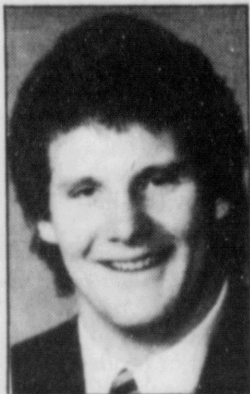
The reason, of course, is his older brother, Mike, a former Hawkeye offensive tackle, was drafted in the first round by the Jets this year.

"I talk on the phone with Mike at least once a week," said Dave. "He calls to wish us good luck. Mike suffered a hyperextension of a knee in training camp but should be able to play in another week."

The two Hights used to be a familiar sight riding motorcycles on the roads between Iowa City and Dyersville, their hometown.

"Mike got rid of his cycle because the Jets didn't permit them during training camp," Dave said. "I still ride mine, and you can be sure I wear a helmet when I do."

Dave's prep team at Dyersville Beckman had a 5-4 record in 1983, but improved to 8-1 in his senior season. The loss was to Cedar Rapids LaSalle, keeping Beckman out of the playoffs.

"Mike and I played both offense and defense in high school, but I always liked defense better and the coaches let me play that here," Dave said.

Haight had two tackles in the opener and four last Saturday.

"Both Haight and Thomas are inexperienced," said Fry, "but they're only going to get better. I called Thomas 'Trailer Hitch' because he was overweight when he transferred here from Nebraska. However, he's been able to cut some weight, and Haight is up to about 265 now. Haight has great upper-body strength."

Haight admits his brother's Jets contract has prompted him to think about a pro future, "but that's a long way off, as I have two more seasons at Iowa after this, and for me it probably would be a one-in-a-million chance."

He says he enjoys hunting and fishing in his spare time. He catches bass in farm ponds and other fish in the Mississippi River, "but I'm still looking forward to shooting my first pheasant."

Melvin Durslag, veteran writer for the Los Angeles Herald Examiner, had his tongue in cheek when he wrote his Sept. 17 column, but he merits an "A" for originality. Angels win West

Downing's 5 RBIs help to eliminate Texas

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — Brian Downing knocked in five runs with two homers as the California Angels clinched their third divisional title in eight years with an 8-3 victory over Texas Friday night.

Gary Pettis and George Hendrick also hit home runs as the Angels wrapped up the American League Western Division crown before a crowd of 46,677 at Anaheim Stadium.

"We always seem to be written off as the old guys who won't win it," California's Doug DeCinces said. "But I believe our pitching and our defense makes up for anything we lack in other areas of the game."

The Angels also won the division title in 1979 and 1982. However, they have never made it to a World Series.

They will get that chance when they face the winner of the AL

Eastern Division in the League Championship Series beginning Oct. 7.

Rangers starter Mike Mason had retired 13 batters in a row before Pettis hit a solo home run in the sixth inning to cut the Texas lead to 2-1.

After Wally Joyner reached first on an error by Toby Harrah, Downing hit a two-run homer off reliever Dale Mahorric, 2-4, to give the Angels the lead.

One out later, Hendrick stroked another homer to put California up 4-2.

The Angels added four insurance runs in the seventh as Joyner singled home a run and Downing hit a three-run homer, his 20th.

That was more than enough support for left-hander John Candelaria, 9-2, who allowed five hits, struck out nine and walked two over

seven innings. Donnie Moore pitched the last two innings for the Angels, giving up an RBI single to Larry Parrish in the eighth.

The Rangers jumped to a 2-0 lead in the third. With one out, Steve Buechele tripled and scored on a double by Harrah. Scott Fletcher then singled off the glove of Angel second baseman Bobby Grich to score Harrah.

The Angels have won 23 of their last 30 games to pull away from the Rangers in the division race.

Rangers rookie Pete Incaviglia struck out in the first inning to set a new American League record for strikeouts in a season with 176. The previous record of 175 had been set by Mike Nicholson of the Chicago White Sox in 1963 and matched by Gorman Thomas of the Milwaukee Brewers in 1979.

Youthful Wash gets 1st victory

Uncharacteristically, Cedar Rapids Washington had gone three games without a touchdown pass, an extra point or a victory.

But the Warriors got all three Friday night in a 20-6 Mississippi Valley Conference prep football triumph over Cedar Rapids Kennedy at Kingston Stadium.

Washington's 0-3 start was its worst in 20 years. It also had been a number of years since the Warriors had gone three games without a touchdown pass or extra point.

