Uncertain on Bush

• As we headed for today's Iowa-Ohio State football game at Columbus, Ohio, we didn't know whether **Fred Bush** would be able to start at fullback for the Hawkeyes.

Bush was injured in the fourth quarter of the 20-17 loss to Penn State. If Bush can't play, Coach **Hayden Fry** is expected to start **Tim Sennott** or move **Owen Gill** to fullback and give **Ronnie Harmon** his first start at running back.

Before the season, Fry said, "I'll guaran-dang-tee you Gill and Harmon will be used in the same backfield." They played together several times last Saturday.

The 6-1, 229-pound Bush is from Manasquan, N.J., one of many Easterners rounded up by Iowa assistant coach **Bernie Wyatt**.

He is a fourth-year player who can play again in 1985 because he red-shirted as a freshman (1981). You won't find many players this humble. No beating around this Bush in assessing his own play.

"I know I've got a great big pair of shoes to fill in taking over for **Norm Granger**," Bush told us, "but I love the challenge."

"I think my blocking and pass-receiving are adequate for a full-back, but the spot I really have to improve is ball-carrying. I can't pop out of there the way Norm could on those quick openers. And couldn't he run in the open, too?"

"Norm and I are close friends, and I'm thrilled that he was able to make the Dallas Cowboys roster this year. He'll be a fine pro, too."

In the first two games, Bush carried eight times for 44 yards, an average of 4.3. His longest was 13 yards against Penn State.

Pass the hash

• **Dr. Ken Paulsen**, Cedar Rapids veterinarian, has set his second Canine and Companion Run Oct. 27 at Squaw Creek Park southeast of Cedar Rapids. Runners are invited to enter, with their dogs. There will be a one-mile run at 9 a.m. and a 3½-mile at 9:30.

Paulsen believes the first run, in September 1982, was the first of its kind. He has heard of six others since then. He moved the date back to "October's bright blue weather" this time so runners and dogs would have time to train.

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• Now that the dust is settling on the USA Wrestling's official censure of Iowa's **Dan Gable**, let's assess the damage, if any.

It will, of course, have zero effect on his coaching status at Iowa. He is still the most respected wrestling coach in the country, if not of the western world.

The censure doesn't even mean that Gable can never coach U.S. wrestlers in Olympic or international competition again. In fact, he has said he would be willing to coach the Olympic team again in 1988 if needed.

Probably the worst effect would be on Gable's pride. That is balanced by the fact that many wrestling people have rallied to Gable's defense.

Finally, even his critics will have to admit at least Gable picked a good man to testify for in the legal maneuverings. The courts awarded **Randy Lewis**, who wrestled for Gable at Iowa, the right to compete at 62 kilograms (136.5 pounds) in the Olympics. All he did was sweep his five Olympic bouts, only one of which went full distance.

Maybe Oklahoma State's **Lee Roy Smith** could have won the gold in Lewis' place, but we doubt he could have been more impressive.

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• NBC-TV this fall will offer the One-Club Challenge, a series featuring **Lee Trevino**, **Seve Ballesteros**, **Greg Norman**, **Isao Aoki**, **Nick Faldo** and **Hal Sutton** competing with one club each on the Old Course at St. Andrews.

Golf Digest says the lowest single-club score was fired by **Chick Harbert** in 1942 at Battle Creek, Mich. He bet he could play 18 holes in less than two hours and that he could break 75 using only one club.

Harbert won both bets. Using a 4-iron, and twice playing good shots out of greenside bunkers, he shot 74 and finished the 6,732-yard course in 1:58.

Slumping Cubs drop 5th in row

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Chicago is yet to clinch the National League Eastern Division title, but the Cubs are already being treated as champions by their opponents.

"I was a little pumped up. They're the Chicago Cubs, they're in first place," said St. Louis rookie pitcher Kurt Kepshire, who limited the Cubs to seven hits as the Cardinals rolled to an 8-0 victory Friday night.

"I got ahead of the hitters and made them swing the bats," added Kepshire, whose masterpiece saddled Chicago with its fifth straight loss and kept the Cubs' magic number for claiming the division title at three.

Any combination of Chicago victories and losses by the second-place New York Mets totaling three would move the Cubs into postseason play for the first time in 39 years. The Mets beat Montreal 6-2 to cut Chicago's

lead to 6½ games. The Cubs have nine games left, the Mets eight.

