher powered his way the final 10 for the score and senior quarterback-kicker Doug Jackson added the first of his four PATs for a 7-0 lead.

The Indians drove 49 yards in 19 plays for their second touchdown, with Hall blasting over from the Panthers' one-yard line with 10:59 to go in the second quarter.

Monticello, 0-2, didn't close up shop. The Panthers took the ensuing kickoff and went 73 yards in 10 plays. Quarterback Dave Nanke, who completed just 4-of-19 passes for 33 yards on the night, raced in

from 34 yards out on a keeper with 6:37 left to play before intermission.

But Nanke's extra point kick sailed low and the Panthers would get no closer than the 14-6 halftime score.

"We talked to our defense at the half," noted Messerli. "We hadn't maintained our intensity after our first two touchdowns and we felt it was important not to let up out there. But the kids came back out and played well the rest of the way."

The Indians went back to work after Messerli's halftime warning. Four plays after Monticello kicked off, Gollaher was in the end zone again. This time, though, Gollaher played pass receiver.

Doug Jackson fired a 49-yard scoring toss (his lone completion in six attempts) to Gollaher and that play pretty much sealed the Indians' victory. Gollaher's four-yard touchdown burst in the fourth quarter iced the contest.

Hall and Gollaher's running helped offset Monti's 179-yard rushing game. Nanke and Rick Ellison gained 52 yards apiece for the Panthers, but most of that yardage was totaled in the first half.

Nanke was also intercepted twice and Monticello lost the only fumble of the game.

Nine Marion players, including Hall, Gollaher and Jackson, carried the ball as the Indians beat the Panthers in first downs, 17-11.

Both clubs were hampered by penalties. Marion was whistled 11 times for 115 yards, and Monticello lost 82 yards on 11 infractions.

The Indians hope to extend their conference winning streak next Friday night at Tipton. Monticello, meanwhile, will be gunning for its first win against Anamosa at home.

"I was pleased with the way we played," concluded Messerli. "But I'll have to look at the films before I evaluate individual performances."

## Kennedy uses late rally to topple I.C. West, 13-0

IOWA CITY — Cedar Rapids Kennedy broke open a scoreless game in the fourth quarter to post a 13-0 Mississippi Valley Conference football win over Iowa City West Friday night.

Jeff Kuddes, who gained 80 yards in 14 carries, ran for a six-yard touchdown with 10:31 left in the game to give the Cougars a 6-0 lead.

On Kennedy's next possession, Larry Thomas fired a 21-yard scoring pass to Paul Good. Barry Mercer's extra-point kick made it 13-0.

West was held to three first downs and 57 yards of total offense. Kennedy rushed for 203 yards and added 66 passing.

"It was good to put one in the left-hand column," said Kennedy Coach Al Stiers. "Our defense was much improved over last week."

Kennedy improved to 1-1 overall and 1-0 in the Valley. West, loser of 17 in a row, is 0-2 and 0-1.

## Jeff surprises Hempstead, 21-6



Hurricane Diana changed course and struck inland in the Midwest Friday night at Kingston Stadium. Damage to facilities: minimal. Damage to Dubuque Hempstead's Mustangs: considerable.

Diana was actually in disguise; dressed up in Cedar Rapids Jefferson J-Hawk uniforms. The defense was the eye of the storm, and led by folks like noseguard Darrell Long, the J-Hawks sailed to a 21-6 Mississippi Valley Conference football victory.

It's been five years since the J-Hawks (1-1) have enjoyed a victory over perennial power Hempstead (also 1-1). Jefferson won in overtime, 17-14, in 1979, but Hempstead went on to a state crown.

**THE J-HAWKS**, who struck for a 14-0 first-half advantage, made a believer out of one Mustang.

"I'd say we have the smallest team we've ever had, and Jefferson looks like the old physical Jack Fisk teams," said Hempstead Coach Bob Timmerman. "They have a lot of strength."

There were several big plays that swung Jefferson's way, but J-Hawks Coach Bill Calloway pointed to one series of events which he said told the story.

"If you ask me about a turning point, I go all the way back to last November when the kids started hitting the weights," said Calloway amid a locker room celebration. "We're just physical now."

