

### Hap's foot keyed UCLA?

• Hoo-boy, here we go again with another theory on why Iowa's football team, favored in the Rose Bowl game last Jan. 1, was shocked by UCLA, 45-28.

Some of us naively figured it was another case of home cooking for the Pac-10, which has won the last five and 15 of the most recent 17.

The average fan thought the final - maybe even the outcome would have been different if Iowa's Ronnie Harmon hadn't fumbled the ball away four times in the first half and dropped a TD pass in the second half.

Later it was revealed Larry Station, Hawkeye All-America linebacker, suffered a nerve injury in his back early in the game and could not adequately cover the cutback runs of Eric Ball, UCLA freshman. Station didn't tell anyone he was hurt, Coach Hayden Fry said, so he wasn't replaced.

Now comes a new cloak-anddagger theory. We are told that Homer Smith, UCLA's offensive coordinator, studied Iowa films and discovered the key was how Hawkeye nose guard Hap Peterson placed his feet.

The San Francisco Chronicle carried an Aug. 27 story by Jake Curtis that read, in part:

"UCLA is in the top five of virtually every preseason ranking, and its football program of the 1980s is regarded as one of the nation's best . . . The reputation is not without foundation. The Bruins have won four consecutive New Year's Day bowl games, and they have scored 129 points in the last three. (That's 43 a game against the country's top teams, folks.)

"(In the Rose Bowl), not only did a second-string QB (Matt Stevens, 16-for-26 passing) and a secondstring tailback (Eric Ball, 227 yards rushing, four TDs) lead the offense, but one of the means to victory was noticing the way Iowa's nose guard placed his foot when lining up.

"Uh, could you run that last part by me again? Let Eric Ball explain.

'The coaches can sit there and pick a team apart if you give them time, especially Homer Smith,' said Ball. 'It took them a long time to figure out Iowa. They watched a lot of film. Then they noticed the way the nose guard's right foot was placed. If it was back, the nose guard would break to his right side; if not, he would go left. Matt would look and just audible the right play. We had plays designed for each

I recall a similar story after the 1956 season when Iowa was headed for its first Rose Bowl game. Tackle Alex Karras was chosen on the All-America team picked by the Football Writers Association of America for Look Magazine.

Look brought the players to New York for a big news media bash. Coach Forest Evashevski was invited, but he had a conflict and sent assistant Bob Flora instead.

Karras, Flora and I flew to Chicago, where we met others from the Midwest for the flight to New York. Paul Hornung, Notre Dame's famous quarterback, was among those joining us. Iowa had routed Notre Dame, 48-8, just the previous week. Hornung quickly looked up Karras and Flora.

"This may sound funny, because Iowa beat us so bad," Hornung said, "but I think I can give you guys a tip that may help you in the Rose Bowl. Our scouts noticed when your quarterback, Kenny Ploen, lines up to take the snap, he puts his right foot back so he can pull out quicker if it's going to be a pass

play. We keyed on that." "Yes, we knew that," Flora replied quietly, "and we also knew

Notre Dame knew that." "You did?" demanded Hornung increduously. "Then why didn't you have Ploen change?'

"We figured most of the time we could still pass successfully even when Notre Dame knew Ploen was going to roll out," Flora explained. "But we also knew once your defense got to depending on that key, we could cross you up by having Ploen change his style and our offense would catch you real bad for a long gainer."

"Oh," Hornung said and resumed studying the stewardess.

Well, Iowa went to the Rose Bowl and pinned a 35-19 defeat on Oregon State, which had lost at Iowa, 14-13, earlier that season.

# 60 suspended Huskers can play on Saturday

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Sixty Nebraska football players who were suspended will be allowed to play against Florida State on Saturday while the school appeals the penalties, the NCAA said Thursday.

An NCAA subcommittee will consider the appeal Tuesday, NU Chancellor Martin Massengale said.

"We've had a very cooperative day with the NCAA," Massengale said at a news conference. "We look forward now to playing the game Saturday under normal conditions with our players, and we think we'll have an exciting football game.'

Earlier in the day, Nebraska Coach Tom Osborne had said his eighth-ranked Cornhuskers might forfeit their opener against the No. 11 Seminoles because of the suspensions.

"We're pleased with the stay in that it gives us all an opportunity to draw a breath," Osborne said.

David Maggard, chairman of the NCAA Council's Subcommittee on Eligibility Appeals, said denying a stay of the suspensions would have been unfair to the players if the appeal is upheld next week.