"I know one thing. It means you can say, 'Hey, the Cubs didn't win the title in St. Louis,'" said Andy Van Slyke, who drove in three St. Louis runs. "It makes the winter a little more enjoyable for you."

Kepshire said it is important that the Cardinals look to the future.

"We're going for second place, third place or whatever," he said. "We're taking it into next year. You've got to have a goal."

Chicago Manager **Jim Frey** seemed more impatient than distressed.

"We're seven (games) up on the loss side with nine

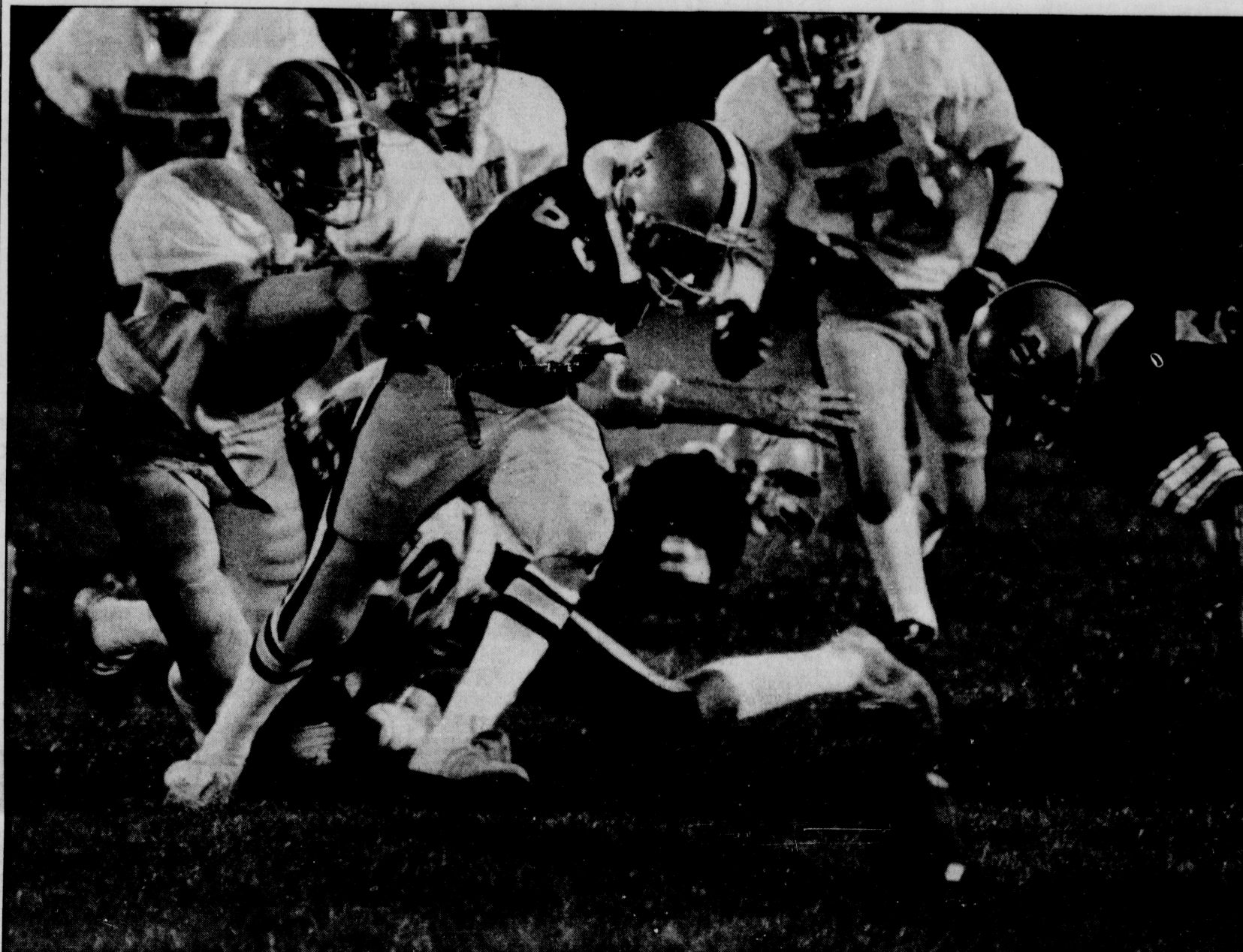
Cub lottery popular

CHICAGO (AP) — Talk about lottery fever these days is talk about Cubs fever.

Warriors edge Cougars in OT

Call it sudden victory for Cedar Rapids Washington's Warriors Friday night.