"They're starting to believe in themselves," Coach Wally Sheets said of his junior-dominated team. "This is one of the first clubs I've had that has scrimmaged as much this early. We just have to."

Kennedy's record fell to 1-3 overall and 1-2 in the Valley. The Cougars had five turnovers, giving them 13 in the past three games.

Wash lost four fumbles, hiking its

turnover total to 17 through four games. But losing the ball didn't cost the Warriors this time.

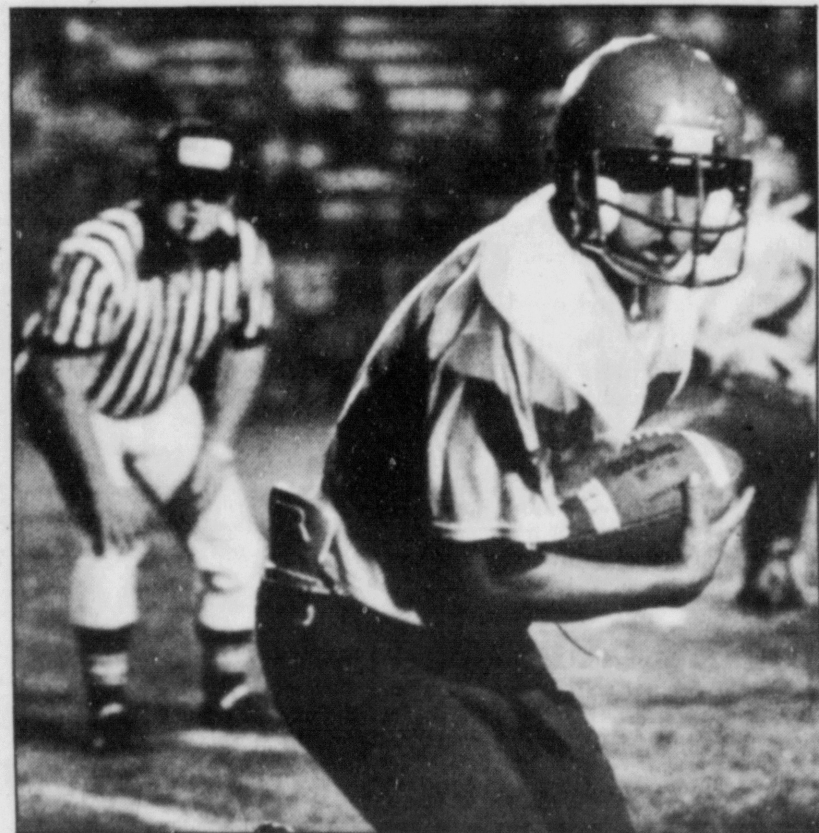
"It was Wash's football game all the way," Kennedy Coach Al Stiers said. "They got to the ball faster than we did, they stayed with their game plan and their kids were intense. Anything I said about our team would take away from that."

AFTER A SCORELESS first half in which the two rivals fumbled nearly as often as they managed a first down, Washington put together an 8-play drive for the first points.

Defensive back Chad Dummermuth recovered a fumble at the Kennedy 34-yard line after the Cougars' Jordan Laube had caught a 9-yard pass. Seven consecutive running plays — four by Nathan Brooks — took Wash to the Kennedy 9.

On second down, Warrior quarterback Shannon Shaw found tight end John Hickok wide open at the

Linn-Mar 'shocked,' but still beats I.C. West

Iowa City West's football team surprised Linn-Mar, but not enough to prevent the Lions from another win.

Linn-Mar, the state's sixth-ranked team in Class 4A, recorded its 16th straight victory Friday night, 28-17 over West. The Lions improved to 4-0 overall, 3-0 in the Mississippi Valley Conference. West dropped to 1-3 and 0-2.

"It was really a shock," Linn-Mar Coach Greg Purnell said. "West had thrown the ball 80 percent of the time in its last two football games. They completely changed their offense. They ended up moving the football really well."

West is a school that hasn't produced a successful football team in many years. You wouldn't have surmised that by watching the Trojans Friday. They had 18 first downs to Linn-Mar's 12, and piled

up 297 yards of offense.

However, the Lions racked up 346 yards thanks to several big plays that gave them a 28-3 lead after three quarters. In the second half, little doubt existed regarding which team would win and which would lose.