"We believe that the uniqueness of this case merits delaying the implementation," Maggard said in a statement released by the NCAA.

A decision Wednesday by the NCAA Eligibility Committee resulted in the suspension of 53 Cornhusker

players for one game and seven other players for two

The committee gave Nebraska an option of suspending at least 10 players per game over a number of games, instead of holding all the players out of the Florida State game, said Dave Cawood, spokesman for the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

Saturday's game will be televised by ABC and will be the first night game at Memorial Stadium.

The penalties involve about 30 of Nebraska's top 40 players, Osborne said. He said most of the suspended players provided complimentary passes for people not authorized to use them.

Massengale said the penalties were "on the strong side." He declined to say what penalty, if any, the football program deserved for the infractions.

NU officials wouldn't rule out legal action if the appeal is denied. Osborne said the school could seek an injunction in district court.

The coach said Nebraska still might forfeit a game if the appeal is denied. The Cornhuskers' second game of the season is Sept. 20 at Illinois.

Nebraska's request for a stay of the suspensions was based primarily on the players' rights to due process,

## Regis nips Kennedy

Cedar Rapids Regis' Mike McCool had the freedom to run the shotgun offense the way he saw fit Thursday night at Kingston Stadium, and the senior quarterback pulled the trigger just in time . . . overtime, that

McCool delivered a two-point conversion pass to speedy Mike Schulte in the right corner of the end zone, to give the Royals a 29-28 double overtime prep football victory over Kennedy's Cougars.

It was a sweet debut for Regis first-year coach Gaylord Hauschildt, who took over the Royals' head job from veteran Tom Good after spending 10 years as assistant.

"I think the jitters are over now," said Hauschildt, with a laugh. "It was an excellent game; both teams did tremendously well. Mike Mc-Cool, I think, matured throughout the game. He really settled down and does a good job of picking his receivers. Also, he knows when to throw the ball away."

The season-opening triumph, Regis' third straight over the Cougars and 14th in 19 meetings in the series, was achieved despite 102 yards in penalties and the powerrunning effort of Kennedy fullback Tim White.

## Helmets must wear warning stickers

DES MOINES (AP) - Although rules have been updated to make high school football safer than it used to be, helmets for the first time this year must have warning stickers declaring that the headgear is no guarantee against injuries.

"Even though you wear an approved helmet, no helmet can prevent all injuries," said Rick Wulkow, administrative assistant for the Iowa High School Athletic Association.

The label states in bold letters: "Warning. No helmet can prevent all head or neck injuries a player might receive while participating in football.'

In smaller letters, the warning continues, "Do not use this helmet to butt, ram, or spear an opposing player. This is in violation of the football rules and such use can result in severe head injuries, paralysis or death to you and possible injury to your opponents."

Last year, three high school players died of injuries received in games, including one in Iowa. Shawn offensive center and defensive end for Hampton, died last September a day after he complained of dizziness and walked off the field just before the finish of a game with Ackley-Geneva.

Officials of St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester, Minn., said the boy died of a severe concussion and total deprivation of oxygen, or

Wulkow said no lawsuits were filed in that case, but in other cases, coaches, parents and schools have been sued for failing to adequately warn players of the possibility of injuries. Now, he said, they are being warned.

He said the National Operating Committee on Standards for Athletic Equipment has long recommended the warning labels, and the 50-member National Federation Football Rules Committee this year agreed. Many teams in Iowa used the labels last year, he said.

'We're saying you use the helmet at your own risk, that's what they're telling the players," he said. "It's an attempt to make the game a little safer.'

Wulkow said he didn't think any players or parents would be frightened by the warning. "Because of the rules changes, the game of football has become much safer than before. In 1969, 26 kids died as a direct result of football injuries. Last year it was just three. We just think it's time for an awareness of some of these things (potential for injury). I don't think it prevents the kids from being involved," he said.

Another new rule provides a 15-yard penalty against a team whose players, coaches, managers, trainers or anyone else on or near the team's bench uses insulting language or gestures.

# Young outfield keeps Toronto in thick of things

#### Moseby, Bell, Barfield hope to catch Red Sox in the A.L. East

ORONTO (AP) - When Lloyd Moseby suggested that the wind in Exhibition Stadium pushed George Bell's batting practice homer out of the park, the excitable Toronto Blue Jays left fielder circled out of the batting cage and raised his right arm in a muscular right angle.

