No tax money

• The unfortunate thing about Hayden Fry's push for bigger salaries for his Iowa football assistants was the timing. It came when Gov. Terry Brandstad was trimming \$91.1 million from the state budget to meet our state deficit.

Along that same line, however, the Hawkeye coach had a very strong point that has been overlooked by many of those rushing to comment on what he said.

He said his aides, like the university faculty members, got less than a 2 percent raise.

"Our athletic department doesn't receive any state-appropriation funds," noted Fry, who said he wasn't kicking about his own salary, "and yet we're still tied to the academic salary schedule."

Fry might have added the reason the Hawkeye athletic department is in the black financially is because of revenue generated through football success. The coaches who received a 2 percent raise were very helpful in bringing in big income through sold-out football games, four bowl trips, many games on national and regional TV and increased advertising.

Many critics seem to get things twisted and have the idea they contibute to Iowa's athletic program through their tax dollars. The athletic program gets no cut from the money appropriated to the university by the Legislature.

P.S. — I think the Iowa football staff certainly merits a bigger raise, and the athletic department should be allowed to pay it.

Elmer Marek returns

• Ask any graduate of old Washington High of Cedar Rapids about the glorious athletic years under Coach Leo Novak in the early 1920s, and one of the first names you'll hear will be Elmer Marek.

The Washington Tigers claimed national championships in football, basketball and track from 1921 through 1923. Marek was a standout in all three sports. Then he had a fine career as a football halfback at Ohio State.

Marek, 81, now a resident of Sacramento, Calif., came home last week, his first visit to Cedar Rapids

since his mother died 23 years ago. "It's great to be back, and I'm amazed anybody still remembered me," said Marek,

"Leo Novak was a tremendous coach. He was far ahead of his time. I often compared him with Paul Brown, the great high school coach at Massillon, Ohio, who went on to Ohio State, Great Lakes Navy during the war and then to the pros.



everything he did. He and Knute Rockne were great friends, and they traded lots of techniques. The football formation we used at Washington was the Notre Dame shift that Rockne made famous.

"Leo also had a temper. I'll never forget when we beat Shenandoah 125-0. That Shenandoah team had Willis Glassgow, later an All-American at Iowa, too.

"We vent ahead by 50-some to nothing at the half, and the coach sent us first-stringers to the dressing room. But the Shenandoah coach said something insulting to Leo just before the second half, and he got mad. He came in and told us to put our uniforms back on so we could go out and show that guy some more touchdowns.

Marek said Washington's amazing success also was due to "a fantastic bunch of about 20 kids who happened to come along at the same time. Most of them had

outstanding talent in all sports. "The athletes today are so much bigger and better. I weighed about 180 pounds at Ohio State. Today they might let me return punts or kickoffs, but they'd never let me try to run through those 280-pound linemen!'

Hawks go for 2-0

any college football matchups are toss-ups before game time, and Saturday's Northern Illinois-Iowa contest at Kinnick Stadium is no exception.

It's a real toss-up, folks. Will it be a boring rout, an exciting rout or just a sound victory for the Hawkeyes? The drama will unfold at 1:05 p.m. The game is sold out.

One national publication lists Iowa as a 42-point favorite, and the game is probably "off the board" in Nevada.

But it's not fair to categorize Northern Illinois as a dog, though the team nickname is the Huskies. NIU is a member of the Mid-American Conference, a league of 10 small Division I schools. The conference has long held an excellent reputation for good players and good coaches.

Among those coaches is the Huskies' Jerry Pettibone, a first-year head coach who seems to be wellregarded and respected by his players and rival coaches.

Pettibone left his job of assistant head coach at Texas A&M to become a boss after 19 years of assisting.

Among those Pettibone has worked for are Barry Switzer, Tom Osborne, Jackie Sherrill, and — oh, yes — Iowa Coach Hayden Fry.

Pettibone was Fry's recruiting coordinator and freshman coach at Southern Methodist in 1971.

"Jerry is one of the finest people I've been associated with in intercollegiate athletics," said Fry. "He's had a great background, having been with Oklahoma, Nebraska and Texas

The Pettibone Era at Northern Illinois opened with a 17-0 homefield triumph over MAC foe Western Michigan. Then the Huskies embarked on a three-game trip through the Big Ten. That started last Saturday with a 38-17 loss at Wisconsin. NIU visits Northwestern next week.

The Huskies never really threatened to win at Wisconsin, but they didn't get blown off the field, either. "We felt like we were competitive for three quarters against Wisconsin,' Pettibone said.

Stewart's 3 TDs power Wash

Cedar Rapids Washington's David Stewart, whose initials could stand for "Designated Scorer," made Thursday night drag on for Kennedy's frustrated Cougars.

