# Regis runs roughshod over Ottumwa, 35-6

There is a natural order to life: birds fly, fish swim, trains roll and Regis runs.

The Royals run for daylight, run for yardage, run for touchdowns and then run off the football field with another victory tucked away.

Such was the case Friday night when Regis ran all over Ottumwa, 35-6, at the Prairie High School field. The Royals, improving to 4-2, rang up 287 yards on the ground, with Doug White netting 123 in 10 carries and Roy Martin gaining 107 in 17 rushes.

White's total included a 70-yard touchdown journey that gave Regis a 20-0 halftime lead.

"I'm real pleased with everything," said Regis Coach Tom Good. "Our backs are up against the wall; we're fighting to stay in the playoff picture and every game is

Martin and starting quarterback Jim Lensing each scored on one-yard runs in the first half, as did reserve quarterback Andy Scott in the fourth quarter. The other Regis touchdown came on a third-quarter, 11-yard toss from Lensing to Dave Downey.

The Bulldogs (3-3), stepping out of the Southeast Seven Conference, got on the board when linebacker Chris Goodwin raced 86 yards for a touchdown after intercepting a Scott pass in the fourth period.

Regis' domination included 20 first downs to Ottumwa's 10 and a 385-136 edge in total yardage. The Bulldogs picked up just 80 yards on the ground.

"They've got a good football team, and we knew that going in," said Ottumwa Coach Dave Clement. "They were just too physical for us.

"They just completely controlled the line of scrimmage, and when you do that you win football

Regis, rebounding from a 14-6 loss to Cedar Rapids Washington, opened the scoring after forcing two capped a 73-yard third-period march and Scott's one-Ottumwa punts. A drive that began with a 15-yard burst by Martin was helped along when White crashed up the middle for 17, and two plays later Martin caught a 17yard pass from Lensing to reach the Ottumwa two-yard line. Back-to-back one-yard plunges by Martin put the ball in the end zone.

On the Royals' next possession, Downey made a sliding catch for a 20-yard pickup, Greg Lorei ran for 26 on the next play and Lensing then slid in from one yard out for a 14-0 lead.

After Ed Walter picked off an Ottumwa pass and was brought down at his own 30, White's 70-yard scoring run made it 20-zip.

Meanwhile, Ottumwa reached Royal territory just Walter's interception and a lost fumble at the 13.

In the second half, Downey's 11-yard touchdown grab yarder put the lid on a 66-yard drive in the final quarter.

Ottumwa was limited to just two second-half first downs, and none until only 1:45 remained in the third

Ottumwa had lost to Fort Madison (31-30) and Burlington (24-13) before meeting the Royals.

'Regis is better than anybody we've played but Burlington, without a doubt," said Clement, "and they were probably just as good tonight. But it's so hard to tell, because we just played so flat."

That's something Regis - which will tangle with Waterloo Columbus Thursday - wasn't accused of.

The win boosted Hempstead to 3-3 overall and 2-2 in the league. Kennedy, which dipped to 1-5 and 1-4, survived the thrashing by achieving two important goals before heading to the homecoming dance: salvaging respect and finding a new quarterback.

The Cougars, with No. 1 quarterback Larry Thomas transferring last week to Jefferson, went to junior Brian Dixon who was intercepted twice, but passed for 211 yards and one touchdown in his first varsity start. Dixon completed 16 of 25 passes, including a seven-yard TD to Tim Moen and a conversion pass. He was 8 of 13 for 123 yards the second half.

"I though Brian handled himself real well, and I felt our entire team's attitude this week was as good going into the game as I've ever seen it," said Kennedy Coach Al Stiers. "But Hempstead is a team that if given an inch will open the flood gates on you. We had a letdown in the second quarter, found ourselves in a hole and were late getting started.'

Kennedy scored its two TDs in the final seven minutes, and almost trimmed the deficit on the final play

of the game when Steve Burke's dive was short from the one.

Senior tailback Mike Waters led Hempstead and all rushers with 70 yards on 12 carries, while scoring on touchdown runs of 35 and one yard.

Kennedy's defense was put in a hole on the opening kickoff when Kevin Shetler returned the ball to the Cougars' 30, but stiffened in time before Tom Ottavi booted a 27yard field goal.

The Cougars dug its secondquarter hole after Dixon was intercepted by Kelly Mudge at the Cougar 48. Eight plays later, Eric Bredesen crashed in from the one. Kennedy again failed to move on offense, and Hempstead needed only two plays before Shetler brook loose up the middle on a 40-yard scoring jaunt with 5:24 left in the half. Waters intercepted a Dixon pass with 3:58 left, and then lined up for a 25-yard run to make it 24-0 at halftime.

Hempstead padded its lead with a 32-yard scoring run by Dave Kohl four minutes into the third quarter. Kennedy's Brad Pospisil, who leads the Valley in interceptions (6), stopped the next Hempstead drive at the Cougars' 49, but failed to ignite a rally.

Hempstead again thrust ahead, marching 87 yards in 13 plays, with Waters scoring from the one with 9:33 left to play. Kennedy got on the scoreboard with an eight-play, 66yard drive of its own. Dixon, under neavy pressure, hit Paul Goode for a 14-yard gain and Scott Shaffer for another 14. Goode was the No. 5 receiver in the Valley last week, and picked up eight catches for 123

Blaine Shaffer scored two plays later on an eight-yard run around left end.