Kennedy's Cougars, who second-year coach **Al Stiers** said "probably weren't given a nickel's chance of winning" prior to kickoff, forced a 7-7 stalemate with Washington in regulation time. But **Steve Bjornsen's** 10-yard reception on the first play in overtime produced a 14-7 Mississippi Valley Conference football triumph for the Warriors.

The contest, which amounted to 45 minutes of futility and three minutes of excitement, was virtually controlled by Kennedy, which slipped to 1-2 and 1-1 in the Valley.

The Cougars ran 60 offensive plays to Washington's 48, had 206 yards total offense to the Warriors' 181, and held the edge on the ground, 84-51. Washington, which moved to 2-1 and 2-0 in the conference, led in penalties (8 for 60 yards) and turnovers (4).

In addition, Washington quarterback **Adrian**

Davis was intercepted three times, all by tipped passes.

But the Warriors prevailed . . . survived, that is.

After Kennedy's **Barry Mercer** missed a 34-yard field goal attempt with 12 seconds left to play, Washington overcame a delay of game and an encroachment penalty to run out the clock. Davis then redeemed himself by firing the winning touchdown pass to Bjornsen, who was left unprotected in the middle of the end zone.

"The defensive back turned outside and I just curled inside," said Bjornsen, who caught five passes for 64 yards. "Nobody was catching the ball tonight, but I got open at the end."

Kennedy southpaw quarterback **Larry Thomas** attempted to tie it in the extra period, but fired three incomplete passes. The Cougars' **Paul Goode**, who had earlier caught a 79-yard scoring pass from Thomas, was called for offensive pass interference in the left corner of the end zone.

Stiers appeared more pleased than disappointed in the Cougar locker room, and praised

his team's two-week improvement since a 20-7 season-opening defeat to Regis.

"We're a young team and they're coming," he said. "We just needed a break or two tonight. That's a good Washington team. We did everything we could to stay out of overtime. We didn't want to get into overtime with them. They're the best 10-yard team in the state of Iowa."

"All it takes is a quick arm, and that's what it was."

Thomas struck for his team's lone TD on the second possession of the game. He missed on an opening long bomb, but connected this time to Goode, who burst down the left sidelines past Washington's **Terry Smith** with 3:08 left in the quarter. Mercer kicked the extra point.

Washington tied it on the first play of the second quarter at 11:57, when **David Stewart** crashed two yards off tackle to cap a nine-play, 87-yard march. **Kevin Tann** kicked the extra point.

No.1 Regis dumped by Urbandale

URBANDALE — Unranked Urbandale upset top-ranked Cedar Rapids Regis, 29-7, in a Class 3A prep football matchup Friday night.

Scott Fulton passed 11 yards to **Dave Wathen**, then bolted 12 yards on a quarterback sneak to give Urbandale a 13-0 second-quarter lead.

Regis had a first down at the Urbandale 3 with 59 seconds left in the half, but an Urbandale interception in the end zone ended the threat.

"I think that was the key point in the ballgame," said Urbandale Coach **Dennis Frerich**. "It killed their chance to score and gave us momentum going into halftime."

Urbandale built its lead to 23-0 in the third period when **Fulton** passed 30 yards to **John Hagener** for a TD and **Jeff Richards** booted a 24-yard field goal.

The Regals got on the board three minutes into the fourth quarter on **Greg Lorei's** 52-yard halfback pass to **Tom Downey**.

They then forced an Urbandale punt, but fumbled the ball away, and Urbandale locked up the decision on **Kevin Opdahl's** 64-yard romp.

Urbandale is 3-0 and has outscored its opponents by a 129-10 aggregate. Regis edged Urbandale last year, 12-7.

"Our kids did a super job," **Frerich** declared. "They really blocked well. Regis is very tough, a well-coached team."

"We don't care about the rankings — we just hope to sneak up on a few people. We have a tough schedule ahead of us."

Nebraska, Clemson face big tests today

"The party's over."

Willie Nelson and **Don Meredith** have sung it and Nebraska Coach **Tom Osborne** said it after his No. 1-ranked Cornhuskers beat up on Wyoming 42-7 and Minnesota 38-7.

Having enjoyed the two warmups, Nebraska should get something more in the way of competition today from eighth-ranked UCLA.

The game will be broadcast by KGAN-Channel 2 at 2:30 p.m.

"UCLA will be the test," says linebacker **Mark Daum**. "We'll be playing UCLA in their backyard and in front of their people, so it should tell us and some other people just how good we really are."