Pointing to a bulging forearm, Bell declared: "That's no wind.

Wind or no, the outfield of Bell, Moseby and Jesse Barfield in left, center and right has propelled the Blue Jays into a hot race with the Boston Red Sox in the American League East. Toronto has won 15 of its last 19 and trails the Sox by 41/2 games.

Opposing teams consider the three 26year-olds the best outfield in baseball, and the figures bear them out.

The trio has a league-leading 79 homers and 270 RBIs and combine brilliantly in the field to help make Toronto the American League's best defensive ball club with just 81 errors.

Barfield, with a powerful arm, and Bell are tied for the league lead in assists, each having thrown out 16 runners.

Moseby has stolen 29 bases and his career-high 20th homer this week means that for the first time in the Blue Jays' 10year history, all three of their outfielders have at least 20 season homers.

Barfield, an affable 200-pounder once

dubbed "Jesse the Body" for his weightlifter's physique, led the league in home run most of the summer but has been stuck on 30 since he blasted one in Baltimore on Aug. 13.

"The only thing I'm thinking about is catching Boston," Barfield said when asked how he felt about his homer slump, partly attributable to a late-August knee injury. He now trails Milwaukee's Rob Deer and Oakland's Dave Kingman who have 31,

while teammate Bell has nearly caught up At one point in August, Barfield and Bell were one-two in homers and high up in

other slugging categories, prompting comparison with outfield legends Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris of the New York Yankees a quarter of a century ago. Blue Jays Manager Jimy Williams shrugs


"We love each other, not only as teammates. I love those guys as people, I love their families.'

## Bell, Harris eager to do their part for Bears

CHICAGO (AP) - Todd Bell and Al Harris, who missed the Bears' championship season because of contract battles, are back and eager to do their part in strengthening Chicago's defense.

"I'm here to get my Super Bowl ring," said Harris, a starting linebacker with the Bears in 1984, when he reported to training camp this

"Hopefully he'll get that Super Bowl XXI ring on his finger," said Bears General Manager Jerry Vainisi, who negotiated Harris' contract, for an estimated \$825,000 over three

BELL, A STRONG safety, signed a month after Harris and said he

"In the last year, I came to realize football is not the only important things in my life," said Bell, 27, who will receive an estimated \$1.2 million over three years.

"I'm just sorry I wasn't part of that Super Bowl XX. But that's behind me.'

Religion plays a big role in the lives of both men, and Harris said his bitterness toward the Bears over the salary dispute clashed with his spiritual feelings during the Bears 46-10 Super Bowl win over New England.

"The Lord was telling me to pray for the Bears," he said. "My emotions were telling me, 'Nope.' "

HARRIS, 29, SAID he wanted to go to Philadelphia when Buddy Ryan quit as Bears defensive coordinator after the Super Bowl to become head coach of the Eagles, but the Bears wouldn't let him go. It was Ryan who criticized Bears management last year for not sign-

ing the two players. Coach Mike Ditka takes some of the blame for the long holdouts. "Sometimes players feel I don't think they're important to the

team," said Ditka. "That's not true." The holdouts kept in close touch with each other during the 1985 season, and soon after Harris reported to camp in July, he telephoned

"He called and let me know everything was all right and he was just enjoying being back," said Bell. Now, both are working their way back into the lineup.


"I feel like a rookie," said Harris. "I never did this before - take a year off from football. I've played straight through since I was in the ninth grade."

**DEFENSIVE END Dan Hampton,** a No. 1 draft choice with Harris in 1979, said it was good to see Harris back, "but I don't envy his position. Whenever you miss a year, you miss

In the cases of both Harris and Bell, the players who took over their positions became standouts.

Bell's successor, Dave Duerson, was the Pro Bowl strong safety in 1985. Harris was the starting right linebacker in 1984 ahead of thenrookie Wilber Marshall, who blossomed in Harris' absence.

But new defensive coordinator Vince Tobin says he is certain both Bell and Harris will get a lot of

# Cornell opens with Olivet Nazarene

Jerry Clark unveils his 28th Cornell College football team Saturday at Ash Park in Mount Vernon against Olivet Nazarene of Kankak-

Kickoff time is 1:30 for the first football contest between the two schools. Clark says "we're going into it cold."

"We scheduled the game (homeand-home) because I knew the coach. But he left.

"All we know is what we could get by phone. They said they play the 52-package on defense, the Ipackage on offense. That's what we've practiced against."

