# Royals stay alive, 6-1

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The Kansas City speed connection of Lonnie Smith and Willie Wilson sent a signal, loud and clear: Time has not yet expired on the American League champion Royals.

The Royals' No. 1 and 2 hitters sparked an offensive surge Thursday night that carried Kansas City to a 6-1 victory in Game 5 of the World Series against St.

The victory cut the Cardinals' advantage in the best-of-seven Series to three gamesto-two and sent the Series back to Kansas City for Game 6 Saturday. The Royals will send left-hander Charlie Leibrandt, the hard-luck loser of Game 2, against Cardinal right-hander Danny Cox, who won Game 2 with the aid of four ninth-inning

"What keeps us coming back is that

World Series ring," Wilson said. "We want to win it. We were thinking about taking this back home. Nobody thought about

With Danny Jackson pitching in and out of trouble in the early going despite allowing only five hits, Wilson and Smith spearheaded an 11-hit attack, matching the Royals' offensive output in their 6-1 victory in Game 3. Smith had two hits and scored a pair of runs, and Wilson had two hits, including a triple and a pair of RBI.

"I'M IN A good groove, the groove I like to be in," Jackson said. "I concentrated harder tonight, especially with our backs to the wall.

The Royals scored once in the first inning against Bob Forsch, then added three more in the second, beginning with the first controversial call of the Series in a disputed play at home plate argued vehemently between Cardinals Manager Whitey Herzog and umpire John Shulock.

"Too much Danny Jackson tonight," Herzog said. "We haven't done too much with him the last two times we faced him. The ballclub isn't hitting. They're pitching well, but you'd think we would get a few hits every now and then."

Still left for the Royals was an unenviable task. They had fallen behind 3-1 in the Series Wednesday night when they were shut out 3-0 by John Tudor. Of 34 previous teams to face such a deficit, only four had gone on to win the Series, the last being the 1979 Pittsburgh Pirates.

# Hawks defend No. 1 spot again

On the seventh Saturday of its season, Iowa's mission is simple and straightfor-

"The biggest thing for us is to go there, win and stay injury-free," said Hawkeye Coach Hayden Fry.

The No. 1-ranked football team in the country is a 24-point favorite to preserve its unbeaten record in a 1:30 p.m. game at Northwestern's Dyche Stadium. The Big Ten game is not a sellout and it will not be televised.

Should Iowa win, it would have a 7-0 record for the first time in 63 years. The 1900, 1921 and 1922 teams all started with seven straight victories.

Although Iowa has dominated Northwestern in recent years, winning 11 straight times, Fry believes the Wildcats are no longer the Mildcats.

"I'm more worried this week than I would be against Michigan or Ohio State, he said. "Northwestern doesn't have the glamor or tradition of those teams, and that's what makes it tough in terms of preparation.

'Northwestern has made consistent progress under Denny Green. In fact, I'm Denny's biggest fan because I can relate to

sick programs and turning them around. He'll win some more games this season.

'Probably the biggest item about them is they play wild on defense. The like to punish and hit people. Plus, their offense has the capability of scoring a lot of

Whether Fry's comments are pure rhetoric or stark reality may be debatable. Nevertheless, Fry probably is right that Northwestern is catching the Hawks at an opportune time, a week after they played Michigan and a week before going to Ohio

At 3-3 overall, Northwestern is off to its best start since 1971. Last week, the Wildcats won at Wisconsin, 17-14, on John Duvic's late 42-yard field goal. Two weeks ago, Iowa won at Wisconsin, 23-13.

"That win lends credibility to our program," said Green. "Now we're looking forward to playing the No. 1 team in the

"Each year, Iowa has gotten better. As many players as they lost on defense last year, it's amazing they can be so aggressive and talented. Their combination of offense and defense is what makes them so

There is only one change in Iowa's starting lineup. Red-shirt freshman David Hudson is slated to open at fullback ahead of Fred Bush. Hudson is averaging 4.4 yards per carry, Bush 2.0.

Iowa cornerback Ken Sims was seen in a class Wednesday with a cast on his right hand, according to one report. If Sims is unable to play, his replacement would be freshman Keaton Smiley.

Northwestern has been hit hard by injuries, losing five starters in the past few


In the last six seasons, Iowa has defeated Northwestern by a combined score of 284-40, a per-game average of 47-6. The closest game in that span was a 25-3 Iowa win in 1980.

Iowa quarterback Chuck Long will play against Northwestern for the fifth straight season. In four years, he has completed 52 of 73 passes for 828 yards and six touchdowns against the Wildcats. Long completed his only pass attempt

against Northwestern in 1981. An NCAA ruling allowed Long to take '81 as a redshirt year, even though he played in one regular-season game and the Rose Bowl.

Last year in Evanston, it was running back Ronnie Harmon who did the most damage. He rushed 24 times for 121 yards

None of the TV cameras had a better view than Shulock. No matter how vigorously Manager Whitey Herzog beefed, he could not accuse Shulock of being out of position.

So let's pretend the big leagues permitted instant replays as the final authority. The super umpire seated somewhere with a look at all the TV monitors would have had to use those limited views and then maybe over-ruled an umpire who had the best position in the world in the first place.

From my seat in the auxiliary pressbox down the third-base line in Busch Stadium, I had a good look at the play originally. There are big TV monitors all along the press row, so I watched the many replays,