The party could be over, too, for second-ranked Clemson, also 2-0 after hammering Appalachian State 40-7 and Virginia 55-0. The Tigers don't have to travel as far as Nebraska — barely an hour or so down the road to tangle with No. 20

Georgia in what has become one of the South's hottest rivalries. "All ways one of the biggest fights of the year," according to Georgia line-backer **Knox Culpepper**.

"It's obvious why Clemson is thinking in terms of a national championship because they've got all the ingredients, starting with the talent and experience," says Georgia Coach **Vince Dooley**. "They have seven starters on offense who are seniors and six or seven on defense. So it is an extremely talented and experienced football team — a total football team in every phase of the game."

This crucial early-season day also finds No. 15 Florida State at fourth-ranked Miami and No. 14 Iowa at fifth-ranked Ohio State. The schedule for the rest of the Associated Press Top Ten shows sixth-ranked **Brigham Young** at Hawaii for a night game, **William & Mary** at No. 20

Martina snaps Chris' record

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — Martina Navratilova finally completed a rain-delayed 6-1, 6-2 thrashing of outmatched Melissa Brown on Friday to stretch her winning streak to a record-breaking 56 matches.

With the victory in a first-round match at the Lynda Carter-Maybelline Tennis Classic, Navratilova erased the 10-year-old mark set by Chris Evert Lloyd.

The rain, which had forced the match to be moved back from Wednesday night to Thursday afternoon, and then suspended play at 4-1 in the first set Thursday, caused more problems than Brown, a 16-year-old high school junior from Scarsdale, N.Y.

"It was tough, but it was fun," a relieved Navratilova said at her post-match news conference. "That was what I've been waiting all that time for."

"I never thought it would be broken when (Lloyd) set it back in 1974," she said. "I got so close in January (when her previous longest streak of 54 ended) that I didn't think I'd ever get another chance. 'You have to have luck.'"

Coe, Cornell open Midwest play

Cornell and Coe begin "what our season is all about" today with Midwest Conference inter-division trips to Wisconsin.

Hoping to put a pair of non-conference thrashings behind it, Coe goes to Appleton for a date with 1983 North Division runner-up Lawrence.

Cornell, 1-1 after last week's 42-14 drubbing at Wartburg, faces its first meeting with Ripon since the Redmen edged the Rams, 16-14, in the 1982 conference title playoff.

Despite Coe's 45-31 defeat at William Penn and 31-14 home loss to Iowa Wesleyan, Kohawk Coach Bob Thurness said, "I still think we have a fine football team."

"An 0-2 team is a dangerous team, a team hungry for a win."

"We have played well offensively, and I think we can get a lot better."

We do have to make some improvement defensively.

"We lost to two good, huge teams, both of them now 2-0. We face another big team in Lawrence — 300, 270, 230 at the defensive tackles."

After dropping a 10-3 decision at Trinity, Texas, Lawrence evened its record last week with a 26-14 victory over Concordia, Wis.

"Those scores don't tell us much," Thurness said, "but Trinity is usually one of the better small-college teams in Texas."

Operating under Rich Agness this year while long-time head coach Ron Roberts is on sabbatical leave, Lawrence generated 363 yards in total offense against Concordia, its best output in nine games.

Coe has not met Lawrence since the Vikings exploded in the second half for a 41-6 win in Appleton three years ago.

Lawrence has won 24 of its last 26 conference games.

"WE WENT back to basics this week," said Cornell defensive coordinator Steve Miller. "We've tried to find players who are ready to play."

Miller echoed head coach Jerry Clark's observation that "we played flat" against Wartburg.

"We went through the motions," Clark said. "After we beat a bigger Culver-Stockton team (34-19), we thought we could stay close with Wartburg. They (Wartburg) were not only bigger, they were quick. And we were not mentally ready."

Miller called it "far and away the poorest defensive game we have played in the two-plus years I've been handling the defense."

Acknowledging that "there was considerable significance" in the fact that Cornell did not name a defensive player-of-the-week after

the Wartburg game, Miller indicated that the Rams will make three or four changes in their defensive alignment for Ripon.

He said sophomore tackle Lee Stoveall was "one of the few defensive players who showed some signs of life. He played well."

Miller also reported that red-shirt senior noseguard Warren Braun, an all-conference performer in 1982, is expected to see "spot" action for the Rams today. He has been sidelined by injuries thus far.