Linn-Mar pounced to a 13-0 lead after its first two possessions. Junior quarterback Ted Sheeley found a wide-open Tom Busch for a 30-yard touchdown pass before four

minutes elapsed in the game. Soon after Lion defensive end Steve Rittgers made a fine, diving interception, Sheeley bootlegged 33 yards for another TD.

Liene Lo's 33-yard field goal cut West's deficit to 13-3, but Linn-Mar again was to strike with sudden potency. On a third-and-10 at the 50-yard line, the Trojan defense was expecting a Lion pass. But Jim Albaugh ran a sweep for a touchdown, Sheeley ran for a two-point

conversion, and it was 21-3 at the half.

"I think the clincher was when Jimmy Albaugh broke that sweep," Purnell said. "We guessed right."

Albaugh scored the Lions' final touchdown on a two-yard run early in the third quarter. It was set up by a 57-yard pass from Sheeley to Busch.

Texas-El Paso: The Miners have the fifth-ranked passing offense in the nation, averaging 297.5 yards. Quarterback Sammy Garza, who suffered a concussion, injured thumb and bruised shoulder in last week's 31-21 loss at Hawaii, is ranked 12th in passing efficiency, hitting 94 of 141 attempts for 1,109 yards and 10 touchdowns. Garza is also ranked 6th in total offense, averaging 279.5 yards. UTEP blasted Northern Michigan, an NCAA Division II foe, 64-29 in its season-opener, lost to Air Force (23-21) and beat New Mexico State (47-33). The Miners, who won but one game last year, play at Tennessee next week.

Iowa: The Hawkeyes enter the game with the best defense in the country and the second-best offense. The Hawks have limited opponents to an average of 142.0 yards defensively, 38.0 yards per game rushing, and have rolled up 522.5 yards per game on offense. Senior quarterback Mark Vlasic is ranked eighth in passing efficiency, hitting 24 of 43 attempts for 409 yards. The Hawks have outscored their foes 100-10, demolishing Iowa State (43-7) and Northern Illinois (57-3). Iowa is ranked 15th by The Associated Press and CNN/USA Today, 13th by United Press International and 10th by Sports Illustrated.

Quarterback Alex Espinoza passed for 210 yards and three touchdowns and ran for two more. Junior flanker Tom Schulting caught four balls for 50 yards and freshman linebacker Darrin Trieb had a team-leading 11 tackles. Espinoza ranked 31st in passing efficiency by the NCAA.

No. 1?

Time for small talk is over; Oklahoma, Miami play today

The mind games are over. It's time for the showdown between No. 1 Oklahoma and No. 2 Miami.

The war of words that has been going on since Miami upset Oklahoma last year may carry over to the football field in today's heralded rematch, but running, passing, blocking and tackling will speak loudest.

As Miami defensive tackle Dan Sileo said, "Time to stop lippin' and start hittin'."

Jaws started flapping last year when Miami stunned the Sooners 27-14. The Hurricanes also put quarterback Troy Aikman out of action with a broken leg, although that forced Oklahoma to go back to the pure wishbone offense and quarterback Jamelle Holieway has run it superbly. But it was Miami's loose lips rather than the outcome that riled the Sooners.

"It's upsetting when people come to your place talking a bunch of junk and trying to take you out of the game," tight end Keith Jackson said.

"They shocked us with the way they were talking," defensive back Sonny Brown said. "No team had ever tried to intimidate us."

It escalated when All-America linebacker Brian Bosworth accused Miami of rolling up the score against Notre Dame last year, saying it showed a lack of class. Sileo then called Bosworth "the

most overrated player in the country . . . on the most overrated defense. I don't like the stuff he said about this program and about Coach (Jimmy) Johnson. The way I look at it, he's a reflection of the team. I can't wait to get on the field against them."

Bosworth has said the Miami rematch "has taken on more importance to us than the Texas game. I kind of hate everything to do with the University of Texas but I just hate Miami's football team."

Jackson said: "What they don't understand is that we've got a bunch of lunatics, too. If I were them, I'd be nice to Boz because he just might rip their quarterback's head off."

That would be Vinny Testaverde, one of the nation's top passers.

"There's been a lot of talk about how Brian Bosworth is going to hurt this team," Testaverde said. "This team doesn't get intimidated by anyone. It's going to take all 11 people on their defense to hurt this team, not just one individual."

Bosworth said: "If Miami wants to hammer it out against us . . . I'd like to extend an invitation. Please try and do that."

At least one Miami player understands where Bosworth is coming from.

