

Peay didn't pick shotgun

· While attending the Big Ten's annual preseason football press conference in Chicago last summer, I quickly discovered Francis Peay, Northwestern's head coach, was one of the most interesting people in attendance.

Peay, 42, is a tall, impressive, articulate man, a Pittsburgh native who became an All-America offensive tackle at Missouri. He played nine seasons in the NFL with the Giants, Packers and Chiefs.

When Denny Green became Northwestern's head coach in 1981, Peay was the first one invited to join his staff - as defensive coordinator. He served previously as an aide at Notre Dame and Cal.

After Green resigned last March, Northwestern athletic director



Doug Single finally asked Peay to serve as interim coach just before spring practice. Chicago papers reported Sam Rutigliano, former Cleveland Browns coach, had turned down the job.

"I was named head coach three days before spring practice," Peay said in Chicago, "so I now have a better understanding of the dynamics of the shotgun wedding. I also saw another coach decline the job, so I realize how it is for the other prospect to turn down the bride and choose the shotgun instead!

"I have a premier challenge in the Big Ten and a very short time to implement things. I was offered the job as interim coach on a take-it-orleave-it basis. If I took it, I might not have a job very long, and if I didn't, I didn't have any job at all."

So now, alas, Peay sees the result of his Hobson's choice. He did have a job, but he didn't have it very long. He announced last week he no longer is a candidate to continue as Northwestern's coach. Obviously he couldn't see much future there.

The Wildcats started the season with a 17-6 loss to Duke, but then defeated Army, 25-18, and Princeton, 37-0. They have lost by respectable scores to Indiana, 24-7; Minnesota, 44-23 (after leading, 17-0); and Wisconsin, 35-27.

Peay promised Northwestern would have a more diversified offense than in the past. This year's team certainly has demonstrated that. In previous years the Wildcats

came out throwing in desperation. Iowa's Hayden Fry calls Mike Greenfield, Northwestern's durable junior, "the best running quarterback in the Big Ten," and statistics back up this label. Despite 252 yards in sacks and losses, Greenfield has netted 208 yards rushing this season. Minnesota's Rickey Foggie is second with 189 yards.

Peay also proved he had a vivid recollection of last year's games when he said:

"We hope to shore up our pass defense, too. We had 25 touchdown passes throw against us last season. Six of them were by Iowa's Chuck Long. He threw three to Bill Happel and one each to Ronnie Harmon, Robert Smith and Craig Clark."

I will be sorry to see Peay leave - even if he did have to choose the bride instead of the shotgun.

Mets happy to be home for Game 6

EW YORK (AP) — The Boston Red Sox have got the New York Mets right where the Mets want them.

Down 3-2 in the best-of-seven World Series. the Mets feel happy just to have brought the Series back to Shea Stadium, especially after losing the first two games here.

'When we went to Boston, we felt like we had to win two out of three," Mets Manager Davey Johnson said Friday, a day off for the two teams. "When you win the first two, you want to sweep, but we are right where we wanted to be going into Boston.'

In tonight's Game 6, the Red Sox will send 24-game winner Roger Clemens against the Mets left-hander Bob Ojeda. The game begins at 7:25 p.m. and will be televised by NBC (KWWL, channel 7).

One thing is certain from Boston's perspec-

"Now, we've got the homecourt advantage off our backs," Red Sox center fielder Dave Henderson said.

The Red Sox won the first two games of the

Series 1-0 and 9-3 in New York. The Mets won the next two games in Boston, 7-1 and 6-2, before the Red Sox came up with a 4-2 victory Thursday night to break the deadlock and move within one game of their first World Series title in 68 years.

"THEY HAVE TO FEEL that they've got us where they want us," Henderson said of the Mets. "They're down a game and they have to win. We feel the same way. We're right where we want to be - a game up and Roger (Clemens) on the mound.'

Clemens will be pitching on five days' rest after working three straight times on three days' rest. When pitching on five days' rest this season Clemens was 8-0 with a 2.12 ERA - including the game he struck out 20 Seattle batters in April.