Ripon lost heavily by graduation from a team that was a disappointment last season, and has been beaten by UW-Oshkosh (21-7) and Central of Iowa (44-0).

"Those are two pretty good football teams," Miller said. "Ripon will be hungry. But we should be ready to play for what our season is all about (the conference championship)."

Prairie earns 1st win

VAN HORNE — "I feel like a 10,000-pound weight has been lifted off my shoulders."

Those were the words of first-year Head Coach Ed Johnson after his Prairie Hawks battled back from an 8-3 deficit to upset Benton Community, 10-8, in an East Central Iowa Conference game Friday night.

It was the first victory of the year for Prairie and also the first victory of Johnson's young career.

The Hawks took a 3-0 lead into the lockerroom at half-time on the strength of a Brian McLeod field goal. But after an errant David Grabe toss was picked off by Benton Community, the Bobcats marched down the field and Shawn Pfiffner carried the ball over from the one-yard line for the touchdown. Pfiffner then toted the ball over for the extra-point to put the Bobcats ahead 8-3.

Prairie came right back with a 65-yard march of their own with tailback Mark Cleppe, making his

initial start of the season, crossing the goal-line on a one-yard plunge.

"The kids played super. I was really proud of the way they hung in there and came back after last week's loss (59-8 to Linn-Mar)," stated a joyous Johnson.

In addition to Cleppe, Johnson also praised the play of quarterback Grabe, end Brian Griffith and junior fullback Paul Wahlert "who really ran well for us." And Johnson was quick to pass the praise around to his assistant coaches saying, "if it wasn't for those guys (Coaches Jelinek, Bennett and Vesey) we wouldn't have a team — they do all the work."

The win elevated Prairie's record to 1-2 overall and 1-1 in the conference while Benton Community fell to 2-1 overall and 0-1 in conference.

Prairie faces Cedar Rapids Regis next Thursday night at Kingston Stadium.

7 Penn State, Houston at ninth-rated Washington and North Carolina at No. 10 Boston College under the lights in Foxboro, Mass. Third-ranked Texas is idle.

The Second Ten has Baylor at No. 11 Oklahoma, San Diego State at No. 12 Oklahoma State, North Texas State at No. 13 Southern Methodist at night, Wisconsin at No. 16 Michigan, No. 17 Southern California at Arizona State at night, Maryland at No. 18 West Virginia and Southern Mississippi at No. 19 Auburn at night.

NEBRASKA'S VISIT to Pasadena will be its first trip to the Rose Bowl, now UCLA's home field, since losing to Stanford 21-13 in the 1941 Rose Bowl game. The Cornhuskers whipped the Bruins 42-10 last year in Lincoln.

In its first two games, Nebraska fumbled an Oklahoma-like 12 times, losing seven. "We didn't do a good job of hanging onto the ball again," Osborne said. "I think it will iron itself out, but obviously three and four turnovers early in a game is something that can't continue down the road."

UCLA is also 2-0, but it has been anything but a party and the Bruins will be without injured starting quarterback Steve Bono. The Bruins had to struggle against San Diego State 18-15 and Long Beach State 23-17 and Coach Terry Donahue says, "The 1984 UCLA team just hasn't found itself yet. This team hasn't quite gotten there, and yet

it's 2-0. We just haven't gotten our game in full gear yet, but we will. I just hope it's soon."

ALTHOUGH GEORGIA leads its series with Clemson 34-14-1, the Bulldogs show only a 5-4-1 edge over the last decade. And it's dead even — 3-3-1 — in the past seven meetings. However, Clemson has lost 18 of its last 19 trips to Athens, winning only in 1977.

It's supposed to be a close game, and with good reason. Georgia's record of 43-4-1 was the best of any school from 1980-83; Clemson's 30-2-2 mark topped the list from 1981-83. Georgia won the national championship in 1980, Clemson in 1981. And they are two of the three schools to be ranked in the top 11 in the final AP poll in each of the last three seasons (Nebraska is the third).

MIAMI NEEDED a 19-yard field goal on the last play to nip Florida State 17-16 in the regular-season finale a year ago en route to the national championship. The Hurricanes have had only two capacity crowds in the 75,385-seat Orange Bowl — for Notre Dame in 1955 and 1967 — but as of early this week, almost 70,000 tickets had been sold for the home opener.

However, the series has been an odd one. Florida State has won 11 of 19 games in the Orange Bowl — including 10 of the last 12 — while Miami has taken seven of eight in Tallahassee.
