Texas bumps into Penn State today

One of the top early season challengers for the national collegiate football championship likely will suffer a setback today when second-ranked Texas meets No. 4 Penn State in the "neutral" surroundings of East Rutherford, N.J.

They are two of college football's glamor names but have met only once, Penn State winning 30-6 in the 1972 Cotton Bowl. This is the first

of a three-game series — Penn State visits Texas in 1989, the Longhorns are at Penn State in 1990 — and 76,891-seat Giants Stadium is a sellout.

Even though New Jersey is only a four-hour drive from State College, Pa., and almost as long a flight from Austin, Texas, the Longhorns are the "home" team, thanks to a coin flip, although they have sold only 9,500 tickets compared with Penn State's 28,000.

"I'm not sure how neutral it is considering its location," said Texas Coach Fred Akers. "I would have preferred Amarillo."

THE ONLY OTHER matchup of Top Twenty teams in The Associated Press poll today finds No. 13

Clemson at No. 18 Georgia Tech. Meanwhile, top-rated Nebraska visits its Syracuse, third-ranked Ohio State is at Minnesota for a night game, No. 6 Washington is home against Miami of Ohio, seventh-ranked Oklahoma entertains Kansas State, No. 9 Florida State is home against Temple at night, and 10th-ranked Oklahoma State is at Tulsa for a night contest. Fifth-ranked Boston College and No. 8 Brigham Young are not scheduled.

In the Second Ten, No. 11 Southern Methodist entertains Texas Christian at night, No. 12 Georgia visits South Carolina under the lights, No. 14 Michigan is at Indiana, LSU is at No. 15 Southern California, Rice visits No. 16 Miami, Fla., at night, No. 17 UCLA is at Colorado, No. 19 Notre Dame visits Missouri and Tennessee is at No. 20 Auburn.

of Charley Pell, entertains Mississippi State.

Dozier returns to action this week after missing two games.

Nebraska Coach Tom Osborne appears to be trying to soft-soap Syracuse, an overwhelming underdog against the Cornhuskers.

FOOTBALL — The Chicago Bears have placed tight end **Mitch Krenk** on the injured reserve list and activated **Pat Dunsmore**, another tight end, the NFL team announced Friday. Dunsmore, a second-year player from Drake who has been sidelined since training camp with a groin injury, will be in uniform for Sunday's game with the Dallas Cowboys, said Bears spokesman **Bryan Harlan**.

Minnesota's six-time Pro Bowl linebacker **Matt Blair** and defensive end **Neil Elshire** will be activated before Sunday's NFL game with Seattle. The two defenders had knee surgery before the season and have missed the first four games, but will be added to the roster today.

The San Francisco 49ers acquired **Gary Johnson**, a four-time Pro Bowl defensive tackle, from the San Diego Chargers in an NFL trade Friday. The 49ers sent two undisclosed future draft choices to San Diego in exchange for the 32-year-old Johnson.

GOLF — **Curtis Strange** and Canadian **Dan Halldorson** mastered the worst weather conditions the touring pros have encountered this year and slogged through rain, wind, mud and biting cold to tie for the lead Friday in the second round of the \$350,000 LaJet Classic. Strange had a no-bogey, 5-under-par 67 while Halldorson put on a birdie-birdie finish for a 68 in occasional rain, with temperatures in the upper 40s, in winds gusting over 20 mph. The combination produced a wind-chill factor that ranged from 13 to 25 degrees. Strange and Halldorson each finished two trips over the 7,166 yard Forest Oaks Golf Club course in Abilene, Texas, in 135, nine under par.

Defending champion **Greg Norman** beat **Gary Player** 3 and 2 and **Seve Ballesteros** ousted **Nick Faldo** 4 and 3 Friday to advance to the semifinals of the \$183,000 Suntory World Match Play Golf Championship. Also advancing were West Germany's **Bernhard Langer**, who edged **Corey Pavin** of the United States 2 and 1, and **Ben Crenshaw**, who kept American hopes alive with a 3 and 2 victory over **Toru Nakamura** of Japan.

MISC. — The Philadelphia 76ers announced Friday they had signed their first-round draft pick, guard **Leon Wood**, the 6-foot-3 Olympic star who has sued the NBA, the players union and the team over the league's salary cap. Owner **Harold Katz** said the salary cap and suit had no bearing on negotiations, which culminated in a multiyear contract signed Friday. General Manager **Pat Williams** said no other details would be announced.

Veteran driver **Rick Mears**, who suffered multiple fractures in both feet during a crash this month, should be able to walk within 12 weeks and race in next May's Indianapolis 500, his surgeon said Friday. **Dr. Terry Trammell**, an orthopedic surgeon at Methodist Hospital, said he originally feared Mears, 31, would lose two toes. However, he said that danger has vanished and Mears would be hospitalized only a few more days so that his skin condition can be checked.

A **fiesty John McEnroe** methodically disposed of 19-year-old **Pat Cash** in straight sets Friday to give the United States an early 1-0 lead over defending champion Australia in the semifinals of the Davis Cup.

their linebackers at us. There were too many of them to block."