And how! The J-Hawks, with the exception of one long Hempstead scamper (a 54-yard run by Mike Waters in the first quarter), held the Mustangs to 25 net yards rushing in the second half. Hempstead, known for power, in-your-face football, had a dose of its own playbook tossed at it by Jefferson.

Long and partner tackles Chris Lien and Jason Hunt led the pass rush, while three touchdown runs and 119 yards by tailback Randy Meier pinned down Hempstead. The J-Hawks outgained the Mustangs 159-108 on the ground and had 197 yards total offense.

"We're a family out there," said Long, a 5-foot-11, 191-pound senior. "We ran a basic 6-2 defense and didn't let up. A win like this really does a lot for everyone's spirits."

**JEFFERSON** lost a tough 14-7 season opener a week ago to Waterloo East, but methodically cut down Hempstead with three interceptions, a fumble recovery and two quarterback sacks. Long collected one sack in the fourth quarter which led to one score and in a role as an ex-officio member of the Hempstead backfield may have forced starting quarterback Eric Bredesen to consider another line of work.

Hempstead never penetrated past the J-Hawk 20-yard line the first three quarters. Jefferson struck first, snapping the scoreless tie two

plays into the second quarter when Gary Feaker intercepted a Bredesen pass on the Mustangs' 23-yard line. Six plays later, Meier scampered two yards for a touchdown.

Mark Tiedtke booted the first of three extra points, and despite missing a 30-yard field goal attempt with 13 seconds left in the first half, had an outstanding evening. Tiedtke's field goal try hit the center of the crossbar and bounced back. He had four punts for a 42.2 yard average.

The J-Hawks made it 14-0 with 5:23 left in the half when quarterback Jim Allbright directed a 43-yard scoring march in nine plays. The drive was marred by a personal foul by Jefferson after Meier had bolted 13 yards to the one-yard line. The officials ruled a dead ball foul, giving Jefferson possession on the 15-yard line and ejecting starting center Craig Nelson for unsportsmanlike conduct. Two plays later, Meier ran five yards to score.

**THE RULING** confused officials in the press box, plus Calloway and Timmerman.

"The officials didn't explain what was going on during the evening, and made it even more controversial," Timmerman said. "I thought it was a dead ball foul, but I was on the field because nobody would explain what was going on."

Said Calloway, "You tell me what was the call? I guess it was a dead ball foul, but I don't know. I'm just the coach."

Jefferson added its insurance TD with 8:36 left to play — a five-yard run by Meier. The march began on the Hempstead 25-yard line when a bad snap to punter Brian Gross allowed Long and defensive tackle Chris Lien to swarm in and pin an eight-yard loss.

## LaSalle, Regis square off tonight

Two ranked teams and a traditional Cedar Rapids rivalry adds up to what should be a good prep football game at Kingston Stadium tonight.

LaSalle and Regis tangle at 7:30 in a game that should help tell whether one or both teams are true state playoff contenders.

Fans attending the game will want to sit in their designated sections. That means Regis fans on the east side of the stadium, and LaSalle fans on the press box side.

Regis, ranked first in Class 3A, opened its season last week with a 20-7 win over Cedar Rapids Kennedy. LaSalle, the defending state 2A champ that holds a No. 3 ranking this week, crushed Iowa City West last Friday, 49-10.

Both teams relied mainly on the run to move the ball. LaSalle threw 13 times at West; Regis passed just five times against Kennedy.

Junior tailback Roy Martin rushed for 103 yards

for the Royals last week and fullback teammate Doug White added 67.

LaSalle Coach T.J. Stecklein said Lancers quarterback Jeff Goebel did a good job running the option last week. Senior fullback Mike Hodges led the LaSalle running game with 61 yards.

The Lancers have an 18-game winning streak dating back to 1982, but have a history of trouble against Regis. The Royals lead the series, 15-2. But both of LaSalle's wins have come in the last four years, including a 6-0 triumph last season.

Iowa City West rushed for 136 yards against the Lancers, so perhaps LaSalle will have difficulty containing the Regis backs.

"Regis was really impressive last week," Stecklein said. "They're a very disciplined team with a super head coach in Tom Good. They have a lot of talent."