Through some pitching adjustments that may have cost the Red Sox Game 4 of this Series, Manager John McNamara got both Bruce Hurst, the Game 5 winner, and Clemens back on a regular schedule. McNamara started Al Nipper, who hadn't been used since Oct. 4, in the fourth game. He lasted only six innings

But on Clemens' last time out on three days' rest, he went just 41/3 innings in Game 2 last

'There was no brilliance to it. There was really no alternative," McNamara said. "We found out that Bruce doesn't pitch well on three days' rest, and Roger was tired. He'd pitched three times on three days' rest. The Roger Clemens you saw last Sunday was not the Roger Clemens we saw all year long. We had the luxury of being able to make the move when we jumped out 2-0."

IN GAME 2 AGAINST Clemens last week, Johnson started Danny Heep in left field instead of Mookie Wilson and Howard Johnson at third instead of Ray Knight. Johnson said he planned to have Wilson and Knight in the starting lineup this time.

Ojeda, traded from Boston to New York last November, will be working on just three days' Johnson was not sure what the effect would

"Ojeda's not come back on three days' this season," Johnson said. "I don't know what he's done the rest of his career. I don't know how he'll react."

Last time out, the 18-game winner Ojeda worked seven innings, holding the Red Sox to one run on five hits in Game 3.

"I've got to win. It's as simple as that," Ojeda said. "I'm not uncomfortable with this situation. We just have to pull together and get a team effort. We know we have to win two games. We've done it before."

If there is a seventh game, the Mets will send Ron Darling on three days' rest against the Red Sox's Dennis "Oil Can" Boyd. Darling was the winner of Game 4, working seven scoreless innings, while Boyd lost Game 3, giving up six runs on nine hits in seven

Albaugh helps Lions to title share

"Pound for pound," Linn-Mar Coach Greg Purnell said Friday night, "Jim Albaugh could be the best football player in the state."

Purnell didn't need the "pound for pound" qualifier Friday. Despite difficult running conditions because of a day-long rain, the 5-foot-8, 151pound Albaugh put on a sensational offensive performance. His four touchdowns and 240 all-purpose yards led the Lions to a 42-7 pasting of host Cedar Rapids Prairie.

Thus, Linn-Mar will have a shot at defending its Class 4A state title. The win put the Lions in next week's playoffs. They will be at home against Clinton. Prairie had clinched a playoff spot before Friday's game. The Hawks play at Iowa City High. Both games are Wednesday night.

Prairie and Linn-Mar are both 6-2. Linn-Mar finished its first season of Mississippi Valley Conference with 5-1 mark, and tied Dubuque Hempstead and Iowa City for the MVC championship.

Now, let's talk about this Albaugh. He put on move after move, made cut after cut, and found hole after hole. He rushed 13 times for 143 yards and two touchdowns. He caught three passes for 97 yards and two TDs. He mystified the Hawk defense.

"I WAS TOTALLY amazed at the ability of that Albaugh," Prairie Coach Ed Johnson said. "He made cuts on that field when our kids

"He's been a great leader for us," Purnell said. "I saw him in the hallway at school today, and I said, 'Jimmy, I need a great effort from you. You've given us great efforts all year, but tonight we need a really big one.' And that's just what he gave us."

Linn-Mar defensive back Mark Lancaster did just as much as Albaugh to defuse Prairie, which had a six-game winning streak snapped.

With the Lions ahead 7-0 in the first quarter, Prairie drove to the Linn-Mar 17. But Lancaster intercepted a John Odell pass, and returned it 80 yards to the Prairie 11. Ted Sheeley threw a seven-yard TD pass to Albaugh three plays later to make it 13-0.

Marion blanked by West Delaware

The important numbers for West Delaware are 43, 17 and 1.

For the first time in 43 years, West Delaware has a piece of a Wamac Conference football title. It has beaten Marion for the first time in 17 years. And it is in the playoffs for the very first time.

Chris Tenhoff rushed for 144 yards and three touchdowns and a blitzing defense limited Marion to 17 rushing yards as visiting West Delaware mauled Marion, 38-0.