The 6-foot, 205-pound Stewart crashed for 135 yards in 23 attempts and scored three touchdowns to power top-ranked Washington to a 28-6 Mississippi Valley Conference football victory before 3,800 fans at Kingston Stadium.

Mets 1 back of Cards; Coleman gets 100th steal

Pennant races in both the American and National Leagues heated up Thursday when California drew even with Kansas City in the American League West and New York pulled within a game of the St. Louis Cardinals in the National League East.

California gained its tie by whipping the Chicago White Sox 8-0. Kansas City, meanwhile, dropped a 6-4 decision to Seattle.

And the Mets took advantage when the Cardinals had their sevengame winning streak snapped. St. Louis lost 6-3 to Philadelphia and New York stopped the Chicago Cubs, 5-1.

Rookie Vince Coleman of the Cardinals became the third NL player ever to steal 100 or more bases in a season when he stole second in the fifth inning. Maury Wills of the Los Angeles Dodgers in 1962, with 104, and Lou Brock of the Cardinals, with 118 in 1974, are the only National leaguers who have passed the century mark. Rickey Henderson of the Yankees holds the major-league record of 130 in 1982.

REGGIE JACKSON hit two home runs, his 25th and 26th of the year, and drove in three runs to back John Candelaria's six-hit shutout for the Angels.

Candelaria, 6-1, struck out six and walked two for his fourth straight win.

NINTH-INNING doubles by Alvin Davis and Dave Henderson gave Seattle its victory over Kansas City. The loss was the Royals' fourth straight to the Mariners.

SU defense scares Vanderbilt

were a football fan instead of Vanderbilt's coach. Then he wouldn't have to worry about solving Iowa State's defensive riddle Saturday afternoon when the clubs meet at Cyclone Stadium-Jack Trice Field.

Kickoff on Parents Day is scheduled

"Defensively, they're really amazing," said MacIntyre of the unit ranked No. 2 in the country. "If you didn't play them they'd be fun to watch."

MacIntyre's Commodores arrive with a 1-1 record after last Saturday's 42-16 drubbing at Kansas. Compounding Vandy's problems is uncertainty at quarterback, where a freshman replaces injured Mark Wracher (dislocated hip) this

But the uncertainty works both ways. "Vanderbilt is going to be a team that is somewhat of a question mark for us,' ISU Coach Jim Criner declared earlier

That's because he doesn't know if Tim Richardson, a rollout scrambler, or John Gromos, a classic drop-back passer, will start at quarterback for the Commodores. MacIntyre hasn't said, and won't until game time.

Also, Criner isn't sure if Vandy will invert its offensive guards and tackles again, like it did in the Commodores' 29-26 victory over the Cyclones in Nashville two years ago. MacIntyre played his bigger tackles in the middle and moved his quicker guards outside then, to combat strengths in ISU's defense

Iowa State gave that 1983 game away after leading, 26-22. Breakdowns in pass coverage helped Vandy score the winning touchdown with just seven seconds left to play.

However, Criner said revenge is not much of a factor this week against the Southeastern Conference foe. Only three Cyclone starters - Lester Williams, Jim Luebbers and Kevin Eggleston - were listed as starters against the Commodores two years ago in Criner's

second game at ISU. Last week, Kansas riddled Vanderbilt's defense for 651 yards as Jayhawk quarterback Mike Norseth set Big 8 Conference records for passing yardage and total offense. Criner said KU confused Vandy with a multitude of offensive sets.

"I don't know if we can create the same problems," said Criner, whose offense sputtered in a 10-3 victory over Utah State last week CYCLONE NOTES: The ISU basket-

Vandy struck out when it took to air

The Vanderbilt Commodores are hoping for smoother sailing when they fly into Des Moines today after wind turbulence disrupted their trip to Kansas a week ago.

Vanderbilt's charter flight made three approaches to the Topeka, Kan., airport last Friday, but failed to land each time.

"The winds kept changing and they were fairly forceful," reports Lew Harris, Vandy's sports information director.

On the first approach, the plane's instrument panel reportedly malfunctioned. That was corrected, but on the second attempt a 20-knot tailwind caused the plane to pull up. On the third try, a 30knot crosswind caused the right wing to tilt dramatically. It missed touching the runway by only a few feet.

"I saw cigarette butts on the runway," said one player who sat on the right side of the plane. Finally, the pilot gave up and landed at the

airport in Kansas City, Mo. 'I think the pilot always had control of the

plane," said Harris. "We had some players that became ill and that sort of thing."

The Commodores lost their football game at Kansas, 42-16, and play Iowa State Saturday afternoon.