"My type of player," defensive tackle Jerome Brown said. "We are

UNI to induct healthy Sheriff

Stan Sheriff said he hasn't felt so good in 10 years. But there's a catch.

Last April 15, the former University of Northern Iowa football coach and athletic director was on an operating table in Honolulu, Hawaii. Sheriff, the University of Hawaii athletic director since August 1983, was about to undergo surgery for eight coronary artery bypasses.

The head surgeon, Dr. Richard Mamiya, told Sheriff softly a day earlier, "With your job, Stan, we're going to give you a few extras."

Sheriff got the extras, a new lease on life, plus a sore leg from where veins were transplanted to repair his heart.

"I suffered a mild heart attack in January and I quit smoking cigarettes then. Now I feel great," said Sheriff, who returned to the UNI campus in Cedar Falls to be inducted into the school's Athletics Hall of Fame today.

"Did you know that I was out of the hospital in five days, back to work in three weeks and played 14 holes of golf 29 days after the operation?" he said. "I never had any chest pains, just a sore leg."

Sheriff may still have a sore leg, considering his return visit to UNI included a tour of Cedar Falls-Waterloo golf courses.

"It's great to be back, it really is," he said. "The Dome looks great; there's a new scoreboard, and new buildings on campus and the football team's success doesn't surprise me a bit."

Sheriff, who was head football coach from 1960 to '83, and athletic director during the final 13 years, was the man who hired current Panthers coach Darrell Mudra.

"Darrell's always done a great job, and that's why we hired him," Sheriff said. "He's a proven winner."

"I talked with him a while the other evening and told him he will continue to have more coaching opportunities in the future."

While Mudra will always be hot coaching property, Sheriff, 54, said he is on the islands for life.

He has helped his university maintain a \$7 million athletic budget, two-thirds of which goes to football. The school averages 46,000 fans in 50,000-seat Aloha Stadium.

Among the recent visiting teams have been Iowa (1984), and Wisconsin this season.

"We're entertaining Michigan on Dec. 6, and we're going to play them tough; we won't back off," said Sheriff. "We gave Iowa all it wanted, and beat Wisconsin this year (20-17). There's a lot of tradition on the islands, and 50 percent of the kids on the team are from Hawaii."

Meanwhile, Sheriff observed, UNI continues to move upward.

"It's difficult for me to get a pulse about the school since I've left, but I do know that UNI will always be in third position behind the Iowa and Iowa State syndrome in the state. That's because of the Big Ten and Big 8 ties those schools have. But with Eldon Miller in basketball, Darrell Mudra and Bob Bowlsby (UNI athletic director), they will always maintain a solid posture in the state."

"I read articles about how Iowa was criticized for not playing UNI in football, and that's always been a battle to get recognition," he said. "I know about media exposure. In Hawaii, we're the last college football team to play our games Saturday night. By the time we're going, most people are either in bed or headed to bed. It's an identity factor, but we have a damn good coach (Dick Tomey) and a lot of pride."

Also being inducted into the Hall of Fame are former wrestling coach-official Finn Eriksen of Waterloo; Ruby Miller, developer of girls' interscholastic athletics in Colorado; Dick Beetsch, three-sport star at UNI; and Bill Weick, two-time national wrestling champion.

Panthers host SW Missouri St.

Northern Iowa's Panthers, ranked 11th in the NCAA's Division I-AA, aren't exactly easy fodder for any visiting team, but there's still some lingering doubt they really can stop a wishbone attack.

Today's 65th UNI homecoming game against Southwest Missouri State, with a 1:30 p.m. kickoff in the UNI-Dome, may provide an answer.

Last November UNI lost 40-33 to Georgia Southern in the NCAA Division I-AA semifinals. Georgia Southern's wishbone picked the UNI defense apart, yard by yard.

Southwest Missouri State, 1-2, features what first-year coach Jesse Branch calls "the flexbone."

UNI, 1-0-1, has had a week off to begin defense of its league title, and also relish a 17-0 road victory Sept. 13 at Kansas State.

Are the Panthers wishbone-wise now? "After all this time, we should be," said Coach Darrell Mudra. "We've worked hard and scrimmaged hard."

UNI comes into the game with a 5-1 lead in the series, and only one injury. Starting offensive guard Mark Botkin, a sophomore from Linn-Mar, suffered a knee sprain in a scrimmage last week. He'll be replaced by junior Ken Kolthoff.

C.R. LaSalle to test unbeaten Benton today