It was a sweet homecoming for West Delaware Coach Larry Atwater, former player at Marion and Coe College. The Hawks were 1-8 last year, but now are 6-1.

West Delaware and Marion tied for the Wamac title, each with 5-1 marks. This is the ninth straight year the Indians have won or shared

the league championship. In a first-round Class 3A playoff

game Wednesday night, West Delaware will play at Waterloo Columbus. Kickoff is at 7:30 p.m.

"The kids put down on their cards at the beginning of the year that they wanted to beat Marion at Marion for the conference title," Atwater said. "Coming back here was a little more special. I'm sure the town's pretty excited about it."

When the Wamac was formed in 1943, Manchester was one of the members. But whether the school was known as just Manchester or West Delaware, it had never won the conference title. And the last win over Marion was in 1969.

WEST DELAWARE moved swiftly to take control, scoring on its first possession and posting a 19-0 lead by halftime. Two third-quarter touchdowns removed any hope of a Marion comeback.

The Hawk defense allowed Marion only six first downs and 74 total yards. Linebackers Mark Havertape and Shane Burbridge blitzed on nearly every play, which was the main reason half of Marion's 24 rushing plays resulted in negative yardage.

"It was probably one of the worst games Marion has played in many years," said Coach Dave Messerli, whose Indians are 5-3 with a game remaining Friday. "We're disappointed, hurt and embarrassed. We let 'em start quick and that was that. Larry did an excellent job of getting them ready.

"We won some games this year to put us in position to win the title and we're proud of that. These kids tied for our ninth title and nothing can take that away."

Tenhoff, a 150-pound running back, had 80 yards in the first period, including a 9-yard touchdown run on a pitchout to the left with only 2:17 gone. Quarterback Shaun Klein added a 2-yard plunge over star left guard Sean Lyness midway through the second period, and Tenhoff had a 4-yard plunge with :57 left in the half.

West Delaware's defense forced six turnovers, three in each half. Toby Tutton, who scored a thirdperiod touchdown, had two interceptions in the first half.

Tenhoff boosted the Hawks' lead to 26-0 with 7:04 left in the third on a 19-yard run, breaking five tackles en route. Tutton's score made it 32-0 heading into the fourth.

Todd Manternach's 1-yard plunge with 1:22 left capped the scoring.

Marion never moved inside West Delaware's 40-yard line. The Indians' long gainer was a 27-yard run in the first half by Don Spaethe.

In addition to Tutton's two interceptions, Brad Ketchum, Corey Downs and Todd Bissell also picked off passes, and Kael Brooks recovered a fumble.

Regis visits Waterloo East

Waterloo East football coach Roger Kittleson is excited about

preparing for an opponent his team knows little about. Judging by the way the Trojans have played, that's not good news for visiting Cedar Rapids Regis, which faces East tonight at 7:30 in

Sloane-Wallace Stadium. East (7-1) already has locked up a playoff berth by winning the Big Eight Conference title. Regis, the 10th-rated 3A club at 5-2,

needs a win to gain a postseason berth. Kittleson is enjoying what he describes as his best overall

offensive unit in his 16 years as Trojans' boss. "I've never had a team that could do as many things," Kittleson

Regis Coach Gaylord Hauschildt, whose Royals have lost only to playoff-bound Pleasant Valley and Waterloo Columbus, said his team is prepared for the challenge.

"We understand how important a game this is for us," Hauschildt said. "But at Regis we've always thrived on challenges. We know East can hit you with a lot of different weapons, but it should be a fun game.'

The Trojans are led by quarterback Troy Alexander, who has been intercepted just once in 90 attempts, completing 53 for 1,016 yards and 11 touchdowns. Running backs Lew Montgomery (794 yards, 17 TDs) and Charles Young (542, 9 TDs) are scrambling for statistical recognition with wide receiver Scott Redd (30 catches, 640 yards).

Regis counters East's talent with a classy duo of its own in running back Mike Schulte and quarterback Mike McCool. Schulte has averaged almost six yards per carry, with three games over 100 yards. McCool has passed for over 1,000 yards.




