

• Quick! Name the basketball teams you expect to be at the bottom of the Big Ten race this coming season.

OK, unless you have been living in Muldavia during recent semesters, you undoubtedly picked Northwestern, Wisconsin and Minnesota.

That was a snap, right? Northwestern was 10th last season, Wisconsin ninth and Minnesota eighth. Moreover, the Gophers were decimated by transfers, some as an aftermath of the legal action in which three players were found not guilty of rape in Madison, Wis. Now look at Iowa's Big Ten

schedule. Iowa opens against Northwestern Jan. 3 and Wisconsin Jan. 5 — both at home — and then goes to Minnesota Jan. 10.

The Hawkeyes are slated to finish the season March 5 at Northwestern and March 8 at Wisconsin.

There is no free lunch during a Big Ten season, but it looks as if Coach Tom Davis' first Hawkeye team catches a break at the start and finish.

That leaves the center of the Big Ten schedule as the tough part. Maybe it will be something like Johnny Orr said when he moved from Michigan to Iowa State.

"I've got the greatest coaching job in the world," Orr crowed at the time. "Everything is just super. I've got a great salary, I'm working with terrific people and I've bought the finest house I ever expect to own. It's like I've been telling my wife, now if only we didn't have to play those damn games!"

• Tom Poholsky, father of Tom Poholsky, Iowa's reserve quarterback, had a 30-45 pitching record for the St. Louis Cardinals in five seasons from 1950 through 1956. Those are not Hall of Fame figures, but think how many pitchers never even reach the majors.

Poholsky bowed out after a 1-7 record with the Cubs in 1957. Born in Detroit, he now is a manufacturer's rep in St. Louis.

Young Tom wasn't around when his dad pitched in the big leagues, of course. He was born Nov. 14, 1966. He said he did play lots of baseball, and added, "I pitched some, but my favorite position was catcher. I really enjoyed catching."



Busch, making the most of his first varsity prep football season, caught five passes for 101 yards and one touchdown in sparking Class 4A

seventh-ranked Linn-Mar to a 21-7

Mississippi Valley Conference victory over turnover-prone Cedar Rapids Jefferson Friday night. Busch, a 5-foot-10 wide receiver, kept Jefferson's secondary in a track meet before a homecoming crowd of 3.000. But the J-Hawks foiled their

own upset bid with five turnovers,

before halftime that gift-wrapped a touchdown for the Lions.

The victory was Linn-Mar's 18th straight, and boosted the Lions to 5-0 overall and 4-0 in the Valley. Jefferson dropped its third consecutive meeting with the Lions, and is 2-3 overall and 0-3 in the confer-

The season continues to pay dividends for Busch who has caught 13 passes for 338 yards and four TDs in four Valley outings. Busch quit football as a freshman because a coach reportedly felt the young sprinter was built to play wide receiver, and no other position. That including a disastrous blocked punt got Busch upset, and he didn't return until this season.

"I decided I would come out again: I like where I'm at now," said Busch. "I feel I made the right decision."

Lions quarterback Ted Sheeley couldn't be happier.

"It's a lot easier when you have a great offensive line plus Tom," said Sheeley, who completed seven of 11 passes for 123 yards with one interception.

"A lot of time I can't see Tom because of somebody's hand in my face. So I just throw the ball up and I know he's there."

Hudson stays home; Vlasic might play

Starting fullback David Hudson will not play in Iowa's Big Ten football game at Michigan State this afternoon, and the status of quarterback Mark Vlasic remained questionable Friday night.

Hudson and Vlasic both were injured in last week's victory over Texas-El Paso, Hudson with a pulled thigh muscle and Vlasic with a bruised shoulder.

"Vlasic has a chance to play, but maybe not a very good one," Iowa sports information director George Wine said after the team arrived in East Lansing. "Coach (Hayden) Fry says the decision will be made on the quarterback situation in pregame warmups.


Kickoff is at 1:42 p.m. (Iowa time). The game will be televised nationally by CBS and can be seen on KGAN, channel 2.

Red-shirt freshman Richard Bass is expected to be Iowa's starting fullback today. If Vlasic is unable to start, the Hawkeyes are expected to open with freshman Dan McGwire.

Two other quarterbacks, sophomore Chuck Hartlieb and freshman Tom Poholsky, made the trip. Hartlieb was the second-team quarterback until he suffered an injury to his throwing hand, which has sidelined him the last two games.

Vlasic boarded the team plane Friday afternoon at the Cedar Rapids airport, but Hudson did not. Two others who did not make the trip are Jim Reilly, a backup linebacker who is the team's second-leading tackler, and defensive tackle Joe Schuster, who did not play last week because of an injury.

Wine reported that the Iowa traveling squad numbered 60 players. The Big Ten Conference limit

on traveling squads is 64.

The status of Vlasic and Hudson has been uncertain all week as Fry has said their chances of playing were 50-50.

When the Iowa party arrived at the Cedar Rapids airport about 1:45 Friday afternoon, it was clear Fry wanted to prolong the suspense.

Two reporters at the airport originally were told by airport personnel they could go on to the apron when the Iowa party arrived. But later, an airport security guard said a university official requested that no media be allowed near the

Criner says ruling 'broke up' Braswell

DES MOINES (AP) — Iowa State football coach Jim Criner said Cyclone linebacker Jeff Braswell didn't deserve to have his college football career ended over recruiting rule violations Criner said were relatively minor.

'What has happened to Jeff is totally unfair," Criner said Friday. "There is no way the punishment fits the crime.

"Jeff's really disappointed," Criner said. "He broke up and cried. The problem is that nobody really had the chance to prepare him for something this severe. No one had any idea it would be something this severe. We didn't. The kid didn't. In Miami, guys drove new cars and got suspended for

The National Collegiate Athletic Association's eligibility committee ruled Thursday that Braswell, a two-time All-America honorable mention, can play no more college football. The committee said rule violations gave Iowa State "significant unfair recruiting advantages."

Criner said the NCAA action involved rides Braswell received from a graduate assistant coach while he was being recruited, meals Braswell charged at a restaurant and a tuition loan Braswell arranged through an Ames bank.

"I feel so badly for Jeff," Criner said. "Society doesn't teach us that you cut your arm off for each single mistake. At least it shouldn't teach that."

Iowa State Athletic Director Max Urick said Friday the school had not decided whether to appeal the ruling.

Once that matter was settled at halftime, the Warriors buckled down and played a strong second half to defeat Dubuque Senior at Kingston Stadium, 13-10.

The Warriors improved to 2-1 in the Mississippi Valley Conference, 2-3 overall. Senior is 0-3 and 1-4.


