
Nelson has missed only three Kingston games in 31/2 decades at the mike. A former teacher, he had to attend meetings in 1965-71 as member of the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

"I see less of the game than anyone realizes," Nelson said. "I'm busy following the ball with the binoculars and watching who makes the tackle. Fred Winter once said, 'The people are not there to hear a lot of chatter. They just want to know who has the ball and who

Nelson admitted he has made his share of turnovers, too.

"Sometimes the mud is so bad that you can't read the numbers on the players' jerseys," he said. "You have to wait until the mud washes off. I remember I called a tackle by one player and the guy that actually made it started waving at me from the sidelines.

"I just hope they'll let me continue as long as I can get up the steps in the stadium," Nelson said. "When the day comes I can't get up there, then I think I'll give it up.'

Clemens to start Game 4

ace Roger Clemens, shelled in the American League playoff opener, will start Game 4, his first start this season on three days rest Red Sox' Manager John McNamara said Thursday.

Clemens, who led the major leagues with a 24-4 record, will face the California Angels on Saturday. "I think you ought to have your

best pitcher available to pitch three times in a seven-game series,' McNamara said in announcing his decision. The Red Sox and Angels split the first two meetings, and Game 3 was scheduled for Friday night.

McNamara said it had been his "intention right along" to start Clemens in the fourth game since veteran Tom Seaver suffered a knee injury Sept. 19 against Toronto.

'When Tom Seaver went down (pitching coach) Bill Fischer and I talked, we went back over Roger's year and all," McNamara said. There was no doubt in our minds. We knew what we wanted to do and we named only three pitchers with an option for the fourth game on what we wanted to do."

Bruce Hurst started Game 2 and Dennis "Oil Can" Boyd was scheduled for the third game. McNamara had previously said he might use Al Nipper in Game 4.

Clemens, a hard-throwing righthander who suffered a welt on his pitching elbow when hit by a line drive on Oct. 1, suffered his worst outing of the season Tuesday night in Game 1, which California won 8-

Clemens was pounded for 10 hits and eight runs, seven of them earned, in $7\frac{1}{3}$ innings. It was the most runs he had allowed all season.

He claimed he was not bothered by his elbow, instead saying he might have been too strong from lack of work. Unusually wild, Clemens walked three and threw 65 pitches in the first two innings. He left after throwing 143 pitches.

"All I ever heard when I pitched in Pittsburgh was that I didn't win enough games. I had one 20-win season (in 1977, when he led the National League in ERA) and now I'm supposed to do it every year.

"People say I haven't lived up to my potential. I look at my record and I'm 50 games over .500. I look up and don't see to many pitchers in the major leagues anywhere near that.'

At 141-89, Candelaria is only one of seven pitchers with a record of 50 or more games over the break-even point.

In August 1985, the Pirates traded Candelaria, a lifelong starter who had been used exclusively in relief for the first time in his career, and high-priced veterans George Hendrick and Al Holland to California for three young players. The change in scenery was what Cande-

laria needed, and he went 7-3 for the Angels during the rest of the year.

'To win and hear laughter in the clubhouse, that's what was missing the last couple of years in Pittsburgh," he said. "It's nice to be back in a winning atmosphere, to be in a place where they treat you like a human, instead of a piece of meat."

But while he has enjoyed success on the field, he has had anguish away from it. Last year, his infant son, John Robert Jr., died after having been in a coma for nearly a year following a swimming pool accident.

"The tragedy that happened to my family really hurts," said Candelaria, who prefers not to discuss the

subject more than that. Instead, he would rather talk about his team, his success and his upcoming start.

"I don't know what that will be like. I've never pitched a 5:30 start in Anaheim," said Candelaria, whose NL playoff record of 14 strikeouts in a game was tied by Houston's Mike Scott Wednesday

"I feel it's time for my talent to come out," he said with a smile. "I don't know if it will."