Nazarene, an NAIA independent, went 1-7 last fall - including four lopsided losses - and has 50 freshman on a squad of 70 players

"We're hoping that with that many freshmen, they don't have everything down pat yet," Clark says. Even if they do, Cornell should not find itself in very deep trouble.

The Rams graduated only three key players from a team that went 8-0 last season before suffering a 40-13 embarrassment at the hands of arch-rival Coe.

The 9-0 Kohawks thereby won the Midwest Conference South Division title, tied St. Norbert in the conference championship game and lost to Central at Pella in the first round of the NCAA Division III playoff.

CLARK SAYS THE Cornell defense has been "looking good" but his offensive unit hasn't.

"We're throwing pretty well," he elaborates, "but we can't seem to get our running game going. I haven't been able to put my finger on the reason."

It isn't inexperience. The Rams return all of the running backs who contributed measurably in 1985, including the top four - Kirk McCurry, Joby Koehn, Antonio Jones and Wade Johnson. They

combined for 968 yards rushing. The only senior in that group, Koehn became Cornell's second 1,000-yard runner in 1984 with a 1,279 total, then missed much of last season with a knee injury.

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Clark says "it's taken Joby some time to get confidence in the knee, but he's been scrimmaging with no problem. I don't think he's back to what he was two years ago, but I think he'll get there."

Hooker was the third most proficient Division III passer of all time for 1,818 and a school-record 21



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# Linn-Mar, Marion continue rivalry

In 1985, the rule that football games between Marion and Linn-Mar must be knock-down, drag-outs was lifted.

The rule will probably be back in effect tonight.

Last year, Linn-Mar thumped Marion 45-8 in the season-debut for both. It was one of the few games between the two that wasn't a nailbiter. Good reason existed for the one-sided result. Linn-Mar had a sensational team that won all 12 of its games and captured the state Class 4A championship.

Whether or not the Lions will be weaker this season is unknown. But tonight's contest is at Marion, and the Indians undoubtedly will be psyched to play ball against their city rivals.

'Basically," said Marion Coach Dave Messerli, "it's a very big football game. Obviously, Linn-Mar has a lot of excellent players and an excellent coaching staff. I know they lost a lot of talent, but they had a

very good junior varsity program."

IT WILL BE Linn-Mar's first game as a Mississippi Valley Conference member, though the Lions don't play their first Valley game until next week when they host

"It will be a typical Linn-Mar-Marion game," Lions Coach Greg Purnell said. "Last year was no indication of how the scores have been or the intensity of the game in years past. The series is at 8-7 or 8-8



# Hall of Famer Greenberg dies

Hank Greenberg, the boy from the Bronx who grew up to become a Hall of Fame slugger, died Thursday at his home in Beverly Hills, Calif. He was 75 years old.

According to a statement released by Alan Rothenberg, president of the Los Angeles Clippers basketball team and a senior partner in the law firm in which Greenberg's son, Stephen, is also employed, the former Detroit Tiger star had been suffering from cancer for 13 months.

Harry Benjamin Greenberg was born Jan. 1, 1911, and spent his youth first on the Lower East Side of Manhattan and then in the Bronx.

After graduating from James Monroe High School, he enrolled at New York University on an athletic scholarship in 1929 but dropped out to sign a baseball contract for \$9,000 a year. He thus began a 22year career in professional baseball as a player, executive and team owner after refusing to listen to Paul Krichell, the New York Yankee scout, who tried to sign him to a contract.

Tigers in 1930, he returned to the minors until 1933, when he rejoined the Tigers for good. He spent 12 of his 13 seasons with Detroit as a first baseman and a left fielder. He led the American League in home runs five times and runs batted in four times. He retired in 1947 after playing

one season with the Pittsburgh Pirates, to whom he had been sold. In that one season in Pittsburgh, Greenberg became the highest-paid player in baseball. When he threatened to retire,

John Galbreath, the owner of the

Pirates, signed him to a \$65,000

Cubs, a Chicago Cubs farm team.

contract. Greenberg enjoyed his best season in 1938 when, in addition to hitting 58 home runs, he drove in 146 runs. He also scored 144 runs and drew 119 walks that season, both tops in the league. The 58 home runs, at the time second best to Rabe Ruth's 60, equaled the 1932 feat by Jimmie Foxx of the Philadel-

phia Athletics. After hitting only 25 homers, driving in 74 runs and batting :249 in 1947 with the Pirates, he retired.
